'GUYS AND DOLLS' ANNUAL SPRING MUSICAL SUCCESS!

Annual spring musical, 'Guys and Dolls,' was a living-learning experience for a cast and crew of hundreds. Staging the annual spring musical at Watchung Hills Regional High Schools (WHRHS), which this year, 2018, was the iconic Broadway and Hollywood musical, "Guys and Dolls," was a livinglearning experience for hundreds of students, teachers, parents, community volunteers, and supporters.

And, as if simply staging a high quality high school musical isn't enough of a challenge every year, this year had the added challenge of performance dates during March 2018, when there were multiple snow events during a roller coaster three weeks leading up to the scheduled musical performances. Lost school days due to inclement weather and icy and snowy driving conditions cut into the crucial last-minute days of mastering the acting, singing and dancing rehearsal and set production required for a massive 24-scene Broadway classic.

Plus, one of those snow events was during the very week of the scheduled and always-important dress rehearsal and the three days of evening performances and a Saturday matinee. Fortunately, only one performance had to be cancelled. Instead, that time was used for the dress rehearsal. The wait was well worth it, it turns out, as the school's Script and Cue student drama program thrilled audiences with memorable and stellar performances.

Mastering this living-learning experience was the collaboration, like the creation of a finely-tuned interdisciplinary independent study thesis project, of not just the actors, singers, and dancers on stage, but also the musicians on the Orchestra Pit. Plus, behind the scenes, there was another whole set of "crew" specialists, including set designers and artists for costume and make-up. Additional stage crew members hone the crafts of stage managing, prop coordination, lighting and sound technology, directing, and applied graphic arts support for media items such as programs, posters, and ancillary media press materials.

There are also related applied lessons for students to learn about the business of staging a musical, including budgeting, supplying and organizing refreshments, even coordinating an army of ushers to handle the orderly seating of hundreds of audience members.

There are white catfish, musky, and wide mouth bass in the pond. Dealaman pond is a catch and release pond with no barb hooks allowed. There are recycle tubes donated by the Blue Ridge Sportsmen's Club so fishermen have a place to throw away old line. This pond is under surveillance and will be closed the week before the derby.



donates 200 hats and helps at the derby. They also walk around and help kids with their casting and catching fish. The 25 to 30 club members set up and clean up for this event. The Recreation Commission supplies drinks, condiments, and worms, and stocks the pond with fish and food.

The Recreation Commission cannot run this event without the dedicated volunteers. 

Angelo L. Tomaso School, Warren New Jersey, kicked off a month-long initiative focusing on science which wrapped up with a science fair on April 24, 2018.

"The science fair will allow the ALT students from kindergarten through fifth grade to showcase their own science experiments," said Carina Bellman, ALT PTO vice president and science fair executive board contact. "We are excited to announce that about a hundred students have already signed up to participate and show off their scientific achievements," added Bellman.

A month prior to the event, the ALT gymnasium was transformed into a state-of-theart hands-on children's science museum for the ALT Science Assembly conducted by Mobile Ed Productions, Inc. and presented by the ALT PTO. "As parents who value STEAM education, the PTO was honored to be able to bring this hands on, interactive program to all ALT students K-5," said Arelis Buzzerio, ALT PTO co-chair of the school's science initiative.

"We believe igniting the spark to question, explore and have fun are paramount to fostering a love of science learning," added Sonia Gomes, ALT PTO co-chair of the school's science

initiative.

To kick off the science assembly, each class was welcomed with a brief, age appropriate presentation involving a humanoid robot that responded to custom computer and voice commands and a 3D printer creating a tyrannosaurus rex. Next, they participated in nine different interactive workstations incorporating the principals of STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) education. The children used team work to construct a parabolic "Roman" arch that towered over their heads. They were thrilled to program robots that followed their commands. They constructed geardriven mechanisms into unique creations. They competed among themselves as they tried to complete the "Buzzwire" puzzle without sparking the alarm. They also collaborated on musical creations using technology.

There is no doubt that children had a blast learning about STEAM in an enjoyable environment while incorporating team work and respect for each other. Their teachers were also excited because they witnessed their students actively implementing some of the principles they learned in the classroom. The event brought science and fun together and resulted in an overall success.

WHRHS STUDENT AANIKA SADANA'S DRAWING DISPLAYED AT MORRIS MUSEUM




