RESIDENTS RAISE FUNDS TO SPONSOR HEROES' BANNERS

Following the Cranford Memorial Day parade last May, the Cranford 86 project dedicated an initial set of banners recalling local fallen heroes. The banners, which depict each of their likeness, were on display throughout Memorial Park, while their previously published stories were summarized from the dais in a moving ceremony. Over 100 booklets containing the full stories were purchased, as many attendees were enlightened about this new movement started by members of the Memorial Day Parade Committee and the Cranford Historical Society. The banners were made possible because of sponsorship by family members of the fallen, plus several of Cranford's civic and charitable organizations. The banners were subsequently displayed on telephone poles around town. During the ceremony, it was suggested that future banners might be sponsored by Cranford residents whose street was named in memory of those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The idea of such a tribute did not fall on deaf ears. One resident, Eric Rubinson, of Alan Okell Place, came forward after the conclusion of the ceremony. He said he would like to raise money from his neighbors to fund a banner honoring Alan Okell. We soon heard from Eric and were thrilled to hear that his neighbord had supported the idea enthusiastically. Eric had collected more than the \$200 sponsorship fee. Alan Okell's article was researched and written the following month; his banner will be ready in time for Memorial Day 2019.

Eric had read in that article that Roger Norton was a Cranford High School homeroom classmate of Alan Okell, and also one of our Cranford 86 heroes. In fact, their pictures in the 1936 yearbook were right next to each other. Eric and others soon expanded their door-to-door campaign, raising funds from residents of Roger Norton Place. He called back and said their enlarged campaign was successful, having raised the additional \$200 needed to also sponsor a banner in memory of Roger Norton.

Out of curiosity, I inquired about Eric's fundraising efforts, and how he inspired other neighbors to support the Cranford 86 project. He told me about his neighbor, Shannon Tallon, and her two children, Sam and Violet. Thirteen-year-old Sam is a First-Class Scout with Cranford's Troop 80 Boy Scouts developed a fundraising advertisement (exhibited here) as fulfillment of one of his merit badge requirements. Violet, his seven-year-old sister, developed the graphics -- a fundraising goal thermometer – like the United Way display on the North Avenue railroad overpass. The Tallons went door to door, left

their fliers, and gradually raised the level of their progress thermometer as the donations accumulated.

One of the great things about living in a small town like Cranford is how charitable initiatives like these take root. We would like to thank the residents of Alan Okell Place and Roger Norton Place for their generosity and patriotic spirit and appreciate the Rubinson and Tallon families for their fundraising leadership.

We also received a surprise letter from Arlene Fricke of the Cranford HS Class of 1966 Reunion Committee, which included a check for \$507 to sponsor their classmate, Raymond Ashnault, who died in Vietnam. Finally, a retired U.S. Army veteran from Cranford, Don Smith, came forward, offering to sponsor both Stanley H. Smith and Roderick W. Smith Jr., neither of whom are his relatives, but because he felt a kinship sharing the surname Smith.

Our stories and pictures of the Cranford 86 will continue next month, as we move closer to our goal of introducing all 86 Hometown Heroes to the people of Cranford. For without such men, life in Cranford as we know it today, may have been vastly different.

TWO CRANFORD RESIDENTS TAKE OATH TO ADVOCATE FOR AREA FOSTER YOUTH JUDGE SWEARS IN 13 CASA VOLUNTEERS

represented recently by volunteers sworn in as court appointed special advocates (CASAs), thanks to residents Judy Eisenhardt and Dorothy Wolf.

"When someone asks me how I joined CASA," noted Eisenhardt, "I tell them, 'I didn't find CASA. CASA found me.' I first heard about CASA seven years ago when my daughter went to college and joined a sorority that supports CASA. Since then, I saw a jury duty presentation and a good friend became a CASA volunteer. The idea was always in the back of my mind but the timing wasn't right. After my youngest graduated college, my friend persuaded me to give it a try and here I am. Our training was thorough and I learned a lot about what children in the foster system experience. I'm looking forward to supporting a child, giving them a voice and ensuring outcomes are in their best interest."

Superior Court Judge James Hely administered oaths to Eisenhardt and Wolf, and others from Elizabeth, Fanwood, Hillside, Linden, Plainfield, Rahway, Roselle, Scotch Plains, Summit and Westfield, before they were matched to a foster youth or sibling set ranging from birth to age 21. After court observation of experienced CASA volunteers in action, the new advocates will meet their assigned youth.

