On Monday, February 26, 2018, Rahway firefighters joined together with 24 other teams of firefighters from around New Jersey to compete in 'The Ultimate Fire Department Cook-off,' part of the Cooked and Uncorked Food and Wine Festival held at the Pines Manor in Edison New Jersey. Rahway Firefighters took home 1st Place in the 'Desert' category.

The event benefited the New Jersey State Firefighter's Mutual Benevolent Association and The Burn Center at Saint Barnabas Medical Center.

The Fire Department Cook-off is part of a

culinary extravaganza where participants were able to experience the tastes and flavors of more than 30 of New Jersey's finest restaurants, caterers and dessert shops all in one location.

This event, held at The Pines Manor in Edison, NJ, drew more than 1000 people from across New Jersey.

According to event organizers, \$65,000 was raised this year, St. Barnabas will receive half. The Cooked and Uncorked event has provided The Burn Center at Saint Barnabas Medical Center with over \$170,000 over the past 8 years.



POSSUMS

Pity the poor possum. Just the site of one is enough to send shivers up the spines of many people, but if you take time to look beyond that, possums are a truly fascinating creature.

Possums are the only marsupials in North America. Like other marsupials such as the kangaroo, possums have a pouch in which they feed and care for their young in the first stages of life.

The mother possum gives birth to 20 bee-sized young. During one of the most dangerous journeys of its life the young must climb from the birth canal up to the safety of its mother's pouch. Once there it will hopefully find and latch onto one of only nine nibbles. The remaining young do not survive. Needless to say, possum have a very high infant death rate. With a life span of only two years, it's not easy being a possum.

Called opossum in many parts of the country, there are many attributes that make possums a partner and ally to farmers, gardeners and home owners.

Possums are the sanitation workers of the wild. Their diet consists of carrion (including the bones), rodents, insects, snails, slugs, eggs, fruit, frogs as well as dog and cat food. Possums eat ticks which is very helpful in the fight against Lyme Disease in our region. It is common for possums to kill rats and cockroaches in their territory.

In intelligence testing possum are better able to remember where they hid their food than rats, rabbits, cats and dogs. They can also find their way faster though a maze than rats and cats.

Possum have opposable thumbs on their hind

legs which help them climb. The only other mammals with opposable thumb are primates which includes human beings.

Unlike the tails of most critters, possums have a 'prehensile' tail which they use to hang upside down and carry bundles of grass and nesting materials. This control function makes the tail a fifth appendage, like an extra hand.

Possum are mostly immune to rabies and venom from rattlesnakes, cottonmouths and other poisonous snakes.

"Playing possum" is a well know defense which is an involuntary response, like fainting, rather than a conscious act. They roll over, become stiff, close their eyes or stare off into space and bare their teeth while saliva forms around the teeth and a foul-smelling fluid is secreted from their glands. This state can last up to four hours and has proven a deterrent from predators looking for a fresh meal.

Possum prefer to be in the wild and are not home invaders. With these attributes in its favor, possums might be our secret best friend. If you catch a possum in a have-a-heart type trap, don't transport it away, release it where it is. It will control mice and pests in your area.

Please, if you see a possum crossing the road, give it a break. They don't run very fast.






REMEMBERING RAHWAY'S 1958 CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

On March 12, 1858, the four sections that had made up Rahway Township (Upper Rahway, Bridgetown, Leesville, and Milton) were granted a charter to incorporate as a city through an act of the New Jersey State Legislature. The four communities became known as the City of Rahway and one hundred years later, the citizens of Rahway were eager to celebrate its birthday. Realizing the importance of this anniversary, Mayor James Egolf formed a committee whose goal was to establish and oversee a year-long schedule of activities for the centennial year. John Gallo was chosen to serve as General Chairman. Committee members included Harland Sisler, who served as parade chairman, Albert Goetz, Max Sheld, James Stevens, Charles Post, Frank Shipley, Walter Reul, Abe Reppen, Donald Alvarez, Charles Carroll, and Joseph Szper.

When the committee had finalized the event list, the schedule included a queen contest, a banquet, a parade, a beard growing contest, a 100-kilometer bicycle race, a fishing derby, a concert, and a fireworks display. Bowling championships, marble tournaments, an all-star softball game, track meets, a city swim meet, a synchronized swimming program, and a flower show were also scheduled. Churches held special services, scout troops camped overnight on Veterans' Field, and most every school and community group got involved by participating in the events and by incorporating the centennial theme into their customary annual activities.

The kick-off event for the celebration took place at the Rahway Theater on Saturday, December 28, 1957 with the crowning of the Centennial Queen. Thirty-nine young women had previously enrolled in the contest and by this night the number had been narrowed down to five remaining contestants. When the excitement of the selection process was over, Miss Helen Kerekes was selected to be Rahway's queen to represent the city throughout the year. The other four finalists, Constance Coan, Lynn Guiler, Barbara Petri, and Judy Troost, would serve as attendants.

One of the more unusual events on the calendar was the beard growing contest. In March, contestants registered at John Gallo's

barber shop where they were cleanly shaven. The men were required to remain unshaven until Memorial Day, which was no simple task as beards were not in fashion. By the end of the allotted time, thirty-four contestants remained to be judged. Charles Heller was declared the winner and was awarded a \$100.00 U.S. Savings Bond for having the "Most Outstanding Beard."

