#### **MEMORIAL DAY SERVICES HONOR CRANFORD'S 86 HEROES**

Cranford's Memorial Day Parade was held on Monday, May 28, 2018. The gray skies did not keep crowds from lining the parade route, and many people followed the parade to Memorial Park on Springfield Avenue where a moving ceremony showing respect to fallen American war heroes is displayed each year.

The service can be viewed on Cranford's TV 35 throughout the month of June. It can also be viewed on demand on the station's Facebook page.

This year's Grand Marshall was Cranford resident James Silkensen who served in the United States Army during the Vietnam War. His service awards included being awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious service. Silkensen was also awarded the Army Commendation Medal for meritorious service at Ft. Belvoir, VA. He was honorably discharged on December 9, 1971 with a Good Conduct Medal.

Don Sweeney, a member of the Memorial Day Committee, and author of 'Cranford 86', a series of stories chronicling the Cranford 86 hometown heroes who perished during wartime, spoke about the new banners to be placed around Cranford which were dedicated during the ceremony. A booklet of the stories published thus far was also distributed.

The program which was led by Master of Ceremonies Barbara Bilder, Auxiliary VFW Post #335, also included music from the Cranford High School Band, an invocation from Lead Rev. Msgr. Timothy J. Shugrue, St. Michael's Church, The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was led by Isabella Stoto, a Cranford High School student and Girl Scout Juliette and Gold Award Recipient, and musical selections were performed by the Cranford High School Madrigal Ensemble. The Lincoln's Gettysburg Address was read by Emma Donnelly, Orange Avenue School. A roll call of Cranford's war dead was read by representatives of VFW Post #335. During the placing of the wreaths Taps was played by Lucian Mahadeo and a benediction was led by Cantor Frank Lanzkron-Tamarazo, Temple Beth El Mekor Chayim.

#### **CROSSING GUARD ROBERT BELL NAMED GRAND MARSHAL OF BAYONNE MEMORIAL DAY PARADE**

Cranford resident and former U.S. Coast Guard Petty Officer Third Class (PO3), Robert T. Bell Sr. served as the Grand Marshal for the 2018 Bayonne Memorial Day Parade.

Mr. Bell was born in Bayonne in 1939 and permanently moved to Cranford in 1979.

An active member of the Catholic War Veterans Bayonne Chapter, he was chosen by his fellow veterans to be this year's Grand Marshal.

Mr. Bell graduated the Coast Guard Academy in Cape May in 1959- class F39. As part of his academy training he and his fellow recruits sailed to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba for training in antisubmarine warfare.

He was stationed at the following posts:

Rockland, Maine where his duties included lighthouse operations and sea rescue.

Hyannis Port, Cape Cod where he patrolled the waters around the Kennedy Compound.

And finally, Boston where he was assigned to the 311' Cutter "Humbolt". His duties once again included sea rescue.

PO3 Bell's most memorable moment was the time he and his crew came to the aid of a recreational boater who was trying to navigate

along the coast of Maine with a road map. The boater became hopelessly lost and was eight miles from his reported location. PO3 Bell and his crew quickly found the boater, gave him a proper map and a crash course in sea navigation.

His other memorable moment was discouraging Russian "fishing trawlers" from boarding abandoned radar platforms in the North Atlantic during the Cold War. These radar platforms were used by the US Air Force for surveillance and were designed after the drilling platforms in Texas, commonly known as Texas Towers. One such platform in the North Atlantic collapsed during a storm which led to a new order that the remaining platforms had to be temporarily abandoned during subsequent storms. The worry was the Russians would board these abandoned platforms and remove equipment and other sensitive materials. The responsibility to safeguard these platforms was that of the U.S. Coast Guard which was carried out in all sorts of weather.


PO3 Bell was honorably discharged from the U.S. Coast Guard in 1963. He is currently employed by the Township of Cranford as a Crossing Guard at St. Michael's School.



Players are divided into three age groups: Minor League 8-10 year olds, Major League 11-12 year olds, and Teen League 13-15 year olds.



#### CRANFORD POLICE OFFICERS HONOR FALLEN HEROES IN UNITY TOUR

Cranford Police officers Captain Guy Patterson and Detective Derek Farbanec once again represented the township's police force on the Police Unity Tour bicycle ride to honor the sacrifices of police officers killed in the line of duty. They departed New Jersey on May 9, 2018. Officers and surviving family members of fallen officers from across the United States converged on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington D.C. on Saturday, May 12, 2018.

The Police Unity Tour was started by Chief Patrick P. Montuore of the Florham Park Police Department, with the hope of bringing public awareness of Police Officers who died in the line of duty and to honor their sacrifices. The first event included 18 riders on a four-day fundraising bicycle ride from Florham Park, NJ to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C. Over time, the event has grown encompass nine-chapter organizations

states, participants have traveled to the event from Australia, Canada, England, India, Israel and Italy.

