They were also seeing an "interdisciplinary learning" experience that engaged more than 150 students, teachers, staff, parents, volunteers, and community supporters. According to school officials, the annual drama productions are being seen as vehicles to learn a whole host of skills.

Student actress Hannah Melillo made personal appearances as fully costumed and in-character Belle, to the delight of young children, who had pictures taken with her, and enjoyed various other typical Saturday Morning at the Library activities.

Then, at the WHRHS Library on April 1, the cast of costumed characters who appeared at the event expanded, since the student actors were preparing to take to the stage for the show's Saturday matinee. In addition to Belle, other characters appeared, including: "Beast," portrayed by Sam Sinnott; the enchanted candlestick, "Lamiere," portrayed by Jacob Lesser; the enchanted clock, "Cogsworth," portrayed by Scott Rmankow; "Gaston," portrayed by Will Johnson; and Enchanted Objects, "Knife" portrayed by Katie Napell, "Spoon," portrayed by Amelia Stapperfenne, and "Fork," portrayed by Claire Vickery."

In addition, members of the high school's Culinary Club baked, created, prepared and assembled a smorgasbord of treats for the children and their guardians. High school students in the Art Department and student volunteers led the children in craft-making activities. Students also provided face painting, temporary tattooing and hair braiding. Space was provided for story time activities in the Media Center.

The event was organized by the business manager of the Drama Department Theater Arts organization, Script and Cue -- WHRHS Business Teacher Dianne Krutz. She also engaged her business students

SIX TO BE INDUCTED INTO THE WHRHS HALL OF FAME ON MAY 12

Six alumni or staff will be inducted as the Class of 2017 members of the Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) Hall of Fame at 7 p.m., Friday, May 12, at the school's Performing Arts Center.

The general public is invited to attend the ceremony. Tickets are \$20, and may be purchased at the high school or at the door on the evening of the induction ceremony.

The new members to be inducted to the WHRHS Hall of Fame on May 12 are:

Juan Carlos Cruz: The beloved late former Spanish Teacher and JV Soccer Coach who died this past Fall, held a degree in Criminal Justice from Rutgers University, was on faculty at WHRHS for 12 years. Juan Carlos Cruz was JV Soccer Coach for that entire time. He had also been track coach for two years. In addition to teaching Spanish, he helped foreign students feel more welcomed when they visited here by showing them popular points of international interest, for instance, in Washington, D.C.

Stephanie Wriede Morawski: The 1988 WHRHS graduate was a highly decorated New Jersey State Champion swimmer at WHRHS, and a highly decorated Ivy League and NCAA All-American and swimmer at Harvard University. She is a 20-year swim coach at Harvard, who has guided The Crimson to numerous Ivy League achievements and honors. It was at Harvard last year, when the first transgender swimmer in NCAA Division 1 history successfully transitioned from being a female varsity swimmer to being a male varsity swimmer. Stephanie Morawski joined with other officials at Harvard in helping to facilitate that transition. This historic fete was profiled on a 60 Minutes

James J. Kanach: From 1980 to 2014, James Kanach was an esteemed teacher of English at WHRHS. He was named International Reading teacher of the year in 1986 as well as Watchung Hills Teacher of the Year in 1986. He was also a highly decorated, record-setting coach. He coached in 1,365 contests in multiple sports, for both boys and girls teams, and at all levels. He won Coach of the Year six times.

Robert (Bob) Beckert: Bob Beckert was a 1976 WHRHS graduate, who died in 2004, and was a highly decorated runner and member of the 1974 State Champion WHRHS Cross Country Team. He also competed in Track and Wrestling at WHRHS. He, his wife, Nancy, and their four children, all graduated from WHRHS. Bob Beckert was an active community volunteer, an active church volunteer, and a Sunday School teacher. He was a successful AT&T professional, and an avid lifetime recreational runner. His family organizes the annual Bob Beckert Memorial 5K run/walk every June at WHRHS, which has to date raised more than \$70,000 to fund scholarships available to all WHRHS seniors.

Ruth Schoenborn: A resident of Watchung for more than 30 years, Ruth Schoenborn was employed since 1957 as a Physical Education Teacher and Girls Basketball and Softball Coach at Watchung Hills, and retired in 1995. She was also coordinator of the Watchung Hills Adult School for 18 years, and involved with Klub House Kids, an afterschool daycare program in Watchung. She was a volunteer with the Watchung Rescue Squad, and a longtime member of Wilson Memorial Union Church in Watchung. Ruth passed in 2010.

Megan Kopecki: The 2007 four-year varsity letter winning WHRHS graduate was first girl to score more than 1,000 career points in basketball. Megan Kopecki led her team to multiple conference championships. At Scranton, she earned numerous awards, including being named All American twice, being named conference player of the year three times, and leading her team to the Elite Eight in the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament. She holds numerous basketball records. Her mark at WHRHS for most career points for a girls basketball player held until this year, when current WHRHS girls basketball player Julia Cunningham broke it.

A LONG STORY

Lengthening or stretching a tight Achilles tendon can be achieved surgically when nonsurgical attempts fail. Lack of sufficient motion in the ankle joint causes individuals to walk on their toes, putting undo pressure on the front of the foot and potentially causing ulcers to develop. Typically considered an outpatient procedure, local or general anesthesia is used. After accessing the back of the ankle through three tiny incisions, the partial cutting of Achilles tendon fibers (in conjunction with the stabilizing of the ankle) stretches the tendon. Healing generally takes up to eight weeks and usually entails wearing a cast, walking boot, or splint. This is followed by exercise to promote optimal range of motion and strength of the area.

branch. "The interesting characters are forced to deal with long-held secrets at a devastating time in our nation's history. This may sound like many other books you've heard about, but I can sincerely say I have never read a book quite like this one. Very original."

"Where the River Bends: The History of a Tragedy" is described as the story of a mother and son fighting to save themselves -- and each other -- from the destruction that sex, money, and power can cause, set in a turbulent and decisive period of American history.

Get to know Elissa Matthews

SCLSNJ: What inspired "Where the River Bends"?

EM: This story had two origins. First, I had a scene in my head where a teenage son realizes that his mother is an individual, with her own past. Second, I was horrified by the James Byrd event in Texas, where three white supremacists tortured and murdered a man because of his skin color. These combined to form the core of my story. The characters themselves took it the rest of the way.

SCLSNJ: How long did it take you to write the book?

EM: I worked on this novel on and off for many years. The historical research required a good deal of effort, at least a couple years. The overall writing took an additional two years.

SCLSNJ: Can we expect more books?

EM: Yes, indeed. I love writing and I have several short stories published in literary magazines, but also reprinted on my website (EPMatthews.com). I'm starting research on a second historical novel set in Egypt during the time of the Pharaohs.

SCLSNJ: What's your favorite book? EM: I don't have just one favorite book. I have

a favorite book when I'm in a serious mood, a favorite for a rainy day, a favorite childhood book, a favorite book to share with others...the list goes on.

SCLSNJ: Where is your favorite place to read?

EM: Anywhere in the woods, near a lake, or in a hammock under a tree. I think being outdoors makes me feel like I've truly escaped from the real world.

SCLSNJ: What's your favorite thing about the library?

EM: The very best thing of all about the library is that I can go in, pick out all the books that call out to me, and I don't have to choose between them - I can take them all!
