GENNARO NIGRO STARTS PRO SOCCER CAREER WITH ROMA

It's a long way from Clark, N.J., to Rome, Italy. About team's facilities. 4,295 miles, that is. It's an even longer journey from the soccer pitches of New Jersey to the hallowed grounds of Stadio Olimpico, the home of Roma, one of the top teams in the world, but Gennaro Nigro may be on his way.

In July, the recent Arthur L. Johnson graduate was signed to play professional soccer by Roma's U19 team, Primavera, which is similar to minor league team for Major League Baseball.

Nigro, a dual national, is eligible to play for Italy and the United States. He made his professional debut on Sept. 6, 2018.

"Nigro had a moment to remember over the international window," starsandstripesfc.com reported about his debut. "Nigro subbed on in the 81st minute for Javier Pastore in a club friendly against Benevento, an Italian second division club. The 18-year-old Italian-American moved to AS Roma this summer to join the U-19 team, but it looks like he is impressing to already be getting a crack with the first team. Let's hope he can continue to impress."

The Clark native is the son of Jerry and Leslie Nigro and has a sister, Gianna. He is now living outside of Rome at the

Nigro is only the second American player at the club since Michael Bradley's debut in 2012, so Roma saw something in the New Jersey teenager to bring him to one of the hotbeds of Italian soccer. Cornell University saw it too.

"Gennaro is undoubtedly one of the most versatile soccer players we have ever come across," said Cornell head coach John Smith.

Nigro was prepared to play soccer for Cornell and attend its business school in the fall before the offer was made by Roma.

"He is equally gifted in both feet, and could slot in and excel in any of the back eight positions," Smith said of Nigro. "He has superb feet, and he combines this with a great engine which definitely puts him into the category of a boxto-box midfielder. Gennaro can score and create goals, and he combines this with a great drive and work ethic, which he puts to incredible use on defense."

A defensive midfielder by trade, Nigro paved his path to Rome with five years of play for Players Development Academy in Zarephath, Somerset County. He also played for the Red Bulls Academy.

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CONNIE DWYER BREAST CENTER AT TRINITAS NOW OPEN

In alignment with Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Trinitas Regional Medical Center announces the early October opening of the \$3.4 million Connie Dwyer Breast Center. The Center is located at Trinitas' main campus, 225 Williamson St., Elizabeth.

Breast cancer is the second leading cause of

cancer deaths among women in the U.S., according to the American Cancer Society, and far too many women in the greater Elizabeth community go without prevention, education or proper care.

Trinitas has partnered with The Connie Dwyer Breast Cancer Foundation to bring a highly empathic approach to screening, diagnosis, treatment, and community outreach and education to all women, regardless of financial status, in a brand new facility that evokes comfort and a sense of well-being.

The Breast Center, staffed with board-certified bilingual specialists, offers the most up-to-date equipment and services available, such as 3D imaging, which allows radiologists to view the breast tissue in several layers. This breakthrough technology can detect 41 percent more invasive breast cancers and can reduce false positive results by up to 40 percent.

The American Cancer Society recommends that all women over the age of 40 have regular breast exams and mammograms. Most women who undergo screening will be healthy and not require further services until their next scheduled screening. However, patients who require continued care will meet with a Breast Navigator, a highly trained guide who answers questions and assists patients through the process of diagnosis and treatment.

Dr. Adriana Suarez-Ligon, Breast Surgeon, says, "With the generosity of Connie Dwyer, the new breast center at Trinitas will be a beautiful, calming and comprehensive center for women in our community to have everything from their yearly screening mammograms to the latest diagnostic studies. In addition, it will be a onestop shop where care will be coordinated for the patient among our dedicated, compassionate multidisciplinary care team."

Connie Dwyer's story is one of bravery and enormous good will. A known philanthropist, Connie was first diagnosed with breast cancer in 1999 and had a double mastectomy. Inspired by her own ongoing battle, she became mindful of the fact that many women who are uninsured or under-insured and low-income often have limited or no access to critical care. That's when she and a dedicated group of friends began a grassroots effort, where she worked tirelessly to create awareness and raise funds. By 2005, the doors of the first Connie Dwyer Breast Center had opened.

"My experience is a testament to the fact that early detection, quality care, and being monitored by knowledgeable professionals makes the difference between life and death," says Connie, who after 19 years, was re-diagnosed here at Trinitas with metastasized breast cancer in December 2017, and yet, remains steadfast in her determination to help others.

"In partnering with Trinitas, the Connie Dwyer Breast Cancer Foundation has joined a collaborative team of doctors, technicians, patient advocates, and professionals to design a breast center that will provide access to the best science has to offer – by way of breast cancer screening, diagnosis and treatment."

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GIAN PAUL GONZALEZ SPEAKS TO CRUSADER FALL ATHLETICS

On Wednesday, September 5, 2018, members of the Crusader Fall Athletics met in the Arthur L. Johnson High School Auditorium. The student athletes had the pleasure of meeting and interacting with guest speaker Gian Paul Gonzalez, who talked to the fall athletes on the topic of being "All In".

During the New York Giants' 2011 Super Bowl run, much of their inspiration is attributed to Gian Paul Gonzalez (pronounced John Paul). Prior to the Giant's Christmas Eve game with the NY Jets, Gonzalez delivered the now famous "ALL IN" rally cry message during the Giants' chapel service, and is now widely recognized as having inspired the New York Giants to their Super Bowl victory. He has been featured on ESPN on Super Bowl Sunday, and has had notable appearances

on Fox News and CNN. He has traveled across the nation as a motivational speaker for the NBA's Portland Trailblazers, to the Army Cadets at West Point, Sam's Club, Patch.com, as well as to many other corporate, athletic, government agencies, and educational institutions.

