On Saturday, September 9th, Imagine held its sixth youth facilitator training. 18 amazing young people, ages 14 to 18, attended the full day training which sensitizes teen participants to the issue of childhood grief and prepares the youth to assist with the facilitation of peer-support groups for children who are coping with the death of a parent or a sibling. Through the development of listening and facilitating skills, these teens are now prepared to be loving listeners, group facilitators and advocates for grieving children in their community.

"We are so grateful for the participation of these youth. The teens bring wisdom, youthful energy and a wonderful presence and skill set to our volunteer program and grief support groups, facilitating groups right along with the adult volunteer facilitators," said Connie Palmer, Imagine Clinical Training Director. "We've been working with teen facilitators since 2012 and they have added a profound and powerful aspect to our programs."

Imagine provides free year-round peer support groups for children age 3-18 who have had a parent or sibling die, with concurrent groups for parents and guardians. Free support groups are also available for young adults 18 and up who have had a friend, sibling or parent die. Imagine also provides inhome support and support groups for children and teens who have a family member living with a life-altering physical illness. 


beautiful flowers and trees shown. Arline has written many books including: "New Jersey Bicycle Tours, 'Great Gardens" and Best Hikes With Children."



WESTFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT WELCOMES GRADUATING CLASS OF 2030

The sun peeked out just long enough for members of the Westfield High School graduating class of 2030 to take turns posing in front of Lincoln School's sign before beginning



their first day in kindergarten on September 6. A A BUBBLY ENTRANCE total of 203 kindergarten students are among the 6,317 Pre-K – 12th graders enrolled in the Westfield Public Schools for the 2017-2018 school year. "All 10 schools were ready for our students," remarked Superintendent Margaret Dolan. "We are excited to welcome all of our students, including our youngest learners at Lincoln School."

The threat of rain did not dampen the spirit of Lincoln School Pre-K teacher Andrea Taylor who greeted all of the children approaching the school on their first day with celebratory bubbles. Kindergartner Siddhant appreciated the special reception, and was welcomed next by Principal Audrey Zavetz who met each child entering the school.





ESTABLISHING, REVISING AND ENFORCING TIME-SHARING WITH CHILDREN

In all cases of divorce or separation where children are involved, the issue of time-sharing (previously referred to as "visitation") is a significant issue to be addressed. Unless the parents have agreed to an equal shared custodial arrangement, an appropriate schedule of timesharing is particularly important for all those involved: the custodial parent, the non-custodial parent, and the children.

Determining a schedule of time-sharing with the children is sometimes resolved between the parties. However, in those cases where the parties are unable to do so, the Court will order mediation in an attempt to resolve the issue. If the mediation is unsuccessful, the Court will (and has the authority to) determine the time-sharing schedule which will be binding on all involved.

Traditionally, time-sharing consisted of alternate weekend overnights for the non-custodial parent, a division of legal and religious holidays, extended time during the summer, and perhaps one evening per week for dinner. Recently, time-sharing schedules have become more flexible with non-custodial parents demanding (and receiving) more time with their children. Busy work schedules for the parents and academic and activity schedules for the children demand a more fine-tuned approach to time-

When discussing this issue it is important for all involved to have an understanding of how it will work in real life. Individuals who use terms that state "time-sharing shall be reasonable and liberal" or "as the parties may agree" find that disputes almost always arise in the future. Specificity as to which days and nights the children will be with which parent, times for pick-up and drop-off, birthdays and holidays all need to be included in the schedule together with an acknowledgment that flexibility in scheduling is in everyone's best interest.

Over the course of time as children become older or as parents

relocate, there may need to be changes to the existing time-sharing schedule. When the parties mutually agree to modify the existing timesharing schedule, the revised schedule should always be in writing preferably in the form of a Court Order to ensure there are no misunderstandings in the future. If the parties cannot agree to modify the existing time-sharing schedule, the matter is best handled by a Courtapproved mediator before resorting to filing papers with the Court.

