COLLARD GREENS

Most Americans associate collard greens with the south where they are very popular. There are annual festivals in cities like Atlanta and Savannah.

Collard greens are the official state vegetable of South Carolina. It's impossible to imagine southern cuisine without collards, grits or barbeque.

Research indicates that collards originated from wild cabbages found in Asia where it was consumed by humans before recorded time. From Asia it spread to Europe where it was grown by the Greeks and Romans in home gardens and eventually became established throughout Europe. Early European settlers brought collards to America by ship. After their arrival, African slaves added their own cooking styles which has become an important part of our traditional American cuisine today.

Nowadays, collard greens are widely consumed worldwide in many countries, including India and Brazil, where it is an important ingredient in national dishes. Collards are included in New Year's celebrations and eaten for good luck.

Collard greens are a leafy vegetable from the same family as cabbage and broccoli. Collards are a cool season vegetable that when planted in September can be harvested into early winter. Resistant to frost, they are one of the first crops that can also be planted in early spring, two to four weeks before the last frost. Many people claim that frost helps increase the flavor of this vegetable.

Closely related to kale, collard greens require similar care. A moist soil, rich with compost that is not permitted to dry out and receives full sun.

When started from seed in late August or September, follow the directions on the label for basic care of your seedlings. Collards require one inch of water a week. They are light feeders and

when planted in soil enriched with compost do not require additional fertilizer.

Collard greens are considered a 'super-food' with impressive health benefits. They are known to purify the liver and eliminate toxins from the body. They supply vitamins and minerals that have many positive effects on the body. They even supply antioxidants which offset early aging, promote hair growth, and help prevent disease such as diabetes. Too numerous to write here, more information on the health benefits of collard greens can be found online and are well worth researching. Sadly, many people over boil these thick greens which leaches most of the nutrients out.

Other cole crops (cold weather crops) that can be planted now include cabbage, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower and kale.

If you would like a quick harvest autumn vegetable, you can plant lettuce.

It grows fast and will last until the first frost.

A TALE OF THREE HIGH SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Another September has arrived and the annual ritual of students returning to classrooms will soon begin, following a practice that in Rahway dates back to 1851 when the city's public school system was established. At that time, education was only offered at the grammar school level where learning the 3Rs was deemed sufficient for one's worldly knowledge. It would take another sixteen years before classes were offered to students desiring a higher education. Since that time, three buildings have been built and used as Rahway's institutions of higher learning.

THIRD WARD SCHOOL/LINCOLN SCHOOL

The public school system started in 1851 and within a year, three grammar schools were built – Columbian, Washington, and Franklin. Ten years later, a Board of Education was incorporated and on August 5, 1867, a resolution was made to establish a high school that would have its own principal. Until a suitable high school could be built, classes were assigned to a room in Washington school. Students seeking admission into the class had to pass an exam and go before an examining committee consisting of the superintendent and two board members. The first principal was William B. Durie.

In 1873, the Third Ward School was built on an open field on Central Avenue just east of St. Georges Avenue. It would serve both boys and girls of grade school and high school age. High school classes were located on the second floor of the three story brick building. The first graduating class (1874) consisted of six students, four girls and two boys.

In 1899 the Third Ward School was renamed Lincoln School and remained the high school until 1910. Lincoln School would continue to serve the Rahway community as a grammar school until 1964. It was razed on September 2, 1965. Today, the site contains a playground and five municipal tennis courts.

CAMPBELL STREET HIGH SCHOOL

The need for a new, more modern high school building was apparent by the turn of the century, and when land became available on the corner of Elm Avenue and Campbell Street, the Board of Education purchased the property. On July 24, 1909, a cornerstone was laid for a three story structure with full basement that would contain modern features that included science rooms, art rooms, typewriting rooms, a room for manual training, and a balconied auditorium with a seating capacity of 700. There were seven classrooms for high school students on the second floor and five rooms for seventh and eighth graders in the basement. There was so much room that students from Clark and Carteret attended the school.

The abundance of room, however, would be short lived and by the 1930s (the Post World War I babies were becoming teens), the school was bursting at the seams. While the class of 1911 had 27 graduates, the number would grow to 174 by 1935. To deal with the growing population, several measures were taken. In 1927, the seventh and eighth grades were moved to Roosevelt School and by 1932 students from Clark and Carteret were no longer accepted. In 1934 a six room annex was added in the rear of the school, portable structures were erected, and rooms were rented in the YMCA, St. Mary's Church, and the Lutheran Church on Campbell Street. Once again, it was clear that a new school was needed.

The last class to graduate from the Campbell School High School graduated on June 18, 1940. There were 220 students in the class, the largest in school history to that date. After the high school moved, the city converted the building into their new city hall facility and would use it for that purpose for the next 43 years. The building still stands after being converted into condominiums in the mid-1980s.

