

WESTFIELD'S TERRY GOULD JOINS CASA OF **UNION COUNTY TRUSTEES**

CASA of Union County is a nonprofit organization that recruits, trains, supervises and supports community volunteers to advocate for abused, neglected and abandoned Union County children removed from home and placed in foster care or residential facilities. There are nearly 500 Union County children in foster care.

Gould, who also serves as the board's advocate liaison, was a CASA volunteer in Connecticut and, after relocating to the Garden State, she trained with CASA of Union County as well. In total, she has served four years advocating for foster youth. The certified public accountant held various posts in finance and accounting, including with Paramount Pictures in Los Angeles, is now is a Realtor with Sotheby's International Realty.

A personal injury attorney at Levinson Axelrod in Edison, Rothenberg said, "I am honored and excited to join the board of CASA of Union County. Its mission is a unique opportunity to advocate solely for the well-being of children in the foster system. I look forward to assisting to advance the goals of CASA to benefit those children and hope we ultimately can get a CASA volunteer for every child who needs one." His wife Christie is a CASA volunteer. He was gala chairman for the organization's Foster the Dream Gala in 2016.

"We are so pleased Terry and Adam joined the board," said Executive Director Marla Higginbotham. "Both have personal connections to our work: Terry has been a CASA volunteer in two states, and Adam's wife is a long-time volunteer who's advocated for five youth and he's seen firsthand the responsibility — and reward — that brings. Add to that Terry's finance experience and Adam's work as an attorney to

Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) help those in crisis, the board expects to continue to flourish with their added support and expertise."

> Through court-ordered access to foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, CASA volunteers ensure a child's best interests remain a priority while working toward establishing a safe, stable and permanent home. CASA of Union County currently serves half the county's youth in care; its goal is to provide an advocate for every child. To do that, more volunteers are needed.

FIRST UNITED METHODIST MISSION TEAM SERVES IN LONG ISLAND


The team spent the week working on a driveway for a woman whose home was destroyed during Superstorm Sandy. "There is still so much work to be done, even six years after Sandy," said Kylie Haskins, who is the Youth Coordinator at FUMC Westfield. "There were only two streets where we were working that didn't still have condemned houses on them."

The team poured four concrete slabs in total during the week, which included prepping the areas with form boards and wire mesh, mixing 80 pound bags of concrete by hand, and leveling and finishing the areas. "We did a lot of hard work, but it was so amazing to help someone in need and to see how grateful our homeowner was. The girls were incredible, and I couldn't be more proud of how they embodied God's love this week," said Mrs. Haskins.

WALKING ACROSS AMERICA FOR DRUG OVERDOSE AWARENESS

On Day 132 of their journey, Brett Bramble died of a heroin overdose in 2014. Two years and John "Stick" Azerolo, after having walked more than 1,700 miles, reached Westfield High School. The two left Key West, Florida on January 27, 2018 on foot, walking approximately 20 miles per day at roughly 3 miles per hour to raise awareness about drug overdose prevention, addiction, and recovery.

Speaking to WHS students on Friday, June 8, 2018 Bramble, whose aunt is a Westfield resident, detailed the reasons behind this arduous East Coast journey. He spoke candidly about being molested as a teenager and his subsequent addiction to opioids and trouble. He also spoke from the heart about his sister, Brittany, who became addicted to prescription painkillers and

after her death, he walked 3,200 miles from the Atlantic to the Pacific Oceans to honor Brittany and to tell her story.

Having reached hundreds of thousands of people along the way, it was only a few months later that Bramble decided to start walking again, with Azerolo joining him.

"A victim of a drug overdose is not just a statistic," Bramble told the WHS students. "They are loved by someone."

Bramble and Azerolo urged the teenagers to educate themselves about the dangers of drug use and to not be afraid to call 911 if they suspect someone is overdosing. They described the many people they have met on their northward march, often someone with a tale of having lost a loved one to a drug overdose.

Bramble's response when asked about the most challenging part of this trip. "We receive constant hugs and tears on the side of the road."

"There isn't a day that goes by that I don't cry," Azerolo added.

Yet, while "a huge challenge," Bramble says it is one he and Azerolo welcome if they can continue to raise awareness to what they call "the drug crisis in America."