Family lawyers also confront the situation where there has been a refusal to comply with the existing time-sharing schedule or direct interference with the custodial rights of a parent. Interference can be anything that frustrates the parent's right to spend meaningful time with their children. New Jersey law provides remedies in the event the Court finds that there has been a frustration of, or interference with, the timesharing schedule. The Court has a great deal of latitude to correct such a situation including, but not limited to: (a) ordering "make-up" parenting time; (b) requiring the parent who has interfered to pay any costs which may have resulted from the interference; (c) modifying the time-sharing schedule temporarily or permanently; (d) changing which parent shall be responsible for transporting the children for the scheduled time-sharing; or (e) requiring the parent who frustrates the time-sharing schedule to perform community service. Judges are firm believers in compelling enforcement of Orders regarding the relationship between parent and child.

95.5% OF WESTFIELD HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES CONTINUING EDUCATION

A total of 95.5 percent of the Westfield High School (WHS) graduates of 2017 are pursuing a higher education this fall. According to a report released by the WHS Office of Counseling Services, 401 students are continuing their education with 91% attending four-year colleges and universities, 3.8 % attending two-year colleges, and .7% entering vocational, business and other post high school institutions. The remaining graduates have entered the work force, are taking a year off, or had future plans that were undecided.

The class of 2017 – having earned a 99.3% graduation rate — is attending a significant list of 148 colleges and universities in 33 states as well as one in France.

The most popular out-of-state colleges and universities selected by this year's graduates include: Virginia Tech (12 students); Indiana University (12); New York University (11); University of Pittsburgh (10); Penn State University (9); Northeastern University (9); and University of Delaware (9). Ten graduates are attending five Ivy League schools: Brown, Columbia, Cornell, University of Pennsylvania and Princeton.

A total of 61 WHS graduates are continuing their education in New Jersey, with 47 attending four-year colleges and universities and 14 entering two-year colleges.

The most widely attended 4-year New Jersey school is Rutgers University with 15 WHS

graduates, followed by Seton Hall, Rowan and Kean, where 6 grads are enrolled in each. Looking at two-year secondary institutions, Union County College welcomed 12 WHS graduates this fall.

In summarizing the report to the Board of Education on September 19, Margaret Dolan, Superintendent of Schools, commented that she wished all the graduates much success and encouraged them to keep the district informed of how they are doing and of any suggestions they might have.

JAZZY 1920'S WHODUNNIT THE WILD PARTY OPENS 99TH SEASON AT CDC THEATRE

In Andrew Lippa's The Wild Party, decadence and excess roar across the stage in this steamy prohibition tale based on Joseph Moncure March's 1928 narrative poem of the same name. Capturing the sound of a bygone era with a nod to the present one, he makes us realize that moral decadence is not only limited to our past.

Bagger, an adoptive and biological mother, and wife to former state Sen. Richard Bagger, formerly practiced law. Her four CASA youth have histories of substance abuse, homelessness, medical and educational needs, sexual and physical abuse, and neglect. After 14 court appearances, the judge has accepted 56 of Bagger's 71 recommendations. Prior to Robinson's decade of board work focused on

fundraising, assisting at events and guiding the nonprofit's growth, she trained as an advocate in Morris County and advocated for a teen with Tourette's Syndrome and ADHD, and a pair of siblings whose parents were jailed for abuse. Marité's language prowess as an interpreter and language teacher were critical when the youth were placed in a Spanish-speaking home.

CASA of Union County recruits, trains, supervises and supports community volunteers to be the voice for children removed from home and placed into foster care due to abuse, neglect or abandonment. Trained volunteers are sworn in as advocates by a Union County family judge and empowered by court order to contact foster parents, teachers, doctors and therapists involved with the child. Advocates spend time with their youth regularly and report findings to the judge to ensure needs are met and best interests remain a priority.


