END HUNGER 3.6 PACKAGING PROJECT

Based on the resounding success of the End Hunger 3.6 Packaging Project of March 2017, the Rotary Club of Madison and the Madison Rotary Foundation announce this year's project to take place once again at the The Forum at Drew University on Saturday, March 10, 2018, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. This year's goal is to surpass last year's total of 123,000 meals, by packaging 250,000 meals.

What does 3.6 represent? Every 3.6 seconds someone in the world dies of malnutrition or starvation. In Rotary District 7470 which encompasses five counties in north central New Jersey, it is estimated that over 200,000 men, women and children are food insecure. Over one million persons are living below the poverty level in New Jersey. Food insecurity experienced at any time across the lifespan has an adverse impact of health. A growing body of evidence suggests that the detrimental impact of food insecurity on health has important consequences for U.S. health care expenditures. These costs are

borne substantially by Medicare and Medicaid. Over the long term, prevention of food insecurity is likely to be more cost-effective than treating the consequences of this crisis.

For example, Children: In addition to decreased intellectual and emotional development and poor academic performance, children living in food insecure households are at a higher risk of poor physical and mental health. Pregnant women: Infants born to food insecure mothers are smaller, sicker, and have an increased risk of birth defects. Adults: seniors who are food insecure have a decreased capacity to maintain independence with aging.

The End Hunger 3.6 project is a community event where volunteers package and distribute non-perishable, ready to cook meals, such as macaroni and cheese, rice and vegetables, pasta with tomato basil sauce, and oatmeal. All food is vitamin enriched, and GMO-free. The meals are distributed to soup kitchens and feeding stations throughout Rotary District 7470 as this is a district-wide project. Last year's recipients were, in Morris County: The Community Soup Kitchen, Table of Hope, Market Street Mission, and Faith Kitchen in Dover; in Essex County: St. John's Soup Kitchen, M.E.N.D. (interfaith Meeting Emergency Needs with Dignity), and the Salvation Army's numerous feeding facilities including a mobile van. Hunterdon, Sussex, and Warren Counties were served by NORWESCAP's feeding facilities; and Somerset County was served by God's Co-Op Pantry in Bernardsville.

In order to purchase ingredients for packaging, donations and grants are required. Donations of \$500 or more will be acknowledged in Rotary's publicity materials. THE STORY OF LIGHT DURING THE CIVIL WAR



The Museum of Early Trades & Crafts (METC) invites the public to join us on Sunday, February 11, 2018 at 2 p.m. for a fascinating presentation, "Achieving Artificial Light: Lighting Devices and the Civil War" by David Cowell, Emeritus Professor of Political Science at Drew University, and antique lighting device expert. Professor Cowell will discuss the types of artificial light prevalent during the Civil War era and he will use several of his own historic lamps and other devices from his extensive collection to elaborate on the lighting of that time. Selections from Dr. Cowell's collection are currently part of "Spark! The Explosive and Dirty History of Light," METC's exhibit which is open until February 23rd. Admission is \$8, \$5 for Members and Seniors. Registration is required, and guests can register for this and other events at www.metc.org.

David Cowell, Ph.D. is a New Jersey native and while he's retired from the Political Science Department at Drew University, he now teaches in the Continuing Education Program at the Madison Public Library for Drew University. Dr. Cowell's career also includes serving locally as a Councilman for the Borough of Caldwell, and as trustee, member and curator of many historical organizations and societies including the New Jersey Historical Commission. His continued work as an active antiques dealer and manager of two antiques shows has allowed him to build an extensive collection of lighting devices.

"Spark! The Explosive and Dirty History of Light" tells the story of man-made light, from candles, to the whaling trade, through the late 19th century when Thomas Edison ushered in a new era of artificial light and technology. The exhibit will run until February 2018. Guests can take a self-guided tour book a guided tour in advance. The SPARK! Lecture Series has programs for the whole family throughout the rest of the year and into 2018.

CHILDREN'S BOOK TO BENEFIT ST. HUBERT'S


Growing up with a pet is one of the great joys her own best friend, her dog Cassius. of a young life.

"I Miss My Best Friend" can be enjoyable simply as a children's book, or it can offer help during a time of loss. The book explores grieving in a way young people can understand and relate to. It even offers parents a list of tips at the end to help them make the grieving process a little easier.




