



The event benefited the New Jersey State Firefighter's Mutual Benevolent Association and The Burn Center at Saint Barnabas Medical Center.





HISTORICAL SOCIETY 1ST WED. LUNCHEON: ART AND CULTURE IN BHUTAN

As part of the Westfield Historical Society's First Wednesday Luncheon series Gabrielle Yablonsky will be presenting a talk on art and culture in Bhutan on May 1, 2018. The event will begin at 11:45 a.m. at the Echo Lake Country Club, located at 515 Springfield Avenue, Westfield, New Jersey.

Bhutan is a landlocked country of about 750,000 people in the Eastern Himalayas between India and Tibet. Bhutan's lower elevations are home to indigenous Indo-Mongoloid tribes and recent Nepalese immigrants; and its higher altitudes are settled by Tibetans, who immigrated into Bhutan's three main regions of West, Central and East Bhutan starting around the 8th century, though the country was not unified until the reign of Shabdrung Nawang Namgyal in the 17th century. These regions are diverse in language, social customs, and religions, including the ancient Tibetan Bon religion, Central Asian shamanism, and Red Sect Buddhism. Bhutan's religious diversity is reflected in its remarkable

arts, said to number thirteen, which include weaving, sculpture, painting, woodcarving, and metalwork.

Gabrielle Yablonsky, an art historian and artist, undertook fieldwork in Bhutan in the 1970s at a time when foreigners were not permitted entry into Bhutan and Bhutanese customs were still well preserved. Her several years of fieldwork were supported by Fulbright and Ford Foundation grants; and her collateral research in Nepal and the Indian Himalayas was sponsored by a Guggenheim Fellowship. Subsequently, she traveled in Tibet, Western China, and Central Asia. In addition to her PhD studies at UCLA, she holds an MA from Yale University, an MFA from Boston University, and a BA from Bryn Mawr College. She has taught at the University of Texas, Austin; the University of California, Santa Cruz; and the University of Oregon, and has published articles on cloth and shamanism in Bhutan, on Bhutanese sculpture, and on the murals of the Tibetan Book of the Dead adorning an obscure

Tibetan temple she discovered in 2002.

SR. JACINTA AND EDIE MOVE ON FROM ST. JOSEPH SOCIAL SERVICE CENTER AFTER OVER 30 YEARS OF SERVICE

Sr. Jacinta Fernandes and Edie Cheney stepped down from their full-time work at the St. Joseph Social Service Center, Elizabeth, New Jersey in July of 2017. They led the center, working together for more than 30 years. Sr. Jacinta recently moved to Lutherville, Maryland to join her Benedictine Community. Edie is a Sister of Christian Charity and has yet to decide where her next ministry will be. The many volunteers of St. Joseph's, who come from all over Union County and beyond, continue to partner with the Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless as sister agencies, to serve the poor and homeless of the Elizabeth area.

Since 1983, St. Joseph's has served the poor and homeless community of the greater Elizabeth area by providing basic human needs like food, clothing, and medications; as well as a wide range of services and programs to help them acquire the material goods and social services they need to live with integrity.

St. Joseph's ministry to people in need dates back to 1968, when the American Friends Service Committee began a housing assistance program in Elizabeth. Sr. Jacinta was on staff and became one of the founders of St. Joseph's. She and other Sisters distributed food and clothing from Sacred Heart Convent. These programs then gave birth to CUE (Coalition for a United Elizabeth), from which came the Elizabeth Coalition House to the Homeless.

In 1983, Sacred Heart merged with Our Lady

of Fatima Church. The food and clothing programs were formalized and became Our Lady of Fatima Social Service Center, with Sister Jacinta as the director. Edie Cheney assisted her part time, while also pursuing her studies in family therapy. Both the Coalition and the Social Service Center were housed at Our Lady of Fatima Convent, the former Sacred Heart Convent.

On February 10, 1986, Our Lady of Fatima Social Service Center and the Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless relocated to the former St. Joseph's Church at 118 Division Street, Elizabeth. This location provided more space for the growing number of clients. Our Lady of Fatima Social Service Center then became St. Joseph Social Service Center with Sister Jacinta and Edie as its leadership team. Services were expanded to include a soup kitchen, job program, counseling services, and a medical clinic, which evolved into a prescription assistance program. In addition to housing advocacy, the Coalition added on a children's program and three transitional houses.

Bernadette Murphy is now the Director; and Annette Calderin is taking on Sr. Edie's responsibilities in counseling and leadership.

Sr. Jacinta and Edie were honored and celebrated on March 5, 2018 at the annual St. Joseph's Feast Celebration. People wished them well and original songs were performed. An emotional and impromptu testimonial was

delivered by a man who visted the center to share his personal experience of how the center helped his family when he was very young, and his mother needed assistance. He credited the Center for his stability and for creating an environment for this mother to thrive. He is now a productive person with a family of his own.