Through obtaining sponsorship and donations, officers participating in the Police Unity Tour raise funds that are donated to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial (NLEOMF). The NLEOMF is responsible for maintaining the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington D.C. where all officers fallen in the line of duty are engraved on the memorial's walls. Captain Patterson, Sergeant Joseph Stulpin, Officer Matthew Siessel and Officer Daniel Donnerstag participated in the May 2017 event which resulted in over 2.6 Million Dollars being donated to the NLEOMF, bringing total donations to the fund since inception to over 20 Million Dollars. Our motorcycle escorts give out information on the tour and the memorial so people know why we're doing this." Cranford Police Chief Ryan Greco is proud of his officers' involvement in the Tour. "These officers are working very hard to not only pedal to D.C., but to ensure that our National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial remains a fitting tribute to officers who have

## MEET LIEUTENANT CHARLES ALBURY JR. WORLD WAR 2 GLIDER AVIATOR, ONE OF CRANFORD'S 86

When I started the campaign to identify the faces and stories of the 86 men's names engraved in bronze at our Memorial Park, I was much less educated about the history of American wars and the brave men and women that dedicated their lives to fight in them. Now with a year and 12 stories and several hundred hours of computer research under my belt, I consider myself an amateur historian. What has amazed me is the important role that many Cranford citizens have taken in some of the largest and most important military undertakings in our nation's history. The grandeur of military actions and the planning that takes place months and years in advance of a mission is the segment that amazes me the most. Mostly all of the grand plans are considered classified and held as top secret. The individuals that will carry out the plans of attack, mostly know little or nothing about the encounter that they are about to play a major role in. The story of this month's Cranford 86 Hometown Hero Lt. Charles Albury Jr. is just one such case in point.

Charles was born in Cranford on February 11, 1921 living first at 202 North Ave. East before soon moving to the home he grew up in at 113 Eastman Street. He attended Grant School and Roosevelt School and graduated from Cranford High School in the class of 1938, the first graduating class of the new and current high school. He was member of The Episcopal Church boys' choir and an avid Boy Scout under Scout Leader Mr. Ireland. His hobbies were tennis and reading. He attended Hobart College, an all-boys school, in Geneva, NY, receiving his B.A. degree in 1942, with plans to become a teacher of history or perhaps English.

With America being fully engulfed in the world war in 1942, Charles answered his country's call to duty. He volunteered for the Army in September of 1942, and completed infantry training at Ft. Benning, Georgia in April of 1943. He married his college sweetheart, Margaret Needham just days after. Miss Needham attended William Smith College, the all-girl sister school of Hobart.

In August of 1944 he was sent to England and soon to Holland where he saw action for the first time. With glider activity in World War 2 increasing, the demand for glider pilots was high. Charles volunteered for this very risky and exciting segment of military aviation. What Charles and the other volunteers didn't know was that there was about to be an upcoming mission requiring a need for thousands of glider pilots during an invasion the likes of which had never been seen.

The march to Berlin was well underway, with successes at Normandy, The Hurtgen Forest and The Battle of the Bulge. However, the driving armies had reached a huge geographical obstacle, the Rhine River. It stood like a wall between thousands of Allied warriors in France and the Nazi headquarters in Germany's capital, Berlin. The plan was to fly over this river wall.

Unlike the invasion on the beaches of Normandy which was supported by hundreds of offshore vessel and thousands of amphibious landing crafts, this invasion was to be accomplished with hundreds of aircraft, thousands of paratroopers and over 1500 gliders needing 2 pilots each. This need for more than 3000 pilots required the screening of nearly 4000 candidates; Lt. Charles Albury was one of those candidates.

The history of glider use in WW2 is interesting to me. I think it's worth a minute to share the basic idea. Glider technology actually was started by the Germans in 1940; the Americans took the idea and improved on it. During the war in total 14,612 gliders were built and used, ranging in size from 8, 15, 30 and the largest a 45-seater. Along with troops, they could also carry jeeps and light artillery. Mostly manufactured by The Waco Aircraft Company, many however, were made by Ford Motor Co., Cessna Aircraft Co. as well as a furniture company, a piano manufacturer and oddly enough, a coffin manufacturer. The later manufacturer was the the gliders, "Flying Coffins". Glider pilots wore a unique set of wings on their uniform similar to traditional aviator's wings, except on the center of the wings was a "G", for glider, the pilots claimed it stood for guts.

The gliders were pulled to the air by C-46 or C-47 transport planes and after release, the defenseless glider would fly silently through the night air into enemy territory. They would set down on fields hopefully undetected. Unlike

paratrooper jumps that would drop a military unit scattered across a large area without any armaments, a glider could land in a specific area allowing a unit to quickly organize and set out on their mission with jeeps, ammunition and light artillery. After landing, the gliders were left behind never to be used again, the pilots would then became part of the military unit, taking part in the mission until reaching a rallying point, where they were transported back. With the end of WW2 being only two months away, this would be the last mass use of gliders in modern warfare. Gliders while being an effective militarily tool, were extremely dangerous and accounted for many casualties from crash landings often in the dark of night. The insertion of helicopters in The Korean War made the perilous gliders fortunately obsolete.