Gonzalez, a high school teacher in Union City, N.J., was asked to lead a chapel service for members of the New York Giants team the night before the team's Christmas Eve 2011 game against the New York Jets. There was little hope then that the team would make it to the playoffs.

To illustrate the concept of commitment Gonzalez handed each football player a poker chip and instructing them to write their number on one side of the chip and write what they wanted to be committed to on the other side. He then shared with the team the meaning behind the poker phrase "All In". He inspired them to be committed and put all their "chips" on the table.

"We are faced with decisions every day at which time we can decide to be fully committed, or all in," says Gonzalez, a former All-American forward, who passed up a professional basketball contract to continue his work with at-risk youth. "I said to the players, 'I want you to fully commit to being all in on something."" Gonzalez went on to urge players to fully commit to anything they take on, whether as a father, husband, son or even, a football player.

The day after Gian Paul's chapel message the Giants beat the Jets 29-14. In a post game

interview, Giant's Defensive End Justin Tuck credited the chapel speaker's message of being "All In" as the reason for the Giants win that day. The team went on to win every game, up to and including Super Bowl XLVI, where they beat the New England Patriots 21-17.

Gian Paul Gonzalez is himself an inspiration. He was a former NCAA First Team All-American forward from Montclair State University scoring nearly 1,400 points in his 3-year career. He played with the LA Clippers in their NBA Summer League in 2008 and was offered a few professional basketball contracts, yet he turned them down in order to continue his work with atrisk youth.

He is a gifted motivational speaker and continues to strive for excellence in inner-city public schools and juvenile jails, for which he has received the 2012 New Jersey Hero Award from New Jersey First Lady Mary Pat Christi.

Gus Kalikas, Athletic Director at Arthur L. Johnson High School, had this to say about the event. "Arthur L. Johnson High School was thrilled to have Gian Paul Gonzalez come and speak to us on the topic of ""All In," said Gus Kalikas, Athletic Director at Arthur L. Johnson High School. "Gian Paul reached all of our student athletes and left them with great strategies that will not only help on the fields, courts, and mats, but also in the game of life. He was a true professional and inspires while delivering a wonderful message."

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UNITY AWARD PRESENTED TO UC EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

Fifteen individuals and seven organizations recently received the Union County Human Relations Commission's prestigious Unity Award for Achievement, an honor given to role models who dedicate their time and efforts to activities and programs that raise and honor the human spirit.

The 2018 awards marked the 17th year in which the Commission has named honorees.

The Union County Emergency Response Team (UCERT)/ USAI NJ PRIDE was honored for aid deployment to Puerto Rico.

Below is preprinted from the event's program. The team included UCERT/SWAT/USAI Commander Martin Mogensen; Patrolman Alexander Ruiz, Clark Police Department; Officer Elliot Bernard, Fanwood Police Department; Patrolman Sean Kaverik, Kenilworth Police Department; Detective Edward Nortrup, Roselle Park Police Department; Officer Dragan Ristovski, Township of Union Police Department; Detective Daniel Fay, Union County Prosecutor's Office; Officer Sean Holcomb, Union County Prosecutor's Office; Lieutenant James Guerrant, Union County Sheriff's Office; Sergeant Manuel Cruz, Union County Sheriff's Office.

This Unity Award was given in recognition for emergency response to help residents of Puerto Rico by assisting local law enforcement in the wake of hurricane devastation.

On Wednesday, September 6, 2017, Hurricane Irma - a Category 5 storm with 175 mph winds carved a merciless path of destruction through the Caribbean, killing at least 44 people, leaving thousands of others homeless, and plunging more than 1 million residents of Puerto Rico into darkness.

Two weeks later, on Wednesday, September 20, 2017, Hurricane Maria - which, despite weakening to a Category 4 hurricane by the time it stuck Puerto Rico - devastated the island, decimated buildings, crippled communication,



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hundreds of recipients dead or missing. Its previously damaged electrical grid was also compromised.

The Catastrophic damage, coupled with the devastation of other islands in the area, compounded relief efforts. Maria was the tenthmost intense Atlantic hurricane, and the worst natural disaster on record in Puerto Rico. For weeks, in MAria's wake, most of the island's population suffered from flooding and lack of resources, compounded by the slow relief process.

Union County stepped up to help. Nine Union County law enforcement officers who are members of the Union County Emergency Response Team (UCERT) traveled to Puerto Rico in the wake of the hurricane to help keep law and order there.

The officers, under the command of Union County Police Department Captain Martin Mogensen, who commands UCERT, Union County's SWAT team, and the Federal Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI), went in two deployments in October and November 2017 to provide relief. Coordinating with the New Jersey State Police, Puerto Rican State Police,

drenched it with intense flooding, and left and San Juan Police, they provided community outreach assistance, infrastructure protection, and traffic control points.

> The Union County officers relieved local officers who had been working long shifts daily and wearing regular clothes because they couldn't wash their uniforms. Their radios didn't work either. They communicated by waving each other down, or by cell phones when they were able.

> Two months after the storm, the officers had to struggle on a daily basis for the necessities: food, water, fuel for their generators.

> The officers agreed that the images seen on TV and online di not capture the enormity of the damage: Roads with giant fissures, downed utility poles, epic food and water shortages, no traffic lights, gridlock, cars disabled or struck sitting on the side of seven-lane highways, and lack of power. Crime and violence were also a dangerous byproduct of the hurricane aftermath. Day-to-day life was exhausting.

> We salute the members of the UCERT team who put their comfortable lives here at home on hold while they reached out to help fellow officers and the residents of Puerto Rico in the aftermath of the tragedy.
