ADELE DELEEUW SCHOLARSHIP AVAIABLE TO WATCHUNG STUDENTS

A scholarship fund of \$1 million was Plainfield, Edison, Fanwood, Scotch Plains, established by the late Adele DeLeeuw to assist needy students in the Plainfield area for their pursuit of post-secondary education. The fund is managed by PNC Advisors (PNC), and is administered by the Plainfield Foundation through the Rotary Club of Plainfield-North Plainfield.

Adele DeLeeuw was a well-known author of books for children of all ages, a prominent Plainfield resident for almost her entire life. She was a patron of the arts and literature, and took a special interest in young people.

Adele lived in Plainfield with her parents and her sister, Cateau, who was an artist. Her father was a consulting engineer with an office in New York City.

After their father and then their mother passed away, Adele and Cateau continued to reside in Plainfield. They were members and proud supporters of many literary and arts organizations in the area.

Adele was also a champion for her City of Plainfield. An article in the Courier News from 1979 said that Adele "relishes giving the Queen City, her home since 1914, an oral or written boost."

She had the opportunity to give that support in her freelance writings for the Courier News over an eight-year period. Her opinion pieces were well-received, and were eagerly anticipated by many readers.

Adele died on June 13, 1988. She was predeceased by her sister, Cateau. With no immediate survivors, Adele set aside a portion of her estate for a scholarship program to be administered by the Plainfield Foundation.

Reflecting her own and her family's interests, Adele stipulated in her will that the annual earnings from her scholarship endowment would be awarded to graduating seniors from high schools in Plainfield, North Plainfield, South

Watchung, and Warren. She further stipulated that eligible seniors must pursue a course of study in art, poetry, writing, journalism, or engineering; courses of study that reflected her own family's careers and interests.

Eligible students who receive first-year scholarships are encouraged to submit applications for subsequent years and receive additional awards.

To be eligible applicants must attend or be accepted to attend an accredited college or university on an undergraduate or graduate level in one of the eligible areas of study: art, engineering, journalism, poetry, and writing.

TWO WATCHUNG TEAMS JOIN FOR ONE CAUSE

Watchung's Cub Scout Pack 32 and Buffalo Wild Wings (BWW) restaurant in Watchung recently got together for a community service project that broke all previous records. With Scouts, parents, and BWW staff working side-by-side, exactly 1000 utensil kits were packaged up for a county mobile soup kitchen. This amount crushed the previous number of kits made at the Pack by over 200. Each kit contained eating utensils and napkins along with a unique item from BWW: a wet-napkin. All the items were placed into a bag and given to the Samaritan Homeless Interim Project (SHIP), an organization that delivers hot meals from one of their mobile kitchens to needy people and

families throughout Somerset County.

To date, the Pack has made over 3000 utensil kits for SHIP in the last four years. The group's director, Tom O'Leary (Eagle Scout), has said, "Thank you so much for all you boys do for us." The Pack also extends a big thanks to the team at BWW in Watchung, particularly Holly, Jasmine, Jordan, and Brian. They were excellent hosts of the pack meeting, giving Scouts a tour of the facilities and teaching them about the hospitality industry. They also cooked up a lunch of their delicious wings, which was a huge hit. BWW didn't stop there, though, they demonstrated the Scout motto of a Good Turn by donating all 1000 pieces of the utensil kits for the project!



WHRHS DISTRICT PLACED ON 8TH ANNUAL AP® DISTRICT HONOR ROLL

Watchung Hills Regional High School District is one of 447 school districts in the U.S. and Canada being honored by the College Board with placement on the 8th Annual AP® District Honor Roll. To be included on the 8th Annual Honor Roll, the Watchung Hills Regional High School District had to, since 2015, increase the number of students participating in AP while also increasing or maintaining the percentage of students earning AP Exam scores of 3 or higher. Reaching these goals shows that this district is successfully identifying motivated, academically prepared students who are ready for AP.

"The shared ownership and collaborative efforts of our faculty members across grade levels and departments have cultivated a learning environment in which our students continue to exceed our expectations. Our percentage of students scoring 3 or higher and 4 or higher has steadily risen each year since 2012, while we continue to open access and opportunities for more students to take AP courses," stated Elizabeth C. Jewett, WHRHS Superintendent.

National data from 2017 show that among American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latino, and Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander students with a high degree of readiness for AP, only about half are participating. The first step to getting more of these students to participate is to give them access. Courses must be made available, gatekeeping must stop, and doors must be equitably opened. The Watchung Hills Regional High School District is committed to expanding the availability of AP courses among prepared and motivated students of all backgrounds.

"Congratulations to all the educators and administrators in this district who have worked to clear a path for more students of all backgrounds to participate and succeed in AP," stated Trevor Packer, head of AP and Instruction. "These educators and administrators are fostering a culture in their schools and classrooms that allows students to face new challenges and build the confidence to succeed."

Helping more students learn at a higher level

Watchung Hills Regional High School District one of 447 school districts in the U.S. and members of the AP community, from AP teachers to district and school administrators to college professors. Many districts are experimenting with initiatives and strategies to see how they can expand access and improve student performance at the same time.

In 2017, more than 4,000 colleges and universities around the world received AP scores for college credit, advanced placement, or both, and/or consideration in the admissions process. Inclusion in the 8th Annual AP District Honor Roll is based on a review of three years of AP data, from 2015 to 2017, looking across 38 AP Exams, including world language and culture. The following criteria were used.

Districts must:

Increase participation/access to AP by at least four percent in large districts, at least six percent in medium districts, and at least 11 percent in small districts;


Increased or maintained the percentage of American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latino, and Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander students taking exams and increased or maintained the percentage of American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latino, and Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander students scoring 3+ on at least one AP Exam; and

Improve or maintain performance levels when comparing the 2017 percentage of students scoring a 3 or higher to the 2015 percentage, unless the district has already attained a performance level at which more than 70% of its AP students earn a 3 or higher.

When these outcomes have been achieved among an AP student population in which 30 percent or more are underrepresented minority students (American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latino and Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander) and/or 30 percent or more are low-income students (students who qualify for free or reduced-price lunch), a symbol has been affixed to the district name to highl--ight this work.


student musicians on piano, electric lead guitar and bass guitar, and a drum kit.






