This event has grown larger and larger each year.

National Night Out is an opportunity to bring together the community residents and members of the public safety community in an informative and fun manner, thus building relationships with the community we protect and serve. The event provides attendees the opportunity to chat with law enforcement officers as well as fire and borough officials. This is an annual community-building campaign that promotes neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer, better places to live.

This year's National Night Out will include a large display of public safety emergency equipment from the North Plainfield Police Department and the North Plainfield

Attendees will have an opportunity to view and handle various pieces of equipment including a portable observation tower. Handouts and pamphlets will also be available on such topics as domestic violence, gang awareness, identity theft, block watch associations, and crime prevention. We also have a shredder truck, courtesy of Safe Guard Document Destruction for people to shred their documents safely.

Held annually on the first Tuesday in August, National Night Out is a free, family-friendly event designed to promote community involvement in crime prevention activities and strengthen police-community partnerships so that neighborhoods will be safer, better places to live. IMAGINE VOLUNTEERS WIN TWO GOVERNOR'S JEFFERSON AWARDS

Imagine Adult Volunteer Facilitators and Teen Volunteer Facilitators were the recipients this year of the New Jersey State Governor's Jefferson Award in the Adult Volunteer Group Award category and the Youth Volunteer Group Award category.

Each year the New Jersey State Governor's Jefferson Awards highlight the spirit of civic engagement among New Jersey's 1.5 million volunteers and provide Jefferson Awards medals in 22 categories of volunteer service.

The Jefferson Awards were established in 1972 as the official recognition program of the United States Senate. They are considered America's highest honor for public service and volunteerism.

In New Jersey the awards are also the official recognition program of the Governor's Advisory Council on Volunteerism, administered by a partnership that includes the NJ Office of Volunteerism, NJ Advance Media, the Community Foundation of New Jersey, and corporate sponsors, such as PNC Bank, PSEG, BD and others.

"Imagine adult and teen volunteer facilitators are a consistent, loving, empathic presence for the children and families we serve, providing hope and support while facilitating the mourning process," said Mary Robinson, Imagine Executive Director who nominated the volunteers. "Our volunteers are the foundation of Imagine's community-based peer support model. We would not and could not exist without them and are so grateful for each and every one of them for their commitment and extraordinary service."

Imagine offers free year-round grief support groups for families with children age 3-18 who are coping with loss due to the death of a parent or sibling or other significant family members, or who are coping with a family member with a terminal or chronic physical illness. Concurrent support groups are available for parents and guardians of the children and for young adults ages 18-30.



MOMS HELPING MOMS FOUNDATION MOTHER'S DAY CAMPAIGN

Mother's Day is often celebrated by showering the women in our lives with beautiful flowers, heartfelt cards, and taking them on special outings to show them how much they mean to us. Yet, many low-income mothers living in our community struggle each day to provide the basics for their babies.

Diapers are a necessity yet one in three families in the United States lack an adequate supply for their children. It costs approximately \$1000 per year to diaper one child. As you can imagine, the physical, mental and emotional stress that this puts on mothers can be high. In fact, studies show that lack of diapers is more distressing to mothers than not having enough food for their families.

Moms Helping Moms Foundation (MHMF) is a baby supply and diaper bank located in North Plainfield, NJ and serves Somerset, Union, Essex, Hudson and Morris counties. The organization held a Mother's Day campaign to raise dollars and diapers to support local mothers.

The generosity and response from the community was overwhelming. 19 businesses and individuals hosted diaper drives and/or collected funds. As a result, 14,276 diapers and \$4,800 have been donated. MHMF distributes 300,000 essentials to approximately 11,500 individuals each year. The donations received will ensure that diapers and other necessities efficiently and quickly go directly to those in need.

One of our diaper drive hosts was North Plainfield Nissan. North Plainfield Nissan is an avid supporter of MHMF. They donated \$2,000 to the Mother's Day campaign along with 900 diapers. Sam Asman, General Manager of the dealership, commented, "When I first learned about the great work Moms Helping Moms was doing to help women and children in our area I immediately wanted to support their mission. We care deeply about our community and partnering with Moms Helping Moms is an important way of giving back. We hope our support alleviates stress for moms who are struggling to provide

necessities for their kids."

Moms Helping Moms Foundation relies deeply on community support. Bridget Cutler, founder of Moms Helping Moms Foundation said, "The response to our Mother's Day campaign has just been incredible. We are a small, local nonprofit that depends on the generosity of our supporters to help ensure that families' basic needs are met. Diapers, wipes and baby hygiene items are always in high demand. We cannot thank our supporters enough for all they do to help us further our mission and reach more families."

