

SCOTCH PLAINS NAMES 'CASA DAY'

Scotch Plains Mayor, Al Smith, and the Town Council declared December 12 to be Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Union County Day during a town hall ceremony held last month. The ceremony, held in Council Chambers at Municipal Hall, included a presentation of a signed proclamation. Several Scotch Plains residents who are active volunteers with CASA attended in support of the dedication, including Carmen Ayala, Jennifer Brady, Sheri Glover-Flanagan, Linda Jenkins-Davis, Geraldine Keogh (who also serves on the board of directors), Laurie Rando, and Christie Rothenberg.

Executive Director Marla Higginbotham stated, "We are so grateful to Mayor Smith and the town council for recognizing not only the crucial work of CASA advocates for Union County's foster youth, but for seeing the bigger picture. Every one of our communities has children removed from home and placed in foster care through no fault of their own, and every community has the power to stand up. If each of the twenty-one towns in Union County represented like Scotch Plains — which right now has twelve residents advocating for foster youth — just imagine what could be accomplished! Being a CASA volunteer, serving as extra eyes and ears for the judge, is meaningful, powerful, and life-changing on both sides. Thank you, Scotch Plains, for CASA Day!"

CASA of Union County recruits, trains, supervises and supports community volunteers to advocate for abused, neglected and abandoned children placed in foster homes or residential facilities. There are nearly 600 Union County children, from birth to age 21, in foster care, and the nonprofit advocates for half of these youth. Volunteers ensure children's best interests remain the priority while working toward establishing a safe, stable, and permanent home for each child. The organization's goal is to provide a CASA volunteer for every foster youth.





Now, if you've read this far, you may be asking yourself – how can this woman work so much and still have time to edit 21 newspapers? As Joe Renna himself says – "It's not work, it's a lifestyle." I somehow get everything done ... and with a big smile on my face.







The synagogue conducted a six-week coat drive, during which congregants donated new
































GWACC MOVES HEADQUARTERS





SCOTCH PLAINS ROCK STAR, PAT DINIZIO, DIES AT 62

Tuesday, December 12, 2017, Pat DiNizio, first musicians to support XM Satellite Radio, front man of The Smithereens, died at the age of 62. Causes of his death were not immediately revealed, though it was known he was suffering from health complications over the past few years, including nerve damage. But he continued Leisure."

A resident of Scotch Plains, the lead singer and songwriter formed The Smithereens in 1980 with bandmates Jim Babjak, Dennis Diken, and Mike Mesaros.

to perform with his arm in a sling.

Throughout the late 1980s and early 1990s they sold millions of records/CDs of their melodic pop alternative hits like, "A Girl Like You," "Only a Memory," "Behind the Wall of Sleep," and "Blood and Roses."

The video for "Blood and Roses" had moderate rotation on MTV. "Blood and Roses" was also featured on the 1980s TV show "Miami Vice." Other tunes were scored in many movie soundtracks.

The Smithereens' music also made its way into many New Jersey nightclubs such as Aldo's in Lyndhurst and The Loop Lounge in Passaic. They also played at New Jersey's original music club The Dirt Club, in Bloomfield, before their career skyrocketed.

In 1990 "A Girl Like You" broke into the Top 40, reaching No. 38 on the Billboard pop charts.

Throughout the years, The Smithereens toursupported bands like the Pretenders, Tom Petty, and Bruce Springsteen.

DiNizio released several solo albums and in 2001 he launched his "Living Room Tour," where he'd perform at the homes of fans, by request. That same year, he was also one of the hearts – much more than "a memory."

In later years, DiNizio continued performing both with The Smithereens and acoustic solo shows. In 2015 he'd appear on a weekly basis at Crossroads in Garwood, performing intimate sets paying homage to bands like The Monkees, The Rolling Stones, The Beatles, and The Who.

DiNizio, was not only a prolific songwriter, but also a fine storyteller. As he shared great tales in between songs at these informal shows, it was like getting a private basement rehearsal show. Afterwards, as always, he was accessible, casually chatting with fans and friends.

A diehard fan of The Who, DiNizio showed up at the Fanwood Library in 2015 when author Michael Rosenbloom, who wrote "When Stars Were in Reach," gave a presentation about The Who performing at Union Catholic High School in Scotch Plains back in 1967. From the audience, DiNizio participated by sharing anecdotes about being a music fan growing up.

