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TOWNSHIP OF CRANFORD MEMORIAL DAY SERVICE

Cranford's Memorial Day Parade was canceled due to rain. In its place a standing room only crowd attended a solemn service at the Community Center on Sunday, May 29th to honor and remember the citizens of Cranford who gave their lives in the armed forces of our country and to remind us all that our freedom, our liberty, our tremendous benefits and privileges that we enjoy and which we too often take for granted, are the result of blood, sweat, and sacrifice of those who have gone before us. Residents were invited to VFW Post #335 after the service for refreshments.

Cranford resident Peter Klein a World War II Veteran of the D-Day invasion in France was selected by Cranford's VFW Post #335 to be the Grand Marshall for the 2017 Memorial Day Parade. Post Commander Jay Boxwell stated "It is a great choice, as we have picked a true hero to lead us on this very important day. He is truly deserving of our recognition for his enduring, patriotic service to our country."

Klein, originally born in France, came to America as a 1 year old and settled with his family in Elizabeth, NJ. He was drafted into the Army in April, 1943 as the war was raging in Europe. He had originally wanted to be a pilot but because of his lack of citizenship at the time, he was denied. As a result he was made an infantryman and medic. Determined to be a citizen, in November 1943 while serving his adopted country, Klein proudly became a naturalized US citizen. Within 7 months of that, he was tending to wounded and dying soldiers on Omaha Beach at Normandy during the great D-Day invasion.

His Army record reads like an unbelievably incredible tale of dedication to our country. Klein fought with the 5th Corp at Omaha Beach, Normandy France, in Belgium and Luxembourg, at the Battle of the Bulge and the end of the war found him fighting in the famous Battle at Hurtgen, in the forests of Germany.

After the war Klein married his wife Theresa and eventually they moved to Cranford where they raised their two children Peter J. and Michael. His wife unfortunately passed away in 2009. Klein spent his post-war career as a chief estimator for 38 years at Saxon Construction Company, retiring in the 1980's.

Klein who received a standing ovation both before and after his remarks told the audience he remembered his experiences on the battle field even though it was 72 years ago. "I am so proud to be part of this great day. During the war I found myself in some terrible situations that I really don't like to talk about or even remember. But like all the

other young men with me, we just did our job," Klein said, showing a typically unassuming and modest attribute of the "Greatest Generation". Referring to the part of the service where the names of the war dead were read he stated "These are the people we have to remember, the people who gave their all."

Call for a Cure, a concert started in remembrance of Colin Maher, will be a 7:30pm Tuesday, June 6 at the Cranford High School. The concert, started by Cara Costa five years ago, will feature students and alumni from the talented Cranford community. Admission is \$10 at the door; \$5 for students. The concert is unique in that the students are given the freedom to choose their own music and performance, a choice they may not have had during the school year. For many, it will be the last time they are on the CHS stage.

"It is an honor to put together this show for the community and to fight Ewings Sarcoma," said this year's organizer, senior Catherine Hoffman. "Please come out and support us for Colin and for those who have to face this cancer."

All the money raised in ticket and bake sales goes to the Friends of Colin, a non-profit formed



to raise money specifically to fight Ewings Sarcoma, a pediatric bone cancer that is often fatal. It is rare but not uncommon and little money is dedicated towards research. Friends of Colin has donated tens of thousands to Dr. Jeffrey Toretsky, a Georgetown University researcher who currently has developed a drug going to clinical trials.

Friends of Colin was formed after the death of Colin Maher, a dry-witted 16-year-old Cranford resident who loved Pez, Halloween, turtles and his dog Casey. His close-knit neighbors came together and vowed to continue his fight until there is an effective treatment.

CHS graduate and dancer Alessandra LoConte was diagnosed with Ewings Sarcoma while studying at Muhlenberg college. She passed in 2015. Also that year, 16-year-old Arthur L. Johnson student, Tylor Collins, succumbed to the sarcoma.

Friends of Colin hopes that the Cranford and Ewings Sarcoma community can come together and put an end to the finality of this disease.

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POLICE OFFICERS HONOR FALLEN HEROES IN ANNUAL POLICE UNITY TOUR

Cranford Police officers proudly represented the township's police force in the Police Unity Tour bicycle ride to honor the sacrifices of police officers killed in the line of duty. Officers from around the United States and international officers from across the globe converged on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington D.C. on May 12, 2017. Four current officers and one retired officer participated in this year's ride. Captain Guy Patterson, Sergeant Joseph Stulpin, and Officer Daniel Donnerstag were joined by first year rider, Officer Matthew Siessel. Retired Lieutenant Robert Colaneri provided support for the four riders along their 300 mile trip. They departed New Jersey on May 9, 2017.

