UHSPAC WINS 3 PAPER MILL RISING STAR AWARDS; ALSO FEATURED IN PBS DOCUMENTARY

The Union High School Performing Arts Company (UHSPAC) added to their accolades three Paper Mill Playhouse Rising Star (PMPRS) Awards for their spring production of Rodgers and Hammerstein's Cinderella. The show had been nominated for ten PMPRS Awards. Since their inception in 1996, the Paper Mill Playhouse Rising Star Awards for excellence in high school musical theatre have ignited the careers of many notable performers, all of whom attended high school in New Jersey.

The award ceremony was broadcast live on HomeTowne TV and featured a performance by the seven nominated schools for Outstanding Overall Production. The UHSPAC performed a medley of songs from Cinderella including "The Prince is Giving a Ball," and "Ten Minutes Ago." The beautifully executed performance featured Rising Star Nominee Jason Yanto as Lord Pinkleton, Crystal Wright as Cinderella, and an ensemble of dancers including Joseph Laurino as Prince Topher, who waltzed into the audience's hearts.

To be honored for their outstanding performance is icing on the cake of a wonderful production process with these student performers."

Director James Mosser added, "The Rising Star Awards presented by the Tony Award Winning Paper Mill Playhouse are one of the premier programs for theatre recognition in the country. It is always a pleasure to be recognized as one of top programs in the state. The highlight is watching our students perform on the Paper Mill stage. I could not be more proud of our students."

Weeks before, the UHSPAC boasted participation in another television broadcast. The world had the opportunity

They had been selected as one of six schools to be featured for excellence in theater education. Last year, camera crews followed them around as they mounted their production of Disney's Mary Poppins.

The documentary featured rehearsal and performance footage from the show, as well as exclusive interviews with Director James Mosser and UHSPAC Alumni, Jonathan Duvelson who starred as Bert.

Duvelson currently is a BFA Musical Theater major at Montclair State University and shared, "I am so fortunate that I am able to be featured in this documentary, and that I can show people just how hard we, as theater people, work to make the shows great. Being in the Performing Arts Department at Union High School allowed me to transition into college with ease, and to excel past what is expected, and challenge myself to be better every day."

"It was a very fun experience for all of us to have a camera crew follow us around," added Director Mosser. "The documentary gives a nice insight into how hard our students work, and how much it means to them. I'm incredibly proud of how we are represented in this film."

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
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UNION INVESTS IN DOWNTOWN WITH DEVELOPMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS

Residents will soon see a dramatic change in additional taxpayer dollars. Union Center as the Township of Union Planning Board recently approved an application from American Landmark Developers to develop 300 linear feet of Stuyvesant Ave starting at Terminal Mill Ends and moving towards Unity Bank. The development will include new retail and residential spaces.

The move comes on the cusp of the start of the Stuyvesant Ave Streetscape Project, a complete overhaul of the street, curbs, sidewalks and street fixtures on the busy thoroughfare; all in an effort to turn Union Center into a focal point for a new lifestyle experience.

"We know that the topic of conversation for quite some time has been with regard to revitalization," said Mayor Suzette Cavadas.

Union Center is frequently remembered as a hub for community and quality shopping. But after years of wear, and then the online shopping boom, the Center has been in need of some new energy.

Sara Perara and her brother Rob have owned "Van Gogh's Ear," a popular café in Union Center for almost 8 years. In discussing the coming transformation she notes that they thought long and hard about moving after their first year in business.

"In the end we decided to stick it out," Perara said, "I am so thrilled we made that decision. With the Streetscape Project and the prospect of putting more apartments in we can finally thrive instead of just getting by."

Township Administrator Ron Manzella noted that the Township Committee and Administration have been at the table discussing how to transform Union Center for a number of years.

"What people don't seem to understand is that there were some very fundamental, and costly issues that needed to be dealt with before we jumped into redevelopment and beautification," Manzella said.

Some of those issues included upgrades to water and gas lines that, if not done prior to the Streetscape project, would have left the road vulnerable to disrepair and eventually cost

With those upgrades recently completed, one can now see various stages of work in different areas of the Center. Phase one of the Stuyvesant Ave Streetscape project which spans Vauxhall Rd. to Morris Ave. is currently ongoing with improvements to include historic granite bands at mid-block crossings, new light poles, and new furniture which will be coming in early fall, and full reconstruction and repaving of the street taking place in the late fall. Phase two, which spans Morris Ave to the Cannon at the end of Stuyvesant Ave, is scheduled to begin in the Spring of 2018.

The beautification and upgraded infrastructure are reportedly the first steps in making Union Center more marketable to new and existing businesses; and according to Mayor Cavadas the results are already taking root.

She noted businesses that recently opened like "Norma's Flowers," "Vision Eyewear" and "Care Pharmacy;" and mentioned a host of others including the soon-to-come opening of "Kung Fu Tea," "Beauty Supply Store," "Bed, Bath and Body," "Jammed up" an expansion of "Van Gogh's Ear," and a new medical building opening across from "Stop n' Shop" on Stuyvesant Ave later on this summer.

The application from American Landmark

Developers is part of the second step in the process, geared at addressing the lack of foot traffic in the area by creating a built-in community of shoppers with a development model the likes of Cara Lofts at the intersection of Morris and Stuyvesant Avenues.