Scotch Plains was dear to DiNizio. He lived in other places - England, Chicago, L.A., and New Orleans for a bit, but resided in Scotch Plains until his death. In 2010, he told The Aquarian Arts Weekly that it was the only place in the world he felt "centered" and that "New Jersey is my home."

Condolences to his family, close friends, and bandmates. DiNizio's music will live on in our

SIMULATION DRIVES HOME MESSAGE OF SAFE DRIVING

If you drove past Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School last month you might have thought that there was a traffic accident on Happel Court. In fact, it was a drill brought about by the efforts of the Scotch Plains and Fanwood Police Departments, the Scotch Plains Fire Department, the Fanwood Rescue Squad, the Municipal Alliance Committee, the Scotch Plains-Fanwood PTA Chemical Dependency Committee, and DECA, the co-curricular Marketing Club of Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School. The purpose of this drill was for the senior class at the high school to witness a simulation of the loss of life and injury that happens when driving while distracted or under the influence.

The Raider's Don't Risk It Project was the brainchild of Marjorie Fitzgibbon, DECA Advisor, and SPFHS student Catie Currie, DECA Executive Vice-President who spearheaded the involvement of the DECA Club members.

Throughout the school day, seniors went out to Happel Court during their Health and PE classes and watched the events unfold immediately as if there had been a crash. Students were able to witness a reality-based portrayal of the aftermath of the crash and the response by law enforcement, emergency personnel and family members. The

event was to remind the seniors of the risks and legal ramifications of driving while under the influence or distracted as in texting, using a cell phone, or horse playing. Seniors Caitlin Bourke, Ryan Lopez, and Nate Redmount played the roles of the students in the vehicle. PTA volunteers Dawn Smith, Jennifer Powers, and Lisa Ciarrocca were featured in the roles of parents of the students.

The Raiders Don't Risk It Project is a dramatic presentation to educate the seniors of SPFHS about the true consequences of poor decisions while driving. When students see their friends and peers covered in a tarp and another being hand cuffed, it hits home. It is even more gut wrenching to see the reaction of the parent actors finding out that their teen did not survive the crash and how poor driving decisions can impact so many people.

After the reenactment, the seniors participated in a question and answer session with Sergeant Brown and Chief Ted Conley of the Scotch Plains Police Department, Chief Richard Trigo of the Fanwood Police Department, and Liz Knodel-Gordon the District Student Assistance Coordinator. After the Q&A, students were also able to tour the crashed vehicle.

SURVEY RESULTS FOR LIBRARY AND COMMUNITY CENTER

The Scotch Plains Downtown Redevelopment Committee (SPDRC) released the results of its month-long survey recently on both a new, expanded Scotch Plains library and a community center. The survey aimed to gather input and evaluate the needs of the public for these facilities; 773 people participated. Forty-eight percent of respondents believe that Scotch Plains needs a new, expanded library. 30 percent don't believe Scotch Plains needs a new, expanded library and 22 percent are undecided. Fifty-eight percent of respondents said Scotch Plains needs a community center. Twenty percent don't believe Scotch Plains needs a community center and 22 percent are undecided.

Eighty-three percent of respondents believe the Scotch Plains library is a very important or important community service. Respondents would like to see more children's activities (40 percent), additional computer/work stations (35 percent), additional quiet reading spaces (34 percent), and additional meeting spaces (33 percent) in a new, expanded library. Respondents frequently commented that they would like to see family programs, sports programs, arts & crafts programs, summer camp programs, volunteering programs, meeting spaces, multi-purpose room(s), pool(s), senior activities/programs, children/programs, music programs, and teen programs in a community center.

"These survey results confirm what I have heard from SPDRC members and the public at our meetings: that Scotch Plains residents want both a new, expanded library and a community center," stated Mayor Al Smith. "People also want the new, expanded library and community center to be downtown. This will be an important draw and bring more foot traffic to our downtown. I have discussed eventually repurposing the town hall building as a community center, and I will continue to get feedback from the public on their views of a new, expanded library and a community center."

The survey participants were mostly Scotch Plains residents (99 percent) between 35- to 54-years of age (58 percent). Participants were 66 percent female and 32 percent male. 85 percent of respondents use the library in some frequency. Eight-two percent of respondents said they have a library card.

As part of downtown redevelopment, the SPDRC has discussed both a new, expanded library and a community center for the downtown area as a way to draw more people downtown. The survey is not a scientific survey of the population, but an opportunity to give feedback and opinions to the SPDRC.


