RAHWAY TRACK RELAY TEAM RUNS FASTEST TIME IN NATION THIS SEASON

During the recent holiday break, Rahway High School Track Team members were busy winning at three events, the Spiked Shoe Invitational at New York Armory on December 23, the Marine Corps Holiday Relay held on December 27 also at the New York Armory, and the Holiday Relay Carnival on December 30 at the Jersey City Armory. Overall the Indians and Lady Indians combined took home over 100 medals. These three successful competitions have helped prepare the team for the Union County Relay Championships held in January.

The highlight of the break was at the Marine Corps Relay with a US #1 performance in the Sprint Medley Relay. Deshawne Bunion, Jordan Scott, Thorne Roberts, and Harlan Clarke combined to run the fastest time in the nation this season, running the second fastest time in school history. Also at the same event during the Shuttle Hurdle Relay, the team consisting of Jeff Reyes, Kurt Williams, Greg Roberts, and Ja-Tyre Epps ran the third fastest time in the nation.

LUXURY APARTMENTS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Construction is fully underway at Metro Rahway, the 116-unit luxury rental complex near our train station, and is expected to be ready for leasing in summer 2014, according to the developer's website. The four-story, \$18million project on Campbell Street between Elm Avenue and West Cherry Street will replace the former A&M Hardware which was demolished this past June.

"This project shall become another feather in our downtown's cap" noted local real estate broker and former Rahway Chamber of Commerce president Bob Markey. "Proximity to our city's train station further strengthens our downtown's designation as an important 'Transit Village'. The burgeoning Rahway Arts District,





EASY WINTER BIRD FEEDING: GLEANING

Many people would like to help feed birds during the winter, but for various reasons do not want to get involved with tending bird feeders. When the ground is frozen or covered with snow there is a simple technique you will appreciate and birds love. Simply sprinkle seed on the ground.

Gleaning is a type of foraging during which a bird will deliberately and methodically pick over an area to collect food, typically insects or seeds. Many species that overwinter in our area use this method of feeding for at least part of their diet. Dark-eyed Juncos, White-crowned sparrows, Mourning Doves and even Cardinals will frequent your garden to glean seeds off the ground.

The best seed for this type of feeding are

black oil sunflower seeds or finch mix, without corn. The popular wild bird mixes contains a lot of corn which attracts many larger aggressive birds such as Starlings and Grackles which will chase your smaller, and more colorful birds away.


Keep it as simple as possible. Scatter a cup or two of seed in the same area and birds will come back when they need to. I don't sprinkle too much at once because I don't want unnecessary and expensive waste. If you have an easily assessable area with a view from a window, that is perfect. Even if you are a devoted back yard bird watcher, tossing some seed on the ground will give your feathered friends more of choice and area in which to feed.

Fruit in winter is impossible to find but greatly appreciated by birds. If you have overripe apples (sliced), grapes or old raisins, rather than putting them in the trash you can feed it to your birds. If you have a lot of grapes put some in the freezer until you need them. Don't be surprised to see a beautiful Mockingbird in your garden every winter day enjoying an apple or grape.

"THE HOUR OF CODE"

Ask the students in Mrs. Scannell's Grade 8 computer classes at the Rahway Academy about the "Hour of Code" and they would say it was "awesome". The "Hour of Code" was the brainchild of Hadi and Ali Partovi founders of code.org, a nonprofit organization aimed at encouraging teaching computer science. The goal of the campaign was to expose ten million people, at any age level, to complete at least one hour of computer programming. The "Hour of Code" was endorsed by celebrities, politicians, athletes and even the President. "Don't just buy a new video game-make one", President Obama urges in the video created to kick-off the campaign.

Using free online tutorials featuring Mark Zuckerberg and Bill Gates, the students completed lessons programming different puzzles for "Angry Birds" and "Plants vs. Zombies". Since this was a self-paced activity, as the students became more comfortable with their skills, they were able to move onto different tutorials such as programming an interactive holiday card.


