

- Shopping local dollars stay local-going local with your spending by supporting locally owned, independent businesses causes a "multiplier-effect" that keeps more money circulating in our community. The Andersonville Study of Retail Economics found that as much as 68 out of \$100 spent in local independent businesses stays local, compared to only 43 out of \$100 spent in chain stores. Local businesses are also more likely to source supplies and services from other local businesses.




