

ST. THERESA THANKSGIVING TRADITION IN KENILWORTH

On November 17th, 2018, several Kenilworth community civic groups came together to help the Saint Theresa's Social Concerns committee organize 300 bags containing the makings for satisfying and delicious Thanksgiving meals for families in need. All the food had been donated.

The Kenilworth PBA #135, Kenilworth Silver Card Association, Kenilworth Fire Department & Rescue Squad, Kenilworth Veteran's Center, and Percaro Trucking together donated funds to purchase 265 turkeys. The Garlic Rose Restaurant in Cranford, arranged for their distributor to provide the turkeys at wholesale price. The turkeys were added to the bags to be distributed to families. An unexpected snow storm delayed the delivery of the turkeys and so an extra effort was made to get the dinner bags assembled on the day of distribution, November 17, the Saturday before Thanksgiving.

The Social Concerns Committee provides food year-round to needy families and their pantry is always in need of restocking. No appointment is necessary to make a donation. Non-perishable foods and gift cards to any supermarket can be left in the Crying Room in the Church on Sundays, and the Rectory during business hours Mon. - Fri. 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. Supermarket gift cards and checks made payable to St. Theresa's can be mailed to Social Concerns c/o The Church of

With Thanksgiving behind them, Social Concerns is collecting donations for a "Giving Tree" which is located in St. Theresa's church.


The tree is decorated with tags with needed items written on them. Donors simply take as many tags as they wish and return the items to the church for distribution.

KENILWORTH COMMUNITY HONORS VETERANS

Veterans Day, Sunday, November, 11, 2018, marked the 100th Anniversary of the end of World War I.

As they do every year on this day, Kenilworth VFW Post 2230 honored all veterans by celebrating a Mass at St. Theresa's Church, and then hosted a service at 11 a.m. at the VFW Hall.

On Saturday November 3, 2018 the Post organized a Flag Deployment at Graceland Cemetery where volunteers decorated the graves of veterans.

The ceremony was led by Post Commander Robert Jeans and was attended by VFW Boy scout Troop 83 who posted the colors. The visiting dignitaries included an invocation by Chaplin Ed Sulenski, VFW 2230; Kenilworth Chief of Police Chief Zimmermen; and Mayor Anthony DeLuca, among others. Refreshments were served after the service.

Mayor DeLuca read a proclamation from the Borough which stated in part "On Veterans Day, we salute the soldiers, sailors, airmen, marines, and coast guardsmen who have rendered the highest service any American can offer, and we rededicate ourselves to fulfilling our commitment to all those who serve in our name; and our community has a continuing sense of gratitude to those who have gen so much in the defense of the freedoms, and we are reminded of our solemn obligation: to serve our veterans as well as they have served us."


WHAT, WHERE, AND WHEN IN OLD KENILWORTH – KENILWORTH'S FIRST CHRISTMAS TREE

The spirit of the Christmas season has graced many villages, towns, and cities across the land for centuries. Generations ago communities began to designate an "official" Christmas tree standing at some prominent location within its borders to herald in the holiday. Decades ago this became more ecumenical with towns adding a

The spirit of the Christmas season has graced Jewish menorah and symbols of other faiths.

Early Kenilworth was no exception. Records suggest that the Borough's first official Christmas tree was placed about the year 1920 near the old Borough Hall. The Senior Citizens Center now occupies that site.

Residents gathered there to sing Christmas

carols to help usher in this festive time of year. Wide-eyed children no doubt licked candy canes as they scampered about the tree during the singing. The tree was adorned with electric "candles" as the lights then were called. A treat for locals as many still used waxed candles or no lights at all on household trees. Christmas trees for the home were sold along the Boulevard by various groups including the Volunteer Fire Department which did so on the grounds of the old Kenilworth Inn Stables where the Wells Fargo Bank now stands. Boy Scouts continue that welcomed tradition by selling trees at the VFW Center on So. 21st St.

In the 1930s the Borough began to decorate an evergreen growing on the lawn of the public library rather than placing a cut tree near the borough hall. The library stood for over 40 years but was cut down in the early 1980s to make way for the then new addition to the library. Residents ended up getting two trees for the price of one as two large evergreens at the front of the present Municipal Building were awarded the honor of becoming the community's official trees. The grounds annually are beautifully decorated for the joyous occasion. And yes, a menorah is displayed as well.






The new LED sign will assist with the promotion of library services and programs, bring community awareness, and provide better visibility for the library.
