# **VOLUNTEERS RECOGNIZED DURING RESCUE SQUAD MONTH**

May is Rescue Squad Month, and the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad is proud to say that after 80 years, we are still serving the residents of Scotch Plains with an all-volunteer membership. Over the years, many rescue squads have either closed down or have been taken over by a paid service. But thanks to the generous contributions of our community, we continue to carry on the same as we have since 1937.

Even though our members aren't paid salaries, it takes quite a bit of money to support the high-level of service that we provide year after year. Monetary donations not only allow us to pay for necessities like bandages, oxygen tanks, and defibrillators, but they also mean we can regularly update and buy the latest and most reliable equipment and ambulances. This year, we are purchasing a new ambulance as well as the newly mandated communication devices. Just these two things will total over \$225,000. Thankfully, through our annual fund drive, we have had the finances to benefits our town, but these skills can be used wherever you cover these large expenses.

Besides big ticket items, we also have many other everyday expenses such as maintenance of our building and the cost of utilities. There are also insurance premiums, uniforms, gasoline for the ambulances and fire rehab vehicle, volunteering at scotchplainsrescuesquad@gmail.com or call and many other expenses that arise throughout the year.

We hope to continue to provide the best service, even though we have received many fewer donations and much less money over the last few years. Therefore, when you receive our fundraising letter, please consider giving whatever you can to this worthwhile organization.

Besides our monetary needs, we must also have volunteers to staff our ambulances to ensure we can respond in a timely manner. The rescue squad provides all necessary training and uniforms, so there is no cost to the member. Besides answering over 1,300 calls a year, we also stand by at many special events held in town, such as Scotch Plains Day, the Memorial Day Parade, high school football games, and the summer concerts on the Village Green. In addition, we provide demonstrations for Boys and Girls Scout troops, clubs, and any group that may be interested in what we do.

Becoming an Emergency Medical Technician not only are in a multitude of emergency situations. Instead of just being a bystander calling 911, you can actually save someone's life. There's no better feeling than that.

Astronomers, Inc. (AAI) in Cranford, to make

them user-friendly for beginners. Features

The Fanwood Scotch Plains Rotary Club recently donated two Orion Starblast 4.5 telescopes to Fanwood Memorial Library and the Scotch Plains Public Library which library patrons can check out with a library card. Rotarian Wayne Zuhl was inspired by an article he read in Sky & Telescope Magazine about an astronomy club in New Hampshire which successfully implemented a program to provide free telescopes to libraries. According to Zuhl, the program has been "well received by libraries and patrons alike," contributing more than 100 telescopes to libraries throughout the state.

The telescopes cost approximately \$400 each, including modifications specially designed by Wayne Zuhl and Jim Nordhausen of Amateur

include a star map, lens pen to clean the eyepiece, head light for hands-free illumination, and an instruction manual with step-by-step directions for using the telescope. Patrons will also find helpful info about the donor org. and AAI.

Fanwood and Scotch Plains Libraries will loan the telescopes to residents and "bring joy and the beauty of the night to everyone," said Zuhl. Each

library will have its own telescope so that aspiring astronomers can view the moon, planets, and other celestial wonders at their leisure.

Eventually, the Fanwood-Scotch Plains Rotary Club hopes to collaborate with other Rotary Clubs to expand the telescope project to include additional libraries in New Jersey. In true democratic spirit, future stargazers will soon have the opportunity to borrow a telescope with as much ease as a library book.







# WWW II VETS SELECTED TO BE CO-GRAND MARSHALS OF MEMORIAL DAY PARADE

Longtime Fanwood residents Joe Nagy and Ed Miller were honored during a memorial service held on Monday, May 29. They had been selected to serve as co-grand marshals of the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Memorial Day Parade which was canceled due to rain. Also honored was Alan Ebersole, who had accepted the honor to be a co-grand marshal this year but died in late April at age 94. The annual parade commemorates the sacrifices of fallen service men and women.

#### Joe Nagy

Joe Nagy spent two years in military training before the age of 20 to aid in America's efforts to win World War II.

The 94-year-old Nagy originally worked in nearby Perth Amboy in the clay industry before being drafted into the Army in 1943 and training in Fort Dix. From there, he spent 90 days in Texas working in the Tank Destroyer Battalion and later served in a unit in South Carolina. His South Carolina unit was dismantled in 1944, and then went to train in Mississippi to become an infantry replacement.

He was part of the occupying force in Japan. In September 1945 -- just one month after the atomic bomb was dropped -- Nagy's unit conducted operations to bring peace to Japan.

"Japan was badly devastated. Tokyo was almost nothing," continued Nagy. "(In Hiroshima) One bomb and 120,000 people disappeared. You really recognized the futility of war in that moment."

Nagy remained in the reserves for 23 years

when he returned home and eventually retired as a major.

#### **Ed Miller**

Ed Miller, originally a native of Kearny, New Jersey, had just finished high school when he was drafted into the Army Air Corps in 1943. Part of the sixth aircraft repair unit in San Antonio, following basic training and 17 weeks of machinist school, Miller worked alongside civilians in the biggest repair station of the army to ready equipment for the war.

"Right out of school, the Army needed machinists. In high school, I had worked for a fellow who made model airplane engines, so I luckily had a little experience," explained Miller.

Deployed to the Philippines in 1944, Miller was part of the 5th fighter squadron in support of the Chinese. Miller was assigned to the floating Air Depot of the Pacific to combat Japanese aggression in the South China Sea.

"We were there to support the invasion of Japan. That was our one and only focus," Miller said

Upon his return home following victory, Miller moved to Fanwood and worked manufacturing steel in nearby Garwood. He successfully earned his degree in math and science from Jersey City State College.

Congregation Beth Israel in Scotch Plains commemorated Holocaust Remembrance Day, known as Yom HaShaoh in Hebrew, on April 23, with presentations by Peter Fleischmann and Joel Lebowitz, who shared stories of their families' experiences as Holocaust survivors. About 70 people attended, including sixth and seventhgraders from Congregation Beth Israel's Religious School, as well as their families, fellow congregants and community members.

Peter Fleischmann, who is a member of Congregation Beth Israel, was born in the Sudetenland, the area of Czechoslovakia that, in 1938, was the first step in Hitler's expansion plans that eventually led to World War II. From 1938 to 1941, Peter and his family survived the Nazi occupation of Czechoslovakia and its restrictive Nuremberg laws, until they were given assistance by strangers to escape Prague and eventually make their way to New York.

Joel Lebowitz described how his family survived the Holocaust through the help of the Bielski Partisans, an organization of Jewish resistance fighters who hid in forests and fought back against Nazi occupiers. Operating in German-occupied Poland (now Belarus) between 1942 and 1944, the Bielski Partisans provided protection for Jews – including women, children and the elderly – enabling more than 1,200 Jews to survive the Holocaust.