"She's dead. She's dead," Bramble said starkly at one point, pointing to a picture of sister Brittany. "Drugs did that."


The pair reached Calais, Maine on August 21, 2018 after 202 days of walking. This walk, Bramble notes on his website, is "a small step in a greater purpose to start a transitional retreat that will help people recover from troubled pasts."

IMAGINE VOLUNTEERS WIN TWO GOVERNOR'S JEFFERSON AWARDS

Imagine Adult Volunteer Facilitators and Teen Volunteer Facilitators were the recipients this year of the New Jersey State Governor's Jefferson Award in the Adult Volunteer Group Award category and the Youth Volunteer Group Award category.

Each year the New Jersey State Governor's Jefferson Awards highlight the spirit of civic engagement among New Jersey's 1.5 million volunteers and provide Jefferson Awards medals in 22 categories of volunteer service.

The Jefferson Awards were established in 1972 as the official recognition program of the United States Senate. They are considered America's highest honor for public service and volunteerism.

In New Jersey the awards are also the official recognition program of the Governor's Advisory Council on Volunteerism, administered by a partnership that includes the NJ Office of Volunteerism, NJ Advance Media, the Community Foundation of New Jersey, and corporate sponsors, such as PNC Bank, PSEG, BD and others.



WALK IN SUNSHINE HELPS FAMILIES WHO HAVE LOST A YOUNG CHILD

child, Joseph, over a year ago, they began to ask questions that no parents should have to: Who transports our child so we can get a proper autopsy? How much does everything cost? What exactly do you bury or cremate a child in that's age appropriate? These are just some of the questions they struggled with, and after speaking to other parents suffering a similar loss, they knew they weren't alone; hence "Walk In Sunshine" was created.

Based in Westfield, NJ, the 501c3 not for profit charity Walk In Sunshine seeks to provide financial assistance to local families who have lost a young child, while providing online resources for families all around the world.

"We know firsthand that after the loss of our son, Joseph, everything was a blur," said the couple. "It can be difficult to sift through vendors and figure out what resources are available. We are hoping this website can help ease some of the burden a family faces in the immediate wake of a child loss."

The website features a variety of online resources such as support groups, links to books, memorial keepsakes, and information to apply for financial aid. Walk in Sunshine has pledged to donate \$1,000 to any vendor of the Westfield's family choice who have lost a child under the age of 18.

"Easily 50% of the plots in the Infant Section at Fairview Cemetery do not have a headstone. Some of this certainly is financial," said Lou.

When Lou and Francine Magrone lost their Walk in Sunshine is here to help in those circumstances. "The loss of a child is all too familiar to many in Westfield, and knowing there are other families searching the internet for blogs, or a special way to remember their loved on, we thought Walk In Sunshine could be the one website that could meet all these needs."

In addition, the website features a Memory Wall, where parents can submit information for free that can help their child be remembered and connect with fellow grievers. Parents can also post a photograph or write a few words about their loved one. "We would love for this memory wall to be shared all over the world," said Francine.

"We would love to hear from other families who have lost children in the Westfield area, or from anyone who has any feedback about our site," said Francine. "We hope to be able to donate money to the surrounding towns in Union County beyond Westfield as early as 2019."

As Walk In Sunshine grows in its capacity it will look to hold events, fundraisers, or even a 5K race in Westfield, NJ.

Butler, son of Kristan McCarthy of Mountainside and Nat Butler of Westfield, is a native of Mountainside and a graduate of Governor Livingston High School. He was a walk on to the Florida State University Football team but cycling is a relatively new endeavor for the 22 year old. An exceptional all-around athlete, he played football, basketball and tennis at his high school and is always looking for his next challenge.

"With over 1.6 million new cancer cases diagnosed in 2017, approximately half of them were rare cancers so we all know someone who has been touched by rare cancer," said Butler. "Committing my ride to such a great cause while



A 12-year Army veteran, Ed had a long career in small business consulting and accounting services. He also spent six years in higher education, helping a small college through the national accreditation process.


Proving that you can never stop learning, Ed is currently working on a Doctorate in Business Administration.