Two rising seniors at North Plainfield High School attended the Rotary Youth Leadership Award weekend at Drew University this year. Laura Martinez and Maeva Guevara, members of the North Plainfield High School Interact Club, were selected to attend the conference by the Club's adviser because of their dedication and leadership. Cost for the RYLA weekend, \$275 per student, was paid by the Rotary Club of the Plainfields.

"Our club takes great pride in mentoring the members of the Interact Club," said Rotary President Roberta Smith. "We work together on projects and help the Interact members develop skills, work collaboratively with others, and have fun in the process. RYLA is the perfect opportunity for us to sponsor Interact leadership development."

Rotary District 7510 and District 7470 teamed up again this year to present RYLA, merging the best skills from both districts. RYLA was held June 15, 16, 17 at Drew University in Madison. The weekend is designed for Rotary to show the best of what it can do to inspire the next generation with the ideals of Rotary.

This dynamic, three-day program is designed to engage the students in active conversation, cooperation, and creativity to not only show them

that there are like-minded people but also how to ever forgets! engage with them to make sure their ideas come to fruition. HOW TO AVOID TICK BITES

Information from the New Jersey Department of Health

Ticks can become infected with diseases when feeding on white-footed mice and other small mammals. An infected tick can then spread disease to a person through a tick bite. You can reduce the risk of getting diseases from ticks by taking steps to avoid tick bites.

Know where ticks are: ticks live in or near wooded or grassy areas. Always walk in the center of trails to avoid contact with ticks.

Keep your yard clean: mow lawns, clear brush and remove leaf litter.

Repel ticks: use EPA-registered repellent with DEET picaridin, IR3535, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus (OLE), or 2- undecanone on skin and permethrin on clothing, boots and gear. Most repellents can be used on children older than 2 months. Products containing OLE should not be used on children under 3 years. Always follow product label instructions.

Inspect: check your entire body—and your children's— for ticks after being outside. Remove attached ticks with tweezers. Be sure to check these parts of your body and use a handheld or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body: inside belly button, back of the knees, under the arms, in/around the hair, between the legs, around the waist, in/around the ears, on the scalp.


Cover up: wear long sleeves and pants tucked into socks to prevent ticks from getting under clothes.

Shower: showering within two hours after being outside (ideally, as soon as possible) can help find and wash off unattached ticks.

Protect pets: keep pets safe by checking for ticks daily and using tick control products as recommended by your veterinarian.

ROTARY CLUB AWARDS \$43,125 IN SCHOLARSHIPS

The Rotary Club of the Plainfields recently presented scholarship awards to twenty-three graduating seniors from the class of 2018 at North Plainfield High School and at Plainfield High School.

The Rotary club awarded \$8,185 in scholarships to graduating seniors at North Plainfield High School and \$14,250 to seniors at Plainfield High School. The club also awarded another \$20,625 through the Adele DeLeeuw Scholarship Fund to past graduates of the high schools in Plainfield, North Plainfield and South Plainfield.

The local club sponsors its own F. S. Mathewson Rotary Scholarship, awarding a total of \$5,000 to students at North Plainfield High School.

The Mathewson Rotary Scholarships were presented to Gissel Martinez, Paula Yanez, Aisha Shazam, and Fiona Chen.

The Club also awards scholarships on behalf of the Plainfield Foundation, a community-based non-profit that awards funding to benefit local community groups. This year, the Rotarians awarded \$3,185 from the Leo Albert Friese Scholarship Fund to North Plainfield High student Fiona Chen. The Friese Scholarships are awarded to graduating seniors who will pursue a major course of study in science.

At Plainfield High School, the Club awards PHS Alumni Association Scholarships and J. Wilbur Tovell Scholarships to Plainfield High School seniors on behalf of the Plainfield Foundation. The PHS Alumni Scholarship Fund was established in 1986 when the PHS Alumni Association, prior to disbanding, asked the Plainfield Foundation to award their scholarships. The Foundation established the PHS Alumni Scholarship Fund. Candidates demonstrate academic achievement, participation in school activities.

The J. Wilbur Tovell Scholarship Fund was established as a bequest from Plainfield resident and alumnus of Plainfield High School. J. The other four Rotary clubs awarded an additional \$34,375 to students from their communities.