As fate would have it, our Hometown hero experienced the danger of glider warfare first hand. On December 12, 1944 at the age of 23, while training in Newbury, England, Charles volunteered for a test flight in a glider which for reasons unknown, crashed killing all on board. He was buried with full military honors at Cambridge American Cemetery in England. In 1948 his body was returned to American soil, he is now buried near Phelps NY.

On March 24th 1945 his classmates went on to be part of Operation Plunder, the largest single day airborne drop in history. Several hundred aircraft carrying 16,000 paratroopers and 1050 troop-carrier C-46 and C-47s towing 1350 gliders moved 7,220 personnel and munitions to the east side of the Rhine River in a successful mission. This was their last hurdle to crush the already damaged 3rd Reich. Hitler, seeing the end of his rampage was nearing, took his own life on April 30, 1944. A week later on May 7th, General Eisenhower accepted the unconditional surrender of the German Army from German Col. General Alfred Jodi in Reims, France. The war was over.

A side note of interest was mentioned in a handwritten biography of Albury that is on file in the Cranford Historic Society's archives. The Albury family migrated from Newbury, England to the Bahamas in 1740. To their knowledge no family member had ever returned to their English hometown. Ironically Newbury was the site of the crash taking his life.

The gliders were pulled to the air by C-46 or C-47 transport planes and after release, the Charles Albury's wife Margaret gave birth to a baby girl on February 5, 1945. Born almost two months after her father's death, her name was Margaret Charles Albury. Besides his wife and baby, who moved to Phelps, NY, Lt. Albury left a father Charles Albury Sr., his mother Mabelle, an older sister Betty and a younger brother Ronald Graham Albury, who was a junior in Cranford High School at the time. Ronald later became an Episcopal Rector at The Church of The Holy Cross in N. Plainfield.

Lieutenant Charles Albury Jr. was a great American and one of our Cranford 86 Hometown Heroes.



## AUDITIONS FOR CDC THEATRE'S HISPANIC THEATRE FESTIVAL

Spanish-language theatre is alive and well in New Jersey. For the second straight year, the CDC Theatre will feature its Hispanic Theatre Festival (or, as it prefers to be known, its Festival de Teatro Hispanico) for four performances July 26 to 28, 2018.

Despite a large and vibrant Hispanic population of 1.2 million in the state, the creators of this event recognized that there are no Spanish-language plays being performed on an ongoing basis that cater to that community in central New Jersey. As far as the Theatre world is concerned, the beauty of the language and the richness of the Hispanic heritage is simply being ignored. Families that want to attend live theatre, do so exclusively in English. Children grow up never hearing Spanish on the stage.

Last summer, the CDC Theatre, the longest continuously-running Community theatre in New Jersey, bridged that gap by mounting the premiere Hispanic Theatre Festival. It featured two one-act plays: "Ana y las langostas (Ana and the Locusts)" by Argentine playwright Alicia Dolinsky and "Bony y Kin (Bony & Kim)" by Puerto Rican Carlos Canales. The casts were filled with local Spanish-speaking actors from Plainfield, Cranford, Union, Edison, and Linden, as well as more distant communities such as Jersey City, Perth Amboy and Fords. They represented various places of national heritage from Mexico, Cuba, Peru, Puerto Rico and Honduras.

The play being showcased this season is "Bar Manolo," a full-length comedy by European playwright Jean-Pierre Martinez. The story unfolds in a friendly, comfortable bar that happens to be across from a cemetery, and the bar owner, Manolo, relies on a steady stream of customers looking for a little respite from the activities across the street. This particular afternoon features the interplay of two philosophical funeral workers, a professor who

may or may not be having an affair with one of his students, a flooded basement, a damaged coffin, a misplaced cell phone, a lost lottery ticket, a waitress frustrated with her bad luck with online dating, a befuddled old lady and a host of other characters, all of whom Manolo greets with a friendly smile and an offer of watered-down cognac.

Auditions for the nine adult roles will be held at the CDC Theatre, 78 Winans Avenue, Cranford from 8 to 10 p.m. on Sunday, June 10, and Monday, June 11. The production is looking for men and women of various ages. Spanish fluency is not necessary, but comfort in the language is a must. Bar Manolo will be directed by Joel Redmount of Scotch Plains, who founded and continues to produce the Hispanic Theatre Festival.

Performances will take place at the CDC Theatre on Thursday July 26, Friday July 27 and Saturday July 28, all at 8 p.m., with a matinee performance on Saturday July 28 at 2 p.m. Knowing it wouldn't truly be a Festival without appropriate music and food, the Producers of the event are looking to provide complementary refreshments on Opening Night, in the spirit of the evening.

And while the CDC Theatre is looking to tap into the underserved Spanish-speaking audience throughout our geographic region, they extend an invitation also to those non-Spanish speakers who may be intrigued by the multicultural nature of this Theatre Festival. The CDC looks forward to exploring the richness of la cultura Latina, as reflected in plays that mirror the pride, the drama and comedy of the human experience, as showcased through a Spanish language lens.

Tickets will be available for purchase in July through the website cdctheatre.org or available at the box office prior to each performance. Further information will also be provided on the website.