COAT DRIVE BENEFITS RAHWAY CHILDREN





RAHWAY IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR



Those residing in Rahway during the years of the American Revolution must have found life to be extremely difficult. Located between the Loyalist towns of Woodbridge and Perth Amboy to our south and Staten Island to our east, and rebel controlled territories to our north and west, Rahway was in a precarious position. Throughout the war years there were many accounts of harassment by marauding troops, but it was in the first half of 1777 that the inhabitants experienced "real war" within their borders.

For several months prior to 1777, General George Washington had been corresponding with Brigadier General William Maxwell, the officer in charge of this area, in regard to the control of the towns and settlements in Central Jersey. Washington continually stressed the importance of maintaining a sufficient militia made up of men from these places. This was no easy task since British troops were presently in control of much of the area and morale was low.

Washington's surprise attack victory at Trenton on the morning of December, 26, 1776 and his follow-up success at Princeton in early January,1777, however, did much to enliven the spirits of the militia. Washington could sense the tide of affairs swing his way and saw the opportunity to continue his offensive. Immediately after the Princeton battle, the general wrote Maxwell ordering him to gather as many men as possible and chase the British out of Central Jersey. Maxwell began his campaign by driving the British troops down from the Short Hills, through Newark, Springfield, and Elizabethtown, eventually fighting them at Spanktown.

The name Spanktown was in use only during the time of the revolution and was used with relative inconsistency. The derivation of the term might be explained by a number of theories or legends. The most popular relates that the militia marched through the town at a "spanking



rate" (quick trot) while in pursuit of the enemy. The term could also come from the theory that many homes had their roofs covered with a type of shingle called "spanking." Another tale has it that a Quaker preacher paddled his disobedient wife with a pancake turner one morning before breakfast. Regardless of how the name came about, it is the term found in the letters of Washington to his various commanders, used perhaps as a code name to confuse the enemy. Spanktown also appeared in newspaper accounts and on maps of the period.

By Sunday, January 5, Maxwell and a body of Jersey militia had driven the British as far south as the village of Spanktown. When the retreating forces reached the village they were reinforced by troops from Woodbridge and turned to make a stand. Maxwell was not to be denied a victory that day and was successful in forcing the enemy back. The two-hour battle was fought near what is today the Union County Park off St. Georges Avenue.

On Sunday morning, February 23, fifteen hundred British soldiers marched out of Perth Amboy in an attempt to secure a foothold in the area. Before entering Rahway, the British force split in half with one unit marching north towards the heart of the rebel camp and the other half flanking to the west. Even though the diversion was made, both columns met opposition as Maxwell's army had been alerted and was ready for the approaching army. The northern flank fell under fire as it moved along St. Georges Avenue, and was only able to get as far as the Robninson's branch of the river. The other column had moved up the New Brunswick/Trenton road (Route 27), but was unable to achieve a strategic purpose. Eight Americans were killed and several wounded in the battle which lasted twelve hours. The British lost close to 100 men who were killed or wounded.

The final engagement occurred on June 26-27. The British had been routed at Ash Swamp and were forced to retreat in a direction that took them right into Rahway where they entered at the intersection of Ross Street and St. Georges Avenue. The militia continued to pursue the British along Linden Avenue and drove them to the bridge at Monroe Street. After a sharp skirmish at the bridge, the enemy was pushed down Main Street to the point where Main Street and New Brunswick Avenue meet. At that fork, the redcoats were joined by a British division which had been fleeing from Ash Swamp by way of Lake Avenue. With the unexpected increase in numbers, the British turned on their pursuers and fought a battle which lasted two hours. The rebels were once again successful and forced the enemy to retreat, engaging in yet another skirmish in the area near the New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles Station.

This ended the serious fighting done in Rahway and, although the battles may seem insignificant, they were important for several reasons. The British were never able to take firm control over the area which made it more difficult when trying to accomplish anything further north or west. The victories also did a great deal to help keep the morale of the militia high and strengthened their resolve that independence and freedom could actually become a reality.
