## COMMUNITY WELCOME AT ANNUAL SPRING ARTS FESTIVAL JUNE 5-7 AT WATCHUNG HILLS REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL

The annual Spring Arts Festival, a year-end celebration of the accomplishments in, and dedication to, the arts by students at Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS), will be held Monday, June 5, through Wednesday, June 7, at various exposition and performance spaces at the school.

The community is invited to attend the three-day festival, to witness exhibitions of 2 and 3-dimentional visual art as well as film screenings, theatrical, musical and choral performances involving students of all grades and levels. Admission is free.

### Monday, June 5

The festival kicks off at 5:30 p.m., with the visual arts opening.

Works in all mediums including drawings, paintings, photographs, ceramic works, sculptures, crafts, graphic design pieces and creations made from wood will be on display in the Atrium at the main entrance of the school and around the arts wing. These works will remain up for the duration of the festival.

Shakespeare in the Park begins at 6:30 p.m. Students will perform in an outdoor space, excerpts and monologues from a collection Shakespeare's greatest works, including "The Taming of the Shrew" and "A Midsummer Night's Dream."

#### Tuesday, June 6

The Spring Choral Concert will be held in the Performing Arts Center from 7 to 9 .m. This is on a different night of the week than it has been held in

the past. Students in the Chorus, Advanced Chorus, and Ensembles will be performing works by Green Day, Bruno Mars, Ray Charles, and Billy Joel, as well as songs from Broadway's "Hairspray," the film, "Pitch Perfect," and more.

### Wednesday, June 7

The South Auditorium will hold multiple short-film screenings starting at 5:30 p.m., and lasting through to 7 p.m.

The Spring Orchestra and Concert Band Concert will be held in the Performing Arts Center from 7 to 9 pm. The Orchestra will be playing a variety of music including Vivaldi's "4 Seasons with Spring," and the concert band's set will include "Salute to American Jazz," "Variations on America," and more.

## **QUAKER MEETING HOUSE**

June 13th marks the 240th anniversary of General George Washington's arrival in the afternoon at Washington Rock. He was looking for a place up upon the mountain where he could look for the movements of the British forces on the Plains below. Although often asked, that was not the origination of the name of Plainfield and related entities.

The predominant religion in this area was the Quakers or Friends. General Washington had stopped at the farm of Jonah (or John) Vail after the noon repast to find a mountain lookout. Edward FitzRandolph who guided the General up to Washington Rock and the farm owner and the workers were all Quakers. Not important other than to realize what the philosophy and lifestyle was of the occupants of this area in these years.

It wasn't until eleven years later that the Quakers moved their meeting house from Amboy (Perth Amboy ) to Plainfield. The group had been formally organized in 1686. So the Friends Meeting House was built in Plainfield in 1788. It may surprise you that this was even before George Washington was elected to be our first official President. The same Edward FitzRandolph that guided General George up to Washington Rock was on the committee to build the first Meeting House. Also contributing his labor as a carpenter to participate in the construction. The Meeting House has had several locations in Plainfield. But happily has resided at 225 Watchung Avenue for many years.

Shortly after 1900, Charles McCutcheon of Plainfield learned that Mr. Garretson who was operating the quarry on the mountain near the top of Washington Avenue had his eye on acquiring the land on the south side of the mountain to expand his operation. Being patriotic, McCutcheon realized that Washington Rock

> At the same time Mrs. McCutcheon was instrumental in organizing the Continental Chapter of the DAR in constructing the 1912 monument as we see today and raising the \$3,100 that it took to build it. They were Quakers. Their home, Dalnashea was operated as a Quaker retirement community into the 2000's.

> To summarize, the name Plainfield was not derived from the level farming fields referred to by the General as the "Plains" but actually for the Plain people or the Quaker influence that was so important at the time.

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### **KEAN TO HOST SEMINAR ON THE INTERNET OF THINGS**

The rapid expansion of digital technology has led businesses and consumers alike to question their security. On Thursday, June 8, the Cybersecurity Center at Kean University and the Union County Small Business Development Center will co-host The Internet of Things (IoT), a free seminar exploring the vast array of networked devices that surround us and the associated risks, from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. David Weinstein, New Jersey's first Chief Technology Officer, will deliver the keynote address at the event.

"Small businesses use technology to increase productivity and capabilities. Just imagine how loosing control over these necessities can set them back?" said David Margulies, Director, Union County SBDC at Kean University. "We all need to be well versed on how to best mitigate this risk to ensure business continuity."

The Internet of Things refers to the diverse array of networked devices, ranging from cars and kitchen appliances to heart monitors, able to collect and exchange data through embedded sensors. The seminar will explore potential risks the IoT poses to small businesses and best practices for securing networked devices.

"While smart devices and systems are making life easier for users, the steady adoption of the Internet of Things and the integration of more smart systems into critical infrastructures are making industries and consumers more vulnerable to attacks—possibly with lifethreatening repercussions," said Walter Rant, Managing Assistant Director, Cybersecurity Center at Kean University. David Weinstein was appointed New Jersey's first ever Chief Technology Officer by Governor Chris Christie in June of 2016. Weinstein serves in Governor Christie's cabinet, oversees the New Jersey Office of Information Technology (OIT), and is responsible for developing and implementing strategic policies, information security standards, and requirements for all state departments and agencies.

High school students in the Art Department and student volunteers led the children in craft-making activities. Students also provided face painting, temporary tattooing and hair braiding. Space was provided for story time activities in the Media Center.
