## **DIAL-IN TO HEAR A STORY FROM A LIBRARIAN**

Librarians read and record new stories weekly, now accessible via phone

Oh, it's Miss Amy reading a story!" exclaimed North Plainfield resident Micah Henry, 5.

Earlier this summer, the Somerset County Library System of New Jersey (SCLSNJ) launched a new service for children - a phone-in storytime, aptly called Dial-a-Story. Librarians system-wide have been taking turns recording weekly stories for Somerset County residents to enjoy from home, from the car, or anywhere they wish.

"Dial-a-Story is a free early literacy service that allows the librarians of SCLSNJ to extend storytime and connect with our youngest patrons - directly in their homes," said Amy Behr youth services department supervisor for SCLSNJ's Warren and Watchung library branches. "It is perfect for bedtime stories, short car trips, or simply spending quality time with your child(ren). Each week - on Friday - listen and follow along to a newly featured book specially selected by your friendly SCLSNJ librarians."

"Dial-a-Story is part of SCLSNJ's SOARING (Supportive Opportunities for Achieving Reading In the Next Generation) initiative," said Jen Fitzgerald, youth services librarian at SCLSNJ's North Plainfield Memorial Library branch.

Continued Fitzgerald, "Decades of research confirms the importance of reading aloud to foster children's development and learning. Dial-a-Story is another way for Somerset County children to hear books read aloud to them in addition to our collection of Vox books, playaways, and CD books. And, of course, we encourage all parents and caregivers to use print and eBooks to read aloud to their children as well."

SCLSNJ's SOARING initiative is designed to help parents navigate early childhood programming and resources, learn the different strategies used to support early literacy through each developmental stage, and replicate those strategies at home. The newest offering within the Library's SOARING suite of services is thus far a big hit.

"My 6-year-old daughter Mikayla loves Dial-a-Story. After I dialed and gave her the phone she was elated to hear the familiar read aloud. Excitedly she shouted 'I love this story, Mommy!' When it was finished I received more hugs and thank-you's than I knew what to do, just for dialing the number. Now she dials up on her own. Can't wait for the new story every Friday." said North Plainfield resident Kesha Carter.

Even older children are enjoying the service. "My son is 9 years old and reads at a high school level, and he found this thrilling," said North Plainfield resident Janet Costello.

## ANN VOLLUM'S "BEASTLYBEASTIES" ART EXHIBIT AT THE WATCHUNG ARTS CENTER

During the month of November, the Watchung Arts Center will present Ann Vollum's "BeastlyBeasties" in the Lower Gallery. The exhibition will be on display from November 1 to November 28. An opening reception will be held on November 4 from 1 to 4 p.m. The reception and exhibition are free and open to the public.

Over the years, Ann Vollum has explored the organic meanderings of the subconscious mind; her work is primal and un-schooled. "I am obsessed with detail, line and pattern. All my pieces start with organic shapes, which are transformed into Beasties. I do not use sketchbooks; I always work directly on my final pieces enjoying the creative process as my works evolves."

Her pieces tell a story with an unwritten script inviting the viewer to use their own imagination and give the piece their unique interpretation. She has developed a "language" of "characters" that re-appear time and again. Look for bats, snakes and of course Beasties with sharp teeth and long tongues in her work. Often there are Beasties inside Beasties... the question is, are they dinner or offspring... the viewer is left to decide.

During her years as an artist, Vollum has worked with many mediums and techniques, and is now excited to be working with textiles. "I started by cutting lace like pieces from Tyvek, progressed onto cutting painted fabric and using the cut design as a stencil. A need to develop these explorations further, led me to introduce hand stitching and needle felting, which I am now using to do more colorful pieces on un-cut cloth. I am excited by these techniques; the possibilities are endless and fascinating to me."

Ann Vollum was born in Zimbabwe, Africa in 1963. She has a BA in Architectural Studies and worked for many years as an Art Director and Graphic Designer. Vollum has exhibited her art in the USA and UK. Her work has been shown at many galleries including: The Herb & Milly Iris, SOPAC; The Pierro; Rupert Ravens Contemporary; Riker Hill Art Park; Museum of Early Trades & Crafts; JCC MetroWest: The Gaelen Steiner Court; The Firehouse, The ValleyArts Community; The West Orange Arts Council; and Brooklyn Brewery, USA; Framers and Croft Wingates, UK. Ann's work has appeared in The NY Times, June 5, 2014; Lark Crafts: 500 Handmade Books; Matters Magazine; The Book Arts Roundtable exhibition catalogs and Mail Me Art: Short & Sweet. Ann lives and works in South Orange, New Jersey.

## Watchung 9/11 Memorial

The Watchung 9/11 Memorial is designed to create a meaningful place where the plaque, with the piece of steel from the World Trade Center, will be on display. The structure's coloring and form are engineered to embrace the park's natural beauty, with a stacked stone look reminiscent of the old Wetumpka Falls. The concrete and stone structure will be augmented with granite that was once part of the base of the Statue of Liberty. Visitors will enter the surrounding walls where the plaque is mounted on a slanted stone pedestal. The piece of steel from the World Trade Center is embedded in a pink heart-shaped block, inside a white marble rectangular block. The direct interaction of placing one's hand on the heart is suggested by the design. The height will be assessable for both young people and adults.

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## HOMECOMING GAME WAS ALSO WHITE OUT AGAINST BULLYING NIGHT

On the same night that the 9 members of the 2018-2019 Homecoming Court were escorted by family out onto mid-field for the annual Varsity Football Homecoming Game, the Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) student body and many of the spectators in the stands wore white to show support for the annual "White Out Against Bullying" Night, sponsored by and organized by the WHRHS co-curricular activity, Diversity Club.