Volunteers with Court Appointed Special Advocates of Union County are extra eyes and ears for family law judges hearing cases involving abused, neglected or abandoned children removed from home and placed in foster

Cranford is among 11 Union County towns care. With court-ordered access to such parties as foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, the advocates incorporate findings into court reports for the judge and work to ensure the youth's needs are met and best interests are protected. CASA volunteers serve another important role for their youth: being a constant amid a flurry of unknowns and changes, including multiple caseworkers, foster homes and schools.

> This class ranges from age 23 to 70 and includes parents, non-parents, business and medical professionals, county employees, retirees

and homemakers. One was adopted from foster care and another has guardianship of nieces from the system. Most had no prior knowledge of the foster system.

It's crucial that each of the more than 500 Union County foster youth have an advocate. As the only organization filling this role, community volunteers are still needed, and are encouraged to join one of the fall training sessions that begin September 17 (evenings) and October 12 (daytime). 

TEMPLE SHOLOM COMMEMORATES THE 80TH ANNIV. OF KRISTALLNACHT DR. MAGDELENA WROBEL OF THE LEO BAECK INSTITUTE TO PRESENT PERSONAL STORIES AND REPORTS FROM JEWS AFFECTED BY POGROMS IN 1938 NAZI GERMANY

Temple Sholom of Scotch Plains announces its 2018 Kristallnacht program to be held on Sunday, November 4 at 7:00 p.m. Dr. Magdelena Wrobel, Project Manager for the Leo Baeck Institute of New York and Berlin, will present "Posts from the Past: Personal Stories on the 80th Anniversary of Kristallnacht and the Events of 1938." These personal stories are reports from Jews from 1938. The Leo Baeck Institute is the premier repository for archival materials from German and German speaking countries in Europe.

Eighty years ago, on November 9, 1938, the Nazi party escalated its anti-Semitic campaign against the Jews through a pogrom in Germany, Austria and part of Czechoslovakia. Prior to that, in March 1938, Nazi Germany annexed Austria (the Anschluss); at the end of September 1938, England, France, Italy and Germany signed the infamous Munich Agreement which allowed Nazi Germany to annex parts of Czechoslovakia and eventually led to the dismemberment of that country. And on December 2, 1938, the kindertransport began, eventually sending 10,000 children from Germany, Austria and Czechoslovakia to safety in England and elsewhere, most of whom never saw their parents again.

Dr. Wrobel earned her Ph.D. from the Ludwig-Maximilians University in Munich in 2013 and has served as a visiting scholar at the University of Haifa, University College London and Columbia University. Before coming to the Leo Baeck Institute in New York, she worked at the Jewish Foundation for the Righteous in their Rescuer Support Program and served as Assistant to the Ambassador at the Permanent Mission of

the Republic of Poland to the United Nations.

GIRL SCOUTS OF CRANFORD HOLD ENCAMPMENT AT HANSON PARK

More than 350 Girl Scouts from the Girl Scouts of Cranford Service Unit 48 and their volunteer leaders held a two-day encampment at Hanson Park, on September 22 and 23, 2018. For many of the girls, this was their first overnight camping experience and it included a wealth of learning experiences as well as volunteerism. With the enthusiastic support of the township, local police and fire department, and the Hanson Park Conservancy, more than 25 tents were pitched in Hanson Park, several nestled among a grove of trees a short distance from the scenic Rahway River. The Girl Scouts returned the kindness by planting more than 100 annuals in the park on Sunday morning.

"The Girl Scouts were so generous to donate a sum of money so we could purchase about half of these beautiful plants. I'm so impressed by their willingness and their enthusiasm to help and their creativity. They are doing an amazing job," said Cynthia Dawley, president of the Hanson Park Conservancy. "We hope they learn that this park is maintained by volunteers, like themselves. I love to see the pride they are taking in their work today and I hope it helps them view parks a little differently."

The seasonal planting session added mums, kale, asters, pansies and millet to the grounds. Dawley explained that Dreyer Farms provided the vegetation at a discount and delivered the products which helped the Girl Scouts make an even bigger impact. The Girl Scouts also helped beautify the grounds by weeding, picking up refuse and maintaining pathways.


The planting community service was the culminating event of the encampment which began on Saturday afternoon with Outdoor Frenzy from 1:45 – 4:00 p.m. Those activities included insect and plant identification, first aid, knife safety, compass skills, map reading, campfire building skills, flag etiquette, teambuilding, and more. The second installment, Enhanced Outdoor Frenzy, was held from 4:15 -8:00 p.m. and included tie dye, self defense and confidence building, radio communication exploration, outdoor art, and scavenger hunts. Girl Scout Daisies, Brownies, Juniors, Cadettes, Seniors, and Ambassadors were also able to work toward badge completion in several areas. The evening concluded with a campfire, approved by the Cranford Fire Department, and a sing along, before the girls retired to their tents.