"This project is an ambitious one," said Ruben Peraza, owner of the popular ice cream spot "Magic Fountain" at a recent Planning Board meeting. "I believe in this town and believe that it's coming back to life," Peraza continued "its progress and revitalization that we need in this town."

Cara Lofts opened in 2014; its success sparked a second mixed use development across from Stop n' Shop and O'Lagar Restaurant which broke ground late last year. Both include a mix of retail and residential spaces with the second project expected to be completed this fall. The American Landmark Developers Project will utilize the same model with construction beginning late this year.

"In essence, we are creating a neighborhood downtown, where people who live in Union Center will also shop, eat and spend their leisure time there. This, combined with a new ambiance and an aggressive push for higher caliber retailers, is certain to give the Center the energy that it needs to thrive," Cavadas said.

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STUDENTS PRESENT INNOVATIVE MEDICAL DEVICE

Kean University computer science students Claudia Fortes of Union, Andrey Suvorov of Edison, and Peter Krivoshik of Ringoes presented at What's Next in Medical Devices, an NJ Tech Council event, on Tuesday, June 13 at Princeton University. Kean computer science professor Jenny Li, Ph.D., and her students developed LifeLine – an autonomous life-saving device – in collaboration with researchers from Carnegie Mellon University. Kean was one of only four colleges selected to present, and the only undergraduate program featured. Kean's School of Computer Science is dedicated to promoting undergraduate research, faculty and student collaboration, and applied research outcomes.

"LifeLine is an essential autonomous lifesaving device that utilizes AI technology to automate health device operation without human intervention. Its uniqueness lies in its automatic detection and operation," said Li. "The tech council event provided our research and innovation with recognition from both academia and industry." LifeLine utilizes an accelerometer with heat sensors, artificial intelligence (AI), and machine learning algorithms to detect life-threatening conditions and send alarm signals through various communication channels within milliseconds of detection. Unlike similar devices currently on the market, LifeLine automatically calls for help, increasing the speed of response without the need for patient action.

"The work that went into creating LifeLine in anticipation for the NJ Tech Counsel's event was tireless and stretched all of our combined expertise to the limits," said Krivoshik.

The NJ Tech Council provides business development, education, networking and recognition opportunities as well as advocacy for the state's technology businesses. Founded in 1996, the council is a private, nonprofit membership organization, which supports technology, innovation, and entrepreneurship across the state and region. Each May, the Tech Council hosts the HealthTech Conference, which highlights how technology is transforming the healthcare industry. Events like What's Next in

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Medical Devices help to nurture the technology, and aide the STEM talent pipeline – both of which are critical to the continued growth of industry in New Jersey.


"Volunteers are the heart and soul of Imagine and we could not be more grateful to all of the people who take on this commitment," said Mary Robinson, Imagine Executive Director.

KAWAMEEH'S TRIBE GOES "ALL IN"

On Thursday, June 15th, Kawameeh Middle School students attended an assembly provided by the School Counseling Department in conjunction with the Municipal Drug Alliance in which students heard motivational speaker Gian Paul Gonzalez talk about being "All In". This is a phrase that has become popularized over the past few years as Gonzalez has talked to several sports teams, including the New York Giants, various corporate companies, including WalMart, and visited several schools throughout the area. His main message is that everything you are doing should be one hundred percent and you should try your hardest at everything despite mistakes or obstacles along the way.

The assembly addressed various topics including doing your best not only in school but in daily life. Students enjoyed listening to Gian Paul as he illustrated his point by telling them stories of his experiences growing up, including being drafted for the NBA. He said, "being all in

isn't about the time you have but what you do with the time you put in. Even if it's only five minutes a day." He explained that there will always be excuses or people to blame but ultimately it is up to you to be all in. One student stated, "I learned that when I start something I need to finish it. Like I thought about quitting soccer but then I realized how far my team had made it so I decided to finish out the season with them."

It is the hope of the staff and administration that the assembly will not only encourage students to try their best but also to avoid missteps such as illegal drug and alcohol use. In the event that students do stumble, Gian Paul reminds the students tha, "You can make a mistake, but you being born is never a mistake," and to refocus on what is important to them. It is important for the youth in schools to understand that although they are constantly exposed to drugs and alcohol that this is not the route to

chose and they can be as successful as they chose in life if they avoid these negative influences.

In addition to the regular assembly that was presented to all students, chosen seventh grade students participated in a small leadership session in which students discussed the importance of being a leader in addition to the hardships that may come with such a position. He explained that it is not always easy to do the right thing and expect others to follow but to stay committed to what is important and proceed down the path which is of interest to them.

Overall, the assembly was a success, not only stressing the importance of avoiding drug and alcohol use but also by motivating the students in other areas of their lives. Additionally, many of the staff members felt moved by the stories and lessons provided and are hoping to incorporate Gian Paul's "All In" into their classrooms during the next school year.

In May 2016, Christina and Michael Lacerda, and their daughter, experienced a life-shattering event: 39-year-old Mike suffered a ruptured brain aneurysm, followed by three strokes. The young dad survived, but was left incapacitated, and unable to work, drive, or take care of himself.

The tragedy has also left the family financially devastated. They are struggling to pay \$2400 a month for Cobra coverage for Mike's therapy, prescriptions, and doctors' visits.

They are also in jeopardy of losing their home, and cannot afford it on one salary. The Lacerda family has wiped out all of their savings for medical bills. Meanwhile, they are still waiting to hear if Mike is eligible for disability.

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


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