All this happened on Friday night, September 21, in Tozier Stadium at WHRHS. On the field, the Warrior football team never gave up, battling until the end. Nevertheless, the perennially-strong Elizabeth High School Minutemen prevailed 42-0.

Everyone who attended the game was invited to sign a banner bearing the Diversity Club's slogan: "White Out To Stop Bullying: Stand Up Speak Out Stop Hate." Last year's banner, identical to this year's banner, bearing the signatures from last year's White Out Against Bullying Night, has been on display near the Social Studies classrooms since last year for anyone who want to view it.

Homecoming Court

As soon as the Homecoming Court was introduced and assembled at center field at the game, Seniors Brad Pinho of Millington and Anna Baitel of Watchung were announced as the annual Homecoming King and Queen for 2018-2019. The King and Queen and the balance of the Homecoming Court were selected by a vote of their fellow Class of 2019 classmates. The Homecoming Court are: John Kolibachuk, William Broder, Amay Mehta, Arianna Valenti, Kayla Martins, Lauren Soled and Anchal Dhir, all of Warren Township, in addition to King Pinho and Queen Baitel.

Other highlights of the Homecoming Game and White Out Against Bullying Night halftime festivities included a performance of this year's halftime program of the WHRHS Marching Warrior Band and Color Guard. The spectators were also treated to a spirited performance of the WHRHS Cheerleaders, complete with multiple tumbling and stunt routines, and multiple lift demonstrations. The squad showed its ability to incorporate as many as seven lifts simultaneously in several of the complex cheer routines.

#### White Out Against Bullying

Some students wore their own articles of white clothing. Others wore this year's new specialty white T-shirt that bore the silkscreened message: "White Out Bullying/WHRHS 2018." Previous years' T-Shirts sported the White Out slogan, "Stand Up Speak Out Stop Hate," and many in the crowd wore those.

In the spirit of the White Out Against Bullying Night theme, the Homecoming Queen and female members of the Homecoming Court all wore white dresses. Likewise, the King and male members of the court wore white shirts. Many of the court's family members who accompanied the students out onto the field also wore white.

The Warrior players all wore their white home field jerseys. Even the Elizabeth team's uniforms had white block numbers, which seemed more noticeable given the night's White Out Against Bullying color theme.

The Drum Majors of the WHRHS Marching Band always wear entirely white uniforms, and the white sashes and broad white stripes in the band's uniform sleeves appeared much more noticeable, in support of the White Out theme. As always, the cheerleaders wore white bows in their hair, and they used white pompoms to accentuate and punctuate their cheers and routines.

WHRHS has been recognized as a national leader in efforts by American high school student to encourage everyone to "Stand Up Speak Out Stop Hate," and to personify the term "upstanders."

In 2015, WHRHS Diversity Club students Sarah Decker and Monica Mahal attracted the attention of several New Jersey lawmakers, including powerful New Jersey State Senator Tom Kean Jr., the Senate Minority Leader. His Senate district includes WHRHS' own Warren Township, Watchung and Long Hill Township. The students gathered hundreds of signatures online, and in June 2015, the New Jersey legislature approved a resolution that declared the state's support for the campaign to include the word "upstander" in both the Oxford and the Merriam-Webster dictionaries.

"Upstander" is defined as: "A person who speaks or acts in support of an individual or cause, particularly someone who intervenes on behalf of a person being attacked or bullied." An example of how it can be used in a sentence is: "Encourage your daughter and son as well as your family, friends and classmates, to be upstanders."

Over the years, students of the WHRHS Diversity Club have addressed the governing bodies of Warren Township, Watchung, Long Hill Township and Green Brook Township, during open public municipal meetings. The students were warmly received by lawmakers, many of whom are themselves either WHRHS alumni, and/or parents of WHRHS students or alumni.

Diversity Club students have also held workshops for students of the middle schools of each of those towns, most of whom are future WHRHS Warriors themselves, and/or children of or siblings of WHRHS students. The WHRHS students have often shared tips on how the middle school students could start or strengthen their own efforts to Stand Up Speak Out Stop Bullying and to be Upstanders. The educational outcome, according to Diversity Club faculty advisors, has often been that both the middle school students and high school students learn from the experience, and that this learning is particularly memorable because it is coming from fellow older or younger students.

WHRHS has received recognition as a model for "Facing History and Ourselves" initiatives, according to Diversity Club faculty advisors, WHRHS Social Studies teachers Jamie Lott-Jones and Mary Sok. The White Out and Diversity Club initiatives against bullying have also benefited over the years from the support of numerous WHRHS teachers, staff, parents, Board of Education members, local lawmakers, and interested members of the community, they said.

#### Spirit Week Classroom Presentations

Sok and Lott-Jones have also developed a White Out Health Presentation that Diversity Club students delivered to about 20 classes of freshman as part of an annual Spirit Week inclassroom follow up to the White Out Against Bullying Night Homecoming game.

The Lesson Plan includes a power point presentation that answers the question, "Why Anti-Bullying?" It fills in the first year students on the history of the initiative at WHRHS, and shares various photos that have appeared in the local media and other publications, as well as videos that have been generated about the antibullying initiative.

The lesson also supplies Diversity Club students with prompts and questions that club members can use to stimulate classroom discussion with the freshman classes, and offers ancillary discussion topics that can be used by break-out smaller groups of students. Among the topics are various notable examples from the news across the country where students have experienced bullying. Students are also reminded that bullying can take place in school as well as in social media platforms, such as Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

The Diversity Club students also make it clear to the first year students that they are more than welcome to become active members in the Diversity Club.