"This was a great experience for these girls," said Kristin Santos, Service Unit Manager of Service Unit 48. "According to the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., girls today are not spending enough time outdoors – not to mention, many have never gone camping. It was wonderful to create a local space to provide our girls with that kind of experience so close to their homes and we could not have done it without the support of the Cranford community."

Santos explained that aside from older Girl Scouts leading many of the Outdoor Frenzy skill building stations, many different groups came together to support the encampment and she expressed gratitude for their willingness to collaborate to make the event a success. Thanks are due to the Township of Cranford, the Hanson Park Conservancy, the Cranford Historical Society, Cranford Police and Fire, Cranford First Aid Squad, Calabria Pizza, Cranford Canoe Club, Cranford's Best Bagels, Dreyer's Farms, Great Swamp Outdoor Education Center, Girl Scouts of Heart of New Jersey, Hands of Life Martial Arts, HOME Power Yoga, Pizzeria Del Giordano, Tri-County Radio Association VFW Post 335, Vinny's Pizza and many more.

"Our Girl Scout families felt the Cranford love this weekend," Santos said. "These are our future leaders. Aside from learning outdoor-based skills this weekend, the girls honed team-building and leadership skills and grew in their friendships. Memories were made for the girls and their leaders," Santos said. The Girl Scouts of Cranford boasts over 1,139 Girl Scout Members in 71 troops and Juliette's making it one of the largest non-profit organizations in town. 



'HERE COME THE HOLIDAYS,' A COLLABORATION BETWEEN THE THEATER PROJECT AND THE MENTAL HEALTH PLAYERS

The holidays are coming, bringing the stress we love to hate. Family gatherings can be delightful or disastrous, and the anticipation of a potential food fight can be worse than the cleanup.

To prepare for these joyous events, the Mental Health Association in New Jersey's New Jersey Mental Health Players and The Theater Project are collaborating to present 'Here Come The Holidays' on Monday, November 5 at 7:00 p.m. at the Cranford Community Center. Sponsored by the Friends of the Cranford Public Library, this interactive presentation is designed to brainstorm and strategize about that familiar balancing act: breaking bread with people we may avoid the rest of the year. Admission is free.

In 'Here Come The Holidays,' actors will present two scenes involving the preparations for a family get-together with some of the crossgenerational, political, and familial culture clashes we know so well, but just before the food begins to fly, a moderator from the Mental Health Association in New Jersey, John Rogers, will invite the audience to comment and dialogue with the character/actors. The goal is for the people in the room – spectators and performers – to leave with some insights and tools for coping with the festive season.

The Mental Health Association in New Jersey's New Jersey Mental Health Players is a highly successful, interactive community

education program. The program uses trained volunteers to depict realistic scenarios involving mental health and substance use issues. These presentations provide audiences with a dynamic way to receive basic education about behavioral health problems and become sensitized to the stigma that is often associated with them. Performances usually consist of two customized, audience-specific scenes, each of which is followed by an opportunity for the audience to interact with the players and to ask questions about the issues that have been presented.

Now in its 24th season, The Theater Project is dedicated to nurturing new work and exploring issues of community concern through its play selection. Past presentations have included 'Prop 8' (marriage equality), 'Stuff Happens' (the Iraq war), and most recently, 'Exit Pursued By A Bear,' a comedy about a woman who empowers herself to escape from an abusive relationship. "The race is a great way for the community to come together over the Thanksgiving holiday," said Ryan McGann, executive director of Friends of Colin.


"I think it is wonderful where runners come from our community, both Garwood and Cranford, and all over the East coast. All the proceeds from the run directly benefit pediatric cancer research, and while we give thanks, we can also give forward by participating in the run

Last year's winners were Will Smith, Cranford, who ran 17:27, for men's first place finish; and Abby Keisling, Washington, DC, who ran 22:19. for women's first place finish. Many of the participants run the race competitively, and others choose to walk the route.

Friends of Colin formed after the death of 16year-old Cranford resident Colin Maher. Colin died after a fight with Ewings Sarcoma, an aggressive bone cancer. His neighborhood friends decided to continue fighting the disease and to raise money for Dr. Jeffrey Toretsky, a Georgetown University doctor who is trying to find a cure. Friends of Colin also holds an annual Easter Egg Hunt fundraiser in the spring.