The Police Unity Tour was started by Chief Patrick P. Montuore of the Florham Park Police Department, with the hope of bringing public awareness of Police Officers who died in the line of duty and to honor their sacrifices. The first event included 18 riders on a four day fund-raising bicycle ride from Florham Park, NJ to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C. Over time, the event has grown to encompass nine chapter organizations consisting of over 2000 members nationwide. In addition to officers representing 40 different states, participants have traveled to the event from Australia, Canada, England, India, Israel and Italy.

Officers participating in the Police Unity Tour raise funds that are donated to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF). Captain Patterson, Sergeant Stulpin, Officer Donnerstag and Officer Siessel participated in the May 2016 event which resulted in over 2.5 Million Dollars being donated to the NLEOMF, bringing total donations to the fund since inception to over 20 Million Dollars. All five Cranford Officers have committed to raising over \$2,000 each through their participation in the tour. With the help of local businesses and organizations they had a great ride in 2017. The officers would like to thank Barry O'Donovan and Kilkenny House, Dottie Baniewicz and Barbara Bilger of the Cranford Chamber of Commerce, Cranford Jaycees, Cranford PBA Local # 52 and the Cranford PAL for their support.

According to Capt. Patterson, participation in the Police Unity Tour is a great opportunity to represent the Cranford Police Department and all the men and women in law enforcement across the country. "Having the ability to ride in honor of these fallen officers and their families is something none

of us take lightly. We pass thousands of people along our route to D.C. Overwhelmingly, people are extremely supportive. We can see the impact the sheer numbers of officers on bicycles passing by has on them. Making the ride into D.C. and raising the money for the NLEOMF and the families of fallen officers is always a rewarding experience." 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
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

UNDERSTANDING NEW JERSEY'S CHILD CUSTODY ARRANGEMENTS

In New Jersey, there are two basic concepts of child custody. The more familiar concept is "physical" custody which refers to where and with whom the child will live. When parents share "joint physical" custody, the child lives with each parent for a certain amount of time during the year. A parent with whom the child spends most of their time is designated as the Parent of Primary Residence ("PPR") or the primary caretaker. The parent with whom the child has time-sharing is designated as the Parent of Alternate Residence ("PAR") or secondary caretaker. Generally, unless there is a concern that the parent of alternate residence will harm the child, parenting time or visitation rights will not be withheld.

The less familiar but equally important concept is "legal" custody which refers to a parent's right to make decisions concerning their child, such as medical treatment, selection of healthcare providers, education, engaging in what might be considered hazardous activities and other significant decisions. In most cases, parents will have joint legal custody of a child and share the decision-making responsibilities. In some instances, however, the judge may award sole custody where only one parent has legal and physical custody. This is a relatively rare occurrence that is ordered only when the other parent is absent or legally unfit. A parent may be unfit if he or she has engaged in child abuse or neglect or is struggling with an addiction to alcohol or drugs. Absent such circumstances, a joint legal custodial relationship among parents is the preferred arrangement since it is likely to foster the best interests of the child.

A recent Court decision restated that "the prime criterion for establishing a joint legal custodial relationship between divorced or separated parents centers on the ability of those parents to agree, communicate, and cooperate in matters relating to the health, safety, and welfare of the child notwithstanding animosity or acrimony they may harbor towards each other. The ability of parents to put aside their personal differences and work together for the best interests of their child is the true measure of a healthy parent-child relationship."

Once the parties have agreed or a Court has ruled that they will have joint legal custody of their child, the issue becomes implementing and exercising such a joint custodial arrangement. Joint legal custody requires the parents to discuss and consult with each other regarding "major" decisions affecting the health, education and welfare of the child. Sometimes there is often a conflict as to what is a "major" decision versus a "day-to-day" decision. Such "day-to-day" decisions are generally determined by the primary custodian.

Major decisions can be as varied as the children they affect. The most common major decisions parents face are medical or health related issues of the child, choice or change of religious affiliation, choosing a summer camp, international travel, interstate travel for time-sharing when one parent has relocated, the appropriateness or cost of extracurricular activities, choice of private school and/or college, course of study or selection of major course of study at college, etc.

Unfortunately, the acrimony the parties displayed during the marriage does not always subside after the matter is resolved. The parents often continue the battle between themselves when discussing issues affecting their child. When discussion and compromise does not result in a resolution by the parties, our Courts are called upon to make decisions regarding these major issues regarding the child. This is seldom the best remedy.

KEAN TO HOST SEMINAR 'INTERNET OF THINGS'

The rapid expansion of digital technology has led businesses and consumers alike to question their security. On Thursday, June 8, the Cybersecurity Center at Kean University and the Union County Small Business Development Center will co-host The Internet of Things (IoT), a free seminar exploring the vast array of networked devices that surround us and the associated risks, from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. David Weinstein, New Jersey's first Chief Technology Officer, will deliver the keynote address at the event.

"Small businesses use technology to increase productivity and capabilities. Just imagine how loosing control over these necessities can set them back?" said David Margulies, Director, Union County SBDC at Kean University. "We all need to be well versed on how to best mitigate this risk to ensure business continuity."