Although the program of events would run until the end of October, the Fourth of July weekend featured three major events. The centennial year featured the first 100-kilometer (62 ½ miles) bicycle race held on the morning of the Fourth. Chairman of the event was Rahway resident, Fred Spencer, a world famous cyclist, who in the 1920s and 30s was a winner of three American sprint championships and holder of six world records. The winner of the Centennial Race, which had a field of seventy-five international racers, was Guy Morin of Montreal, Canada. The event was so popular to both bikers and spectators that the city continued to sponsor races for the next two decades.

That night, it seemed like everyone in the city, along with their friends from other surrounding towns and counties, had made their way into the Rahway County Park in anticipation of viewing

the largest display of fireworks in the city's history. The Elizabeth Daily Journal estimated that 40,000 people had assembled to view the spectacular pyrotechnic show.

The highlight of the weekend and of the year, however, was the Centennial Parade that was held the next day. United States Senator Clifford Case, also a Rahway resident, officially started the parade with a brief address given from the reviewing stand on the steps of the Masonic building on Irving Street. The three-hour parade that followed featured over thirty bands, including four mummer units, fifty elaborate floats, long lines of fire engines from twenty-five neighboring communities, marchers representing all groups in the city, and elected officials from the Federal to the local levels. It was reported that over 30,000 people lined the parade route that stretched three miles.

This year Rahway reaches its 160th year as an incorporated city. 2018 is certainly not a banner year in the history of this city nor a milestone that's worthy of a celebration, but it is a good reason to recall, with a touch of nostalgia, the interest, excitement, and fun experienced throughout Rahway during the centennial year of 1958.





'SIT DOWN' HELPS STUDENTS FACE FUTURE WITHOUT FEAR

"How do you cope with homesickness?" ponders Rahway High School senior Luis Muller.
Oscar Ortiz wonders, "How can I manage my time to address so many priorities?"

Future June '18 graduate Seth Holguin thinks about what he might face as "the disadvantages of being a first-year college student."

Students also worry that they may be embarking upon, and assuming astronomical debt for, higher education when they do not even have a clearly defined idea of their ultimate career goals. Shared by many graduating high school seniors across the country, these apprehensions and anxieties can often cast a shadow over what should be an enthusiastically anticipated start of a college or university career. Rahway Superintendent of Schools Dr. Patricia Camp was not about to let that happen; no, not on her watch.

"Like I did as a first-generation college student," Dr. Camp explains, "our students have many concerns about going away to college; being away from home, family, friends, and community." She continues, "This is essentially a fear of the unknown and a natural response, but it can be seen as an opportunity to stretch and grow in a relatively safe environment." As is her penchant for communicating directly with her students, and for knowing just what would always grab a teenager's attention, Dr. Camp did not miss the chance to help put their minds at ease with the help of some carefully selected, thankfully non-vegetarian this time, pizza and some sage advice.

Sharing many personal stories of her college years, along with those of her niece and her son, Dr. Camp impressed upon a gathering of her students from the 'Leading by Example' program that "their feelings are typical and that others have overcome those doubts to succeed in college and beyond." Addressing their concerns over how to manage their time efficiently, she acknowledged that "time management' would, in fact, be their biggest challenge. "You will now have much more freedom to set your own goals."

Her advice, which she had learned herself from her brother, was, "Study from Sunday evening through Friday day then, unless there is a looming deadline, take Friday night through Sunday day 'off."

Also important for students to overcome homesickness, she believes, is to recognize that college is a "time to grow intellectually and psychologically" and "time to explore a new area of the U.S. with new friends," reminding them that "nothing is permanent; very few life decisions are!"

His superintendent's philosophy that one's "past" does not determine one's "future" resonated clearly with Dominick Williams, who is off to study sports management at Wesley in Delaware in the fall. "Dr. Camp has shown me that you're the one who steers your course no matter the circumstances." He adds, "She is a hard-working lady; you can just see it."

Other reassuring insights into maneuvering successfully through those first years included, "trying a bit of many different disciplines" to find

what might light a passion and "finding one person who has done this before (college in this case) whom they can lean on for support or even just talk to."

The students' Superintendent has unwavering confidence in them. "Our students are smart and can figure things out themselves – often they just need reassurance that they are on the right path."

Perhaps it is just that confidence that her students perceive and that keeps her a welcome figure of support in their high school careers. "Dr. Camp is different than most people in power," observes Seth Holguin. "She opens herself up to connect with her students; she likes to be where the students are. She listens to them and truly wants to learn about them."

"When Dr. Camp said she was glad to be gone from home to experience the real world doing something she loved," explains Luis Muller, "that made me realize that I'm going on to do something that I love." (So much for homesickness!) He goes on to admit, "At first I was a little shaky when I met her, but she's a normal person!"

"She's not a 'superintendent'; I could go to her for advice about anything," Caroline Mull offers. "Watching Dr. Camp, I've realized that to be a true leader, we must listen to and be able to consider others' opinions."

