ARTHUR L. JOHNSON CLASS OF 2009 MAJOR LEAGUE PLAYERS

Brian Megill, of Syracuse University, was selected in the 2013 Major League Lacrosse (MLL) Collegiate Draft in the first round (No. 7 overall) by the Denver Outlaws.

A 2012 USILA Second Team All-American, Megill is the program's 16th first-round MLL draft choice since 2001, tied with Virginia for the most of any school. Megill recorded 62 ground balls and set an SU single-season record with 37 caused turnovers a year ago. For his career, Megill has 135 ground balls and 78 caused turnovers.

Megill was a defensive standout at Syracuse that will bring an element of toughness to Denver, however he may have a more hybrid position at the MLL level. "We certainly have a lot of options with him because Brian (Megill) is such a good athlete and runs the field so well," Stagnitta said. "We are going to use him in a lot of different areas."

Megill has currently helped the Denver franchise to the best record in the MLL thus far this season.

Megill was a standout athlete for the class of 2009 at Arthur L. Johnson High School as he helped both the football and lacrosse teams make it to the state championship in both sports.

Rob Smorol, of Rutgers University, recently signed a free agent contract to pitch for the Boston Red Sox's minor league affiliate.

At Rutgers, Smorol finished his career second in school history in innings (313.0) and starts (44), tied for third in wins (22), third in strikeouts (206) and single season starts (15 in both 2012 and 2013) and eighth in games (72). In addition, he holds the program record for most consecutive weekends starts (44). In 2013 Smorol led the Rutgers staff with a 3.63 ERA and .262 opposing batting average.

Smorol will look to begin his professional career soon as

he will be on the mound this week for the Red Sox affiliate.

Smorol was a standout athlete for the class of 2009 at Arthur L. Johnson High School as he helped the baseball team make the UCIAC Semifinals his senior season.

6TH GRADERS AT KUMPF SCHOOL WARMED THE HEARTS OF PEDIATRIC CANCER PATIENTS

After having a jean day for the teachers to raise money for pediatric cancer patients, Krista Chapman and Amanda Vacchio, 6th grade math teachers at Kumpf Middle School, felt that the 6th grade students should get involved in a service project as well to help these children with cancer. Krista and Amanda decided that their math students could make blankets for the young patients residing in Robert Wood Johnson Hospital in New Brunswick, NJ and Columbia Presbyterian in New York.

In order to ensure the maximum amount of blankets could be made, the students needed to raise money so the fabric and card materials could be purchased. Each student brought in at least \$3.00 for the materials and there was a generous donation from Withum Smith and Brown. The amount that was donated calculated to over \$700 which meant that fabric for over 60 blankets could be purchased. The students felt inspired to donate the money knowing the money was going to a good cause that they would actually be helping to make in the process. With the money left over after purchasing the fabric and cards, there will be a \$100 donation to the Meghan Rose Bradley Foundation to raise funds and awareness for pediatric brain cancer patients.

Krista and Amanda wanted the service project to be interdisciplinary and presented the idea to the 6th grade team which they all thought it was a great idea to get involved and have the students involved for the project as well. The English teacher, Mrs. Babis' (6th Grade), Mrs. Casale's (6th Grade), and Ms. Monsorno's (7th Grade) classes were going to create stories with illustrations for the children to be able to read in the hospital. The social studies teachers, Mrs. Corby and Mrs. O'Neill, were having their 6th grade students make multiple cards that were extremely decorated and inspiring for all of the patients.

Students began the service project by watching an inspiring video raising awareness about a young boy's journey through brain cancer. While the English and social studies classes worked on their projects, in the 6th grade math classes, Krista Chapman, Sherri D'Amico, Pam Mullin, Sheryl Johnson, and Amanda Vacchio, started the process of making multiple blankets for these patients using measurement and mathematical concepts. Students cut fringes on the blankets, then tied the fringes together to secure the blanket. Students worked extremely hard putting multiple blankets together in each class. Students even took the project a step further taking their cards or stories home with them to dedicate more time to them at home.

The project was a huge success. Over 150 cards, 60 blankets, and 25 books were made by the 6th Grade students and Ms. Monsorno's 7th grade English class. It was a project the students will not forget and know that they warmed the heart of a child battling with cancer in a hospital by creating a blanket, book or card for them.





MATH STUDENTS REFLECT ON THEIR PREVIOUS GOALS





Policyholders with questions or concerns about their claims may also speak with NFIP specialists at 877-287-9804.

Disaster assistance may be available for losses not covered by an insurance settlement for New Jersey survivors of Superstorm Sandy.

That is why the Federal Emergency Management Agency urges survivors who have registered for disaster assistance to call the FEMA Helpline, 800-621-3362 as soon as they receive their insurance settlement.

When the insurance check finally comes it may not cover all the losses a survivor has had, so if you applied for assistance with the Federal Emergency Management Agency you should let FEMA know that you have your insurance settlement. Make sure you have the registration number FEMA assigned to your application.

If you received a letter from FEMA saying you were not eligible for assistance, part of the reason may be that your insurance settlement could not be factored into your application.

If you have already filed an appeal of the original assistance decision, that appeal may be amended based on your insurance settlement.

These are just a few of the reasons it is important applicants stay in touch with FEMA.

Survivors who have registered for assistance should keep their contact information current to ensure timely delivery of important assistance updates.

Keeping one's contact information current

with FEMA will also help connect survivors with FEMA's home inspectors. Unnecessary delays may occur if an inspector is unable to reach an applicant by phone to schedule an appointment. Applicants are also urged to keep their appointments with home inspectors in order to avoid delays.