MADISON AVENUE HIGH SCHOOL

Prior to the late 1940s, most of the area west of Jefferson Avenue was woodland and open fields. When a seven acre tract on Madison Avenue at the end of Central Avenue became available in 1938, the Board of Education bought it with funding assistance from the Parks Works Administration of the Federal Government for \$15,000, and the construction of a new state-ofthe-art building was soon underway. The new high school featured an auditorium, gymnasium, cafeteria, library, industrial arts rooms, and science rooms. As adequate as this building was thought to be when built, it soon experienced the same overcrowded conditions as the Campbell Street School, this time caused by the baby boomers of the Second World War. By 1959 the graduating class size had grown to 260 students and the board was forced to initiate split session schedules. Under this system, sophomores, juniors, and seniors would attend classes from 7:30 A.M. to noon while 7th, 8th, and 9th graders would go from noon to 4:47 P.M. To illustrate just how crowded it was, the class of 1965 graduated 508 seniors, still the largest class in school history.

By the 1964-65 school year improvements were finally made to help alleviate the overcrowded conditions. A new science wing was added to the high school and a junior high school was built a block away.

Over the years, improvements have continued to be made to keep the school up to date. In 1986 the exterior of the building was restored, new lockers were installed, and classrooms, hallways, and lavatories were modernized. In 1987 the auditorium was renovated with new lighting, carpeting, and cushioned seats. A new gym was added in 1996. Most recently a new performing arts center was added, portions of the school were air conditioned, and the science wing was completely refurbished.

RAHWAY'S ANNE COLLART NAMED VP OF CASA OF UNION COUNTY TRUSTEES

Rahway's Anne Collart was elevated to vice president of the board of trustees of Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Union County. The attorney with Gibbons in Newark practices commercial and criminal litigation, and criminal defense. She and husband Neil each trained as volunteer advocates to work with Union County foster youth.

CASA of Union County recruits, trains, supervises and supports community volunteers to advocate for abused, neglected and abandoned Union County children removed from home and placed in foster care or residential facilities. There are nearly 500 Union County children in foster care.

Collart said, "I am absolutely thrilled to be taking on a greater role with CASA of Union County and serve as vice president of the board of trustees. Our volunteer advocates really do such tough work, trying to connect with and lift up children who are at what will probably be the lowest point of their childhoods: being taken away from their home and their parents. Having been an advocate two years, and working with a little girl removed from home and then abused in her first foster home, I can tell you that my role now is far easier. I very much look forward to the opportunity to support our volunteers and help the organization continue to develop so we can meet our goal of providing a CASA volunteer for every Union County child who needs one."

"We are so pleased Anne has taken on the vice presidency," said Executive Director Marla Higginbotham. "Her time in the advocate trenches and her commitment to and understanding of the needs of these youth, as well as her upbeat spirit and approach to any task dovetail into an ideal candidate to guide the organization in the coming years."

Other changes to the board of trustees include elevation of Mountainside's Ron Silver to president, a retired dentist who trained and served as a CASA volunteer advocating for several foster youth for six years; and new members real estate agent Terry Gould of Westfield and Edison attorney Adam Rothenberg of Scotch Plains. Gould has served as a CASA volunteer in Connecticut and New Jersey, and Rothenberg's wife Christie has advocated for five Union County foster youth over the last four years.

Through court-ordered access to foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, CASA volunteers ensure a child's best interests remain a priority while working toward establishing a safe, stable and permanent home. THE GOAL IS CONTROL: RWJ AND YMCA TEAM UP TO CONTROL DIABETES

If you have diabetes, the goal is control. Control your blood sugar levels and you reduce the risk of heart disease, kidney disease, blindness and neuropathy. Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital Rahway and The Gateway Family YMCA-Rahway Branch are teaming up to help uninsured people control their diabetes with a free, six-week education and exercise program.

"Diabetes control is more than diet. It's medication management, exercise, balancing meals and snacks, managing stress. People want to do the right things regarding their diabetes, but they often don't know how," said Angela Bacque, MPA, RPh, CDE, Pharmacy and Diabetes Self-Management Program Manager at RWJ Rahway. "This program gives them the tools they need."

The program includes the expertise needed to help control high blood sugar. It features diabetes educators, exercise experts, a pharmacist and nurse. Topics will include medication management, stress management, and tips like the timing of meals with glucose checks. There will be light exercise at each session by a YMCA fitness expert, as well as a healthy lunch and incentives.

"Exercise plays an important role in learning to control your blood sugar levels. Communitybased organizations like the YMCA play a key role in chronic disease prevention, increasing access to services that are outside of a traditional clinical environment," said Krystal R. Canady, CEO of The Gateway Family YMCA. "In partnership with Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital Rahway, programs like this can help change behaviors and improve lives." The first six week program is open to those without insurance or whose insurance does not cover diabetes education. Caregivers are welcome. The session begins Tuesday, September 18 from 11:30 am to 1 pm at the YMCA and runs each Tuesday for six weeks. The YMCA is located at 1564 Irving Street, Rahway. After six weeks, another six week program will begin in the Rahway area. Registration for these programs is required. To register, please call 732 499 6109.

For those who have insurance, including Medicare and Medicaid, the hospital runs a Diabetes Self-Management Program, offering one-on-one counseling. That program can be reached by calling 732.499.6109.
