





## ALLEN GAVILANES NAMED SOCCER OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR & ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

Marist men's soccer freshman Allen Gavilanes (North Plainfield, NJ/St Benedict's Prep) was named the 2017 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference men's soccer Offensive Player of the Year as well as the MAAC Rookie of the Year as voted by the league's 11 head coaches and announced during the conference's post season awards show held recently.

The accolades mark the first two major awards of Gavilanes' career, mark the first time since 2003 that the same player was named MAAC Offensive Player of the Year and MAAC Rookie of the Year in the same season (Omar Alfonso, Loyola (MD), 2003) and is the second consecutive Offensive Player of the Year Award for the Red Foxes (Cameron Harr, 2016).

In addition to winning the two major awards, he was also a unanimous selection to the All-MAAC First Team and All-MAAC Rookie Team, the only unanimous selection on the First Team and one of only two unanimous selections on the All-Rookie Team.

Along with Gavilanes' awards, 10 Red Foxes were also named to the MAAC All-Academic Team, the most of any school in the conference. To be eligible for the MAAC All-Academic team, a student-athlete must have completed two semesters at their institution and hold a cumulative grade point average of 3.20 on a 4.0 scale.



### HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS FROM POLICE CHIEF WILLIAM G. PARENTI

The following Holiday Safety Tips were compiled to contribute to the safety and security of people during the holiday season. The holiday season is always a special time of year. It is also a time when busy people become careless and vulnerable to theft and other holiday crime. We can never be too careful, too prepared or too aware. Please share this information with family, friends and neighbors. The North Plainfield Police Department wishes you a safe, happy and peaceful holiday season.

#### Driving

- Avoid driving alone or at night.
- Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car. Set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- If you must shop at night, park in a well-lighted
- Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows.
- Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.
- Never leave your car unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.
- Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the car, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.
- Be sure to locate your keys prior to going to your car
- Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the car in order to open the door.
- When approaching or leaving your vehicle, be aware of your surroundings.
- Do not approach your car alone if there are suspicious people in the area.
- Ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.

#### **Automated Teller Machine (ATM)**

- If you must use an ATM, choose one that is located inside or in a well-lighted location. Withdraw only the amount of cash you need.
- Protect your PIN by shielding the ATM keypad from anyone who is standing near you.
- Do not throw your ATM receipt away at the ATM location.

#### **Shopping**

- Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.
- Dress casually and comfortably.
- Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.
- Do not carry a purse or wallet, if possible.
- Always carry your New Jersey Driver's License along with necessary cash, checks and/or a credit card you expect to use.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible.
- Keep cash in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- Keep a record of all of your credit card numbers in a safe place at home.
- Be extra careful if you do carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas and restaurants.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.
- Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.

#### Children

- If possible, leave small children at home with a trusted babysitter.
- Teach your child to go to a store clerk and ask for help in case your child is separated from
- Teach children to stay close to you at all times while shopping.
- Never allow children to make unaccompanied trips to the restroom.
- Children should never be allowed to go to the car alone and they should never be left alone in the car.
- Teach children their full name, address and telephone number to give to police officers or mall security. Teach children to immediately inform you if a stranger is bothering them.

#### At Home

- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, even for a few minutes.
- When leaving home for an extended time, have

- a neighbor or family member watch your house and pick up your newspapers, mail and delivered packages.
- Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.
- Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.
- When setting up a Christmas tree or other holiday display, make sure doors and passageways are clear inside your home.
- Be sure your Christmas tree is mounted on a sturdy base so children, elderly persons or family pets cannot pull it over on themselves.
- If you use lights on your Christmas tree ensure the wiring is not damaged or frayed. Frayed or damaged wiring can cause a fire.
- Place your Christmas tree in water to keep it green.
- Never place wrapping paper in your fireplace.

#### **Strangers at Your Door**

- Be aware that criminals sometimes pose as couriers delivering gifts.
- It is not uncommon for criminals to take advantage of the generosity of people during the holiday season by soliciting donations doorto-door for charitable causes although no charity is involved.
- Ask for their identification, and find out how the donated funds will be used. If you are not satisfied, do not donate.
- Donate to a recognized charitable organization.

#### **Hosting a Party**

- Have non-alcoholic beverages available for party guests.
- Find alternative transportation for intoxicated guests.
- Arrange for an official designated driver for your party who will not drink at all.

#### **Attending a Party**

- Have something to eat before consuming alcoholic beverages.
- Eat high protein foods that will stay in your stomach longer and slow the absorption of alcohol into your system.
- Remember only time will eliminate the alcohol from your body.
- Know your safe limit.
- Never drink and drive.
- Take a taxi or Ride Sharing service e.g. Uber or Lyft.

## WILLIAM F. EATON, FIRE CHIEF/DIRECTOR, NORTH PLAINFIELD FIRE DEPT.

The North Plainfield Fire Department participated with the American Red Cross on Saturday, November 4th in their Home Fire Safety initiative. This event involved a few dozen volunteers from the Red Cross who teamed up with our fire department personnel to install smoke detectors in the homes of local residents in a pre-established target area. The Red Cross crews went out ahead of the firefighters to canvass our downtown area and all blocks within

that part of town. They knocked on doors to determine which residents were interested in having smoke detectors installed in their homes. As specific doors/homes were identified, fire department personnel, including some of our volunteer call force members, performed the installations in those homes. This took most of the day that Saturday and just shy of 100 detectors were installed in total.

### **SAFE + SOUND SOMERSET ENDING DOMESTIC ABUSE ONCE AND FOR ALL**

Domestic abuse is an epidemic affecting individuals in our communities, accompanied by a pattern of abusive behaviors that are used to gain or maintain power and control over a partner; physical violence, sexual assault, financial control, threats, intimidation, isolation and verbal abuse are methods an abusive partner uses to gain control.

Leaving an abusive relationship is not easy and poses threats to the victim and their family and friends. The victim may still be in love with the abuser, in hopes that the situation will change. Feelings of guilt and remorse may overcome the victim as they evaluate leaving the relationship, especially if they have children.

In other cases, the victim may be afraid to leave because of threatening or harassing behavior. Leaving becomes even more difficult if they do not have an independent source of income or the support of family and friends.

Safe+Sound Somerset, a nonprofit agency whose mission is to empower survivors of domestic abuse and engage the community to break the cycle of violence, provides specialized crisis and ongoing supportive services for victims of domestic abuse and their children throughout Somerset County. Safe+Sound Somerset offers a comprehensive range of services to adults and children, including a 24-hour toll-free Call or Text Crisis Hotline, (866) 685-1122.

Safe+Sound Somerset provides safe-house protection, transitional housing and support to victims of domestic abuse, individual or group counseling and legal advocacy.

The overall goal is to empower clients with tools to increase their safety and reduce the risk of future harm to themselves and their children. Ultimately, clients and their children have the capacity to live free from abuse.

Safe+Sound Somerset's Community Education Program provides information to the diverse populations within the County about the dynamics of domestic abuse, teen dating violence and the agency's programs.

All client services, community education and training are provided free of charge in English and Spanish. Safe+Sound Somerset exclusively dedicated to serving those whose lives have been impacted by domestic abuse.

As a round-the-clock program, Safe+Sound Somerset stands ready to help by providing a safe, supportive and empowering environment that promotes healing and assists individuals as they move forward in their journey from victims to survivors. Confidential services are provided to all survivors of domestic abuse – women, men and children.