The Internet of Things refers to the diverse array of networked devices, ranging from cars and kitchen appliances to heart monitors, able to collect and exchange data through embedded sensors. The seminar will explore potential risks the IoT poses to small businesses and best practices for securing networked devices.

"While smart devices and systems are making life easier for users, the steady adoption of the Internet of Things and the integration of more smart systems into critical infrastructures are making industries and consumers more vulnerable to attacks—possibly with lifethreatening repercussions," said Walter Rant, Managing Assistant Director, Cybersecurity Center at Kean University. David Weinstein was appointed New Jersey's first ever Chief Technology Officer by Governor Chris Christie in June of 2016. Weinstein serves in Governor Christie's cabinet, oversees the New Jersey Office of Information Technology (OIT), and is responsible for developing and implementing strategic policies, information security standards, and requirements for all state departments and agencies.

YOUR JOURNEY FROM MOURNING TO JOY

Cranford Alliance Church is again offering the GriefShare Series and Support Group on Thursdays at 6:30 PM from through August 31, 2017.

GriefShare is a special 14-week series and support group for people grieving the death of someone close. It's a place where you are surrounded by people who understand how you feel and the pain of your loss. At GriefShare, you'll learn valuable information that will help you through this most difficult time in your life as you journey through grief.

One of the participants from a previous series had this to say: "As I walked into my first session of GriefShare, I was taken aback by the sound of gentle music and the sight of candles on the tables. I still wondered how I could go from mourning to joy in thirteen weeks. Now that it is over, I see that that's exactly what happened. Years ago we'd lost our 25-year-old daughter to suicide. Within the last eighteen months I'd lost my mother and sister just a week apart, and then my beloved sister-in-law. My grief was overwhelming and I thought that my sadness would never end. It was during the GriefShare sessions that I met people who were just as devastated as I was, all with stories not so very different from my own. It was during these sessions that I came to learn that this was a profoundly moving journey that I had undertaken. Our facilitator was soft spoken,

gentle and compassionate. We were not only listened to but ministered to. In our grief, we were drawn closer to the Lord. We learned that 'God is close to the brokenhearted' and we learned how to cope with our grief. In an atmosphere of love and confidentiality, we grew to learn to open our hearts, share our stories, and allow ourselves to be healed. GriefShare was a profoundly moving journey; one that I feel was God's gift to us all. If you are suffering the loss of a loved one, no matter how long ago the death occurred, I highly recommend GriefShare, and the healing experience of feeling God within it all."

The ministry team consists of thoroughly trained, caring individuals who bring to this group their own experience of walking through grief. One participant had this to say about the Ministry Team, "They are amazing, caring people who provide for all of us what we cannot get from our families and friends. It is a safe place where we are understood."

now been found in New Jersey including Somerset and Middlesex counties and may now be in Union County.

If left untreated, an ash will likely be infected and killed by the Emerald Ash Borer. The dead ash tree will become brittle and dangerous. > Most CASA volunteers have no prior knowledge of the foster system and successful advocates have varied backgrounds that contribute toward success with the youth. For example, the most recent graduating class of CASA volunteers ranged from age 21 to 81 and had parents and non-parents, recent retirees, students, business professionals, a teacher, nurse, attorney, professor and homemakers. CASA volunteers train 30 hours to become an extra set of eyes and ears for Family Court judges. They have court-granted access to all parties in the child's life, including foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, and incorporate into court reports findings from these contacts as well as visits with the youth. Volunteers advocate in the community and court to ensure their youth's best interests remain a priority while working toward a safe, stable and permanent home for each child served.

> Today, there are 600 Union County children in foster care; CASA of Union County's goal is to provide an advocate for every foster child that needs one. 






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VERY SPECIAL "ALADDIN JR." Coming to Union County June 29-July 1



CRANFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT DESIGNATED SAFE HAVEN FOR NEWBORNS

The Cranford Township Committee recently authorized the Cranford Fire Department to volunteer as a designated Safe Haven for Newborns. This designation allows the Fire Department to participate in the NJ Safe Haven Infant Protection Act and provides a safe, staffed building where an individual can give up an infant safely, legally, and anonymously.

If an infant is dropped off, they will be quickly assessed by the Department's Emergency Medical Technician trained staff and provided any emergent medical treatment if needed. Then the child will be transported in an ambulance to the hospital, where care will be transferred to ER staff and eventually to the Division of Children and Family's Child Protection Unit.

Chief Daniel Czeh started this initiative several months ago, working with the NJ Division of Children and Families. "It's critical that we do everything we can to protect some of our most vulnerable citizens. This designation is a simple way we can use our resources help prevent tragedy."

The Safe Haven at Fire Headquarters, located at 7 Springfield Avenue in Cranford, is effective immediately. Specific questions regarding the Safe Haven program should be directed to the NJ Department of Children and Families.
