BATTLE HILL TROTS OUT HUNGER

On Monday, November 13th, Bernadette Murphy, a representative for St. Joseph's Social Service Center, visited Battle Hill to inform students about the many programs the center runs year round. The visit kicked off Battle Hill's latest fundraiser, a "Turkey Trot."

After hearing about all the assistance St. Joseph's provides to the community, students were encouraged to donate \$2 to the cause. Those who donated had their name written on a feather by Donna Carlyle, Battle Hill greeter, which was added to a school-wide turkey. Teachers jumped in to help too. They were invited to take part in a \$10 donation dress down week and receive a Turkey Trot hat to be worn the day of the main event. Phyllis Neshimka, physical education teacher, also choreographed a Turkey Trot dance to the song Jump On It for students to participate in. Sarah Norman, art teacher, had all students create a Turkey Trot hat.

On Tuesday, November 21st, third and fourth grade students filed out onto the field and lined up to await their peers. The rest of the student body followed soon after and began to walk laps around the field with the third and fourth grade students. Music was played to encourage student interaction and would be interrupted periodically with a holiday themed dance, including Neshimka's Turkey Trot and the Thanksgiving Hokey Pokey.

"Our goal with this particular fundraiser was to help those in need as the holiday season was fast approaching," said Student Council Advisor Alison Brehm. She added "With the overwhelming support of our Battle Hill Community, we did just that."

The fundraiser was so successful it raised a total of \$845 to be donated to St. Joseph's Social Service Center. "Battle Hill's donation will provide 700 meals to those in need this holiday season," said Murphy.







Destiny will go on to the next round of speeches in this national contest scheduled to be held in Indianapolis on April 14th -15th 2018.



On June 5, 1933 Margaret married John Steiner and they resided in Union, where he was a fireman with the Union Fire Dept. John owned a Harley Davidson motorcycle and they both enjoyed many rides along with a club they belonged to. Margaret and John later had two children, Ralph and Judylynn. During their long marriage, their family grew to five grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

John built a little bungalow in Seaside Park, NJ where the family enjoyed many summers. After 33 years of service to his town he retired. hey built a year-round home at the shore but later moved to Ft. Myers, Florida to spend their senior years. Margaret would occupy her time over the years on a bowling league, playing tennis, and country line dancing.

John passed away in 1977 and Margaret stayed in Florida with her friends. During the 1980s she enjoyed trips with her friends to England, Alaska, and Switzerland.

UNION HIGH MARKETING STUDENTS TOUR MACY'S HERALD SQUARE

Union High School's Fashion Marketing and Hospitality and Tourism classes got the opportunity to get the inside scoop of the marketing strategies behind the world's largest retailer. Students, along with their teacher Ms. Katie Snyder and two chaperones, toured the Herald Square retail store on November 30th. John Wiltberger a nineteen-year veteran of the company led the tour, which is part of Macy's Tourism Marketing and Development program. The tour started with the history of Marcy's and the growth of the huge retailer since its official opening in 1857. Students were taken through different departments within the eleven floors of selling space and given information on the marketing and advertising strategies used to attract customers to each department.

Ms. Snyder shared "Once again this was a great trip and experience for the students in my Fashion Marketing and Hospitality and Tourism Marketing classes. There is so much for the students to learn, experience, and absorb from being inside the store and having the opportunity to ask questions to our tour guide about their marketing efforts. The curriculum comes to life in a fun and interactive way!"

With over 5,000 employees at the Herald

Square location alone, students learned about the different career opportunities in the retail industry. Students were also informed of the three subdivisions within the marketing and advertising department that work together to promote the giant retailer. The entertainment group is responsible for events such as the Thanksgiving Day Parade and the 4th of July Fireworks. These events along with others are used as a way to keep Macy's name current but also as a way to get people into the stores to shop. The tourism and marketing development sector is responsible for making sure that those who come in from out of town are welcome and informed about Macy's and that they are given coupons for sales. Macy's prides itself with being socially responsible. The cause-marketing group focuses on ways to give back to the community. During the the holiday season, the retailer ran a "letters to Santa" campaign where for every letter that is written to Santa, Macy's made a \$1 donation to the Make-a-Wish foundation.

The students learned about the different demographics that the store caters to and how they use marketing to attract them. Students were particularly interested in the Junior's Department of the store where bright colors, eclectic décor, current music, and even restaurants were used to keep them engaged.

11th grader Kiana Veloso-Lima said, "I enjoyed going on this trip. I was able to relate what I learn in a classroom to the real world. I really think that this trip is very beneficial for students." Maria Fonseca a 12th grader added, "The trip to Macy's was great! It helped put an image to the topics we had been learning in class. What we were learning in class was showed to us in real life, outside of a classroom."

"The trip was a very fun experience," stated 11th Grader Saleem Messiah. "It taught me some things about Macy's such as it being the biggest department store in the world and how it started. It was also cool seeing a lot of what we leaned in class already, really translates to the real world. Especially such a successful worldwide store as Macy's. Looking at the different clothing options they had in one big store was pretty cool. The tour guide was nice. Great vibes, great people, great food, and a great time!"


