KAI LORIMOR IS BLAZING HIS OWN N.J. RODEO TRAIL

Kai Lorimor of Warren is helping to put New Jersey on the rodeo map. The 14-year-old boy started bull riding just over a year ago and joined the New Jersey High School Rodeo Association. Today, he is the state Bull Riding champion, All-Around Cowboy and Rookie of the Year for the junior high school division. He completed his first year with a trip to the National Junior High School Finals Rodeo in South Dakota, and recently competed in the Koloa Plantation Days Rodeo in Hawaii, where he took the winning buckle for steer riding in the three-day event.

Typically know as a Western sport, Kai fell in love with bull riding after viewing a YouTube video.

"I thought it was cool and I asked my parents if they could find me a place where I could learn," Kai said.

He soon found a home at Luck of the Draw Bull Riding in Monroeville, which is in South Jersey. He trains alongside professionals and "goes through about three or four bulls" during a session, testing himself at a higher level each time.

Kai remembers that the first time he got on a bull he fell off even before they could lift the gate.

"Once I did it, though," he said, "it was such an adrenaline rush. I was hooked."

Under the tutelage of Scott Lynch, his coach at Luck of the Draw, Kai has come out of the chute blazing.


"I feel that he's the reason why I've had so much success," Kai said of his coach. "He just doesn't tell you how to get on the bull, he shows you. And he explains everything."

Lynch also serves as an inspiration for his student. Lynch was 35 when he broke into the sport and pursued a professional career until he tore a muscle in his shoulder. That's one of the reasons why the very young rider has set his goals so high.

"I want to be the youngest Professional Bull Riding Champion ever, at the age of 18," said Kai, who just completed Warren Middle School and will begin Watchung Hills Regional High School in September.

Kai has a ton of respect for rodeo pros "who never quit and always get up." He is well aware that bull riding is a dangerous sport, and broken bones and worse are always possible.

"You really have to want it," Kai said. "I pray before I ride. My faith is one of the things that keeps me going."

Judging by Kai's success so far, there's no telling how far he can go in this sport or how long he will continue to ride.

"At least until my 50s or something like that," he said. "It doesn't have to be professional then, it's just something that I love to do."

Luck of the Draw Bull Riding has a practice pen for all levels. No experience is necessary and gear is provided at no additional cost. "Bull Riding School" sessions are conducted on Saturdays and Sundays each month.

FREE DOCUMENT SHREDDING EVENT IN AUGUST

"Operation Secure Shred," the free documentshredding program for Somerset County residents, returns with an event date in August.

The next free document-shredding program for Somerset County residents will be held August 25 at the Somerset County Public Works South County Facility, 410 Roycefield Road in Hillsborough from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Freeholders and the county's Public Works Department invite residents to take advantage of the drop-off program for easy, no-hassle shredding of personal documents.

"Properly disposing of personal documents is a necessary step in safeguarding and protecting your personal information and credit and in preventing identity theft," said Freeholder Brian G. Gallagher, public works liaison. "We are pleased to be able to provide this very popular service to our residents again this year, in collaboration with our municipalities."

All events are held rain or shine, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., or until the trucks are filled to capacity, at which time they leave and the event is over for that day. A valid New Jersey driver's license to confirm Somerset County residency is required. Pre-registration is not required. No businesses are allowed.

Residents from all 21 Somerset County The Somerset County Board of Chosen municipalities are invited to have personal documents shredded at as many free, on-site mobile paper-shredding events as they wish to attend. Residents do not have to reside in the town hosting an event to participate.

> Documents will be commercially shredded safely, privately and properly by trained, licensed and bonded document-destruction specialists. Staples and paperclips do not have to be removed. Residents may bring documents in up to six boxes, containers or bags per visit and will be asked to take back their receptacles. Residents may stay and watch as their documents are shredded.

> Junk mail, magazines, and newspapers will not be accepted. This shredding opportunity is not open to businesses.



WARREN TOWNSHIP LAUNCHES NYC COMMUTER PARK & RIDE

announce the opening of the Warren Park & Ride.

As of September 4, 2018, Warren Township residents who commute between Warren and the NY Port Authority Bus Terminal can park in the Parking Deck of Building 300 of the Warren Corporate Center off King George Road near I-78 Exit 36 and take an express bus connecting the Township to PANY.

Spaces assigned specifically to the commuters are being made available by the Center's owner, Vision Real Estate Partners, through an agreement with the Warren Township.

Lakeland Bus Company of Dover, New Jersey, will provide a brand new 57-seat ADA-compliant express bus which will leave Warren Township weekday mornings at 6:45 a.m. directly for NYC (there are no stops between the Park & Ride and the Port Authority Terminal). Commuters can return in the evening from NY Port Authority at 5:45 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The returning bus is not a Warren-only ride; therefore passengers will have to tell the driver to bring them to the Warren Township lot.

The idea for the commuter lot grew out of a survey of nearly 900 Warren residents conducted by the Township Committee with the professional assistance of Ridewise, a commuter advocacy group, and the Somerset County Planning Board. The Committee used the results of the survey to encourage Lakeland Bus to provide dedicated express service from Warren to the NY Port Authority.

"Warren residents who completed the survey

The Warren Township Committee is pleased to were very strongly in support of a Park & Ride in the Township, so the Committee worked hard to address that need," said George Lazo, Township Committee Liaison to the project. "By showing that 86% of those who responded wanted the Park & Ride, we were able to convince Lakeland Bus that there is a significant ridership in Warren for dedicated express service to the NY Port Authority."

> According to Committeeman Lazo, the location at Warren Corporate Center is a temporary one. The Township Committee will evaluate the program and then determine a permanent location for the commuter lot.

> Mayor Victor Sordillo expressed his appreciation to Vision Real Estate Partners for assisting the Township in providing available parking at their facility.

> A permit is required to use the lot. Warren Township residents can obtain the permit by contacting the Warren Township Clerk's Office. Registration is on a "first come, first serve" basis. There is currently no fee for the permit, but Warren Township residents must show proof of residency.

> "The Park and Ride enhances the quality of life for many Township residents and improves property values for all of us," said Committeeman Lazo.

The Jewish Family Service (JFS) recently celebrated the charitable work of Knead to Feed, a challah bread baking organization based out of Temple Har Shalom in Warren. The Community Service Recognition Award was presented to Knead to Feed founders at the JFS' 38th annual meeting on June 6, 2018.

Kneed to Feed at Temple Har Shalom was born out of a sermon delivered by Rabbi Randi Musnitsky in 2013 about the plague of hunger and food insecurity in New Jersey. What resulted was congregants coming together to bake nearly 100 loaves of challah and mandel bread a month, fostering a stronger sense of community and engaging members of their congregation through the exploration of Jewish culinary art. As the loaves are sold, every bite of the fresh challah goes to fight hunger, and to date -the congregation has donated over \$25,000 to local hunger-related organizations.