With her characteristic 'advice-cum-wit,' Superintendent Camp closed the afternoon with one last well-received note of advice. "In that first year away, tell your parents only half of what you do!" Words, we think, to live by.




STUDENTS VISIT ROBERT WOOD JOHNSON HOSPITAL'S PEDIATRIC UNIT



Plans are to meet at the parking area adjacent to the waterfall of the Rahway River by the dam at Winfield Park at 8:45. This is a great way to celebrate Earth Day and if you haven't participated in an event like this before, you will find it invigorating, and you will feel good about what you have accomplished...it is also a lot of fun...especially for scouts and young adults as they always find something interesting. This adds both education and adventure to the event.

up. This includes tires and of course floatables (cans, bottles, plastics, etc.). The County of Union generously supplies gloves and garbage bags, and we solicit material donations (donuts, bagels, coffee, bottled water, paper towels, handwipes, etc.) for all volunteers.

Last year, nearly 150 folks participated, including Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, fishermen, local activists and citizens, and we pulled some amazing things from the river. Sponsors came through with coffee, bagels, Danish, donuts, cookies, bottled water, and juice boxes, and we had grilled hot dogs for lunch. We also had other giveaways for the participants.

All participants should wear jeans, longsleeved shirts, gloves and boots, and waders are welcome for folks who like to get a little wet. Each participant should bring a standard fivegallon carry bucket with a handle (put your name on the bottom). This makes for easy carrying of "stuff" for transfer to the large garbage bags. When we complete the event, we do a basic inventory of the "big stuff" that we removed and within approximately 24 hours Union County Parks removes and disposes of all the trash.



SAYING GOODBYE TO RAHWAY'S OLDEST REGISTERED GIRL SCOUT

This article is written in memory of my mother, Margaret Edith McWhorter Woolley.

Margaret was involved in scouting from an early age. She was born in Perth Amboy, New Jersey, in 1941. By the end of the '40s, she joined Girl Scouts at the age of 6 or 7. She would tell me stories about how she earned her badges and how she met girls from all over Rahway, New Jersey.

In 1956, at the age of 14, she was selected to attend the first Girl Scout Roundup that was held in Milford, Michigan. She not only met girls from across the country but also met girls from around the world. She exchanged S.W.A.P.S. with many

girls. What are S.W.A.P.S? It is a Small Whatchamacallits Affectionately Pinned Someplace. It is a long-standing Girl Scout tradition.

Although Margaret was enjoying traveling with the scouts around the country, she did a lot right in here in her home town of Rahway. She used her skills and talents to earn the highest award to earn in Girl Scouting, the Curved Bar. It is now called the Gold Award and is a very prestigious award. It honors a scout that displays service as well as mature thinking and planning abilities.

As an adult, she joined scouts as a leader. She was a leader of about 30 girls, which a very large troop. She also accepted girls from all races and backgrounds way before the country did. She was a trendsetter and continued that way of life until she passed. She was a role model for the girls, whom she saw great ability and talents which she could foster and help grow into strong women.

Both my sister and I were scouts. Our mom, Margaret, was our leader. I became a scout in the 1980s. I joined at the age of 6 and was a scout for 12 years. With her guidance, I earned my Gold Award. She was my role model in scouting and I felt I owed it not only to myself to earn the Gold Award, but to my mom as well.

In 2008, my oldest daughter was 5, old enough to become a Daisy. I became her leader to uphold our family tradition. When I told my mom, she said, "I want to join your troop." It was a great honor to have her in our troop. For the next 10 years, she was an adult volunteer in Troop 41748 of Rahway. My two daughters were in the troop. We had three generations in the same troop. The whole troop was in awe of her stories. When she spoke, all of us listened. She taught the girls to knit, cook, helped them with badges and was the troop nurse. She worked as an RN for over 50 years.

A story on how she became known as the Doris Jellison, Co-leader Troop 41288.

"Toughest Scout in Rahway."

In 2016, after our Troop saved for over two years, we went to Savannah, Georgia, the birthplace of Girl Scouting. On day two, Mom fell and hurt her shoulder. We went to take x-rays, and nothing was broken in her shoulder; it was just a sprain. She continued to hike the streets of Savannah with no complaints, just asked to sit down to rest. When we returned to Rahway she was still in pain. More extensive x-rays showed she had a broken rib. She hiked the whole city for six days with not one complaint. This is why she was called, "The Toughest Girl Scout in Rahway."

After being a scout for 70 years, she has definitely left her mark on many people and places. We miss her terribly in Troop 41748 as well as Rahway Service Unit #54, where she held the position of Treasurer as well as worked with council.

With my mom, being so involved in such a great organization, I have some pretty big shoes to fill. But with my mom as my leader role model and inspiration, I know she set me up for success and she is watching, and my girls as we continue her adventures.

"Amazing. Passion. Love. Fun. We miss you, Ms. Margaret." Gracie Sullivan, 10, Junior in Troop 41748.

"I was grateful to know her. A wonderful lady, an awesome Girl Scout and so kind. I will always cherish the knitted hand towels she made for me." Doris Jellison, Co-leader Troop 41288.




