WHS BLUE DEVILS MARCHING BAND ROARS INTO SEASON

The lion roars and 125 musicians and dancers spring into action hunting for courage to face their fears in Westfield High School marching band's 2018 production.

The super-sized yellow bricks used in the performance, entitled Goodbye Yellow Brick Road, represent the road to find that courage and we hear from band members about the things that worry them.

Band Directors Chris Vitale and Trevor Sindorf surveyed their teenage musicians before the start of the season and asked them to share their own anxieties which have been incorporated into the show as voiceovers.

We hear them say: "I'm afraid that my grades won't be good enough," "I'm afraid that I won't meet my parents' expectations," and "I'm afraid that time is moving too fast."

The end of the performance sees them gather up the yellow bricks from their journey and use them to build a throne for the lion who is ceremonially crowned in a scene reminiscent of The Wizard of Oz.

Elton John's Goodbye Yellow Brick Road is just one of the pieces of music given a new interpretation by the band.

The others are Man of Steel, a theme associated with Superman, and a classical piece by Shostakovich.

The Marching Blue Devils travel to the University of Delaware for their next competition, the annual Mid-Atlantic

Marching Band Championship.

Drum Major Mary-Joy Sidhom said: "We are all super excited. It's our first of three big competitions so, even though there's a lot of pressure, everyone is getting hyped up for the weekend.

"We put so many new elements into the show and we are so excited to debut it in Delaware.

"Everyone's been working hard for the past two weeks and I feel we are ready to put a great performance on the field."

Mr. Vitale warned his students that, with 26 bands competing from eight states, the competition would be very challenging.

He said: "Of the three years we've attended this event, this is the strongest pool of bands I've seen attend this regional. Competition will be tough!

"Several of the bands attending this weekend's contest finished in the top 25 nationally at previous Bands of America Grand Nationals.

"I am positive that the students will have a great experience. Our hope is that being among these programs will continue to inspire and motivate our students."

In October the band competed in the state championships at Rutgers University and in November will travel to the MetLife Stadium for the national competition.

ROTARY CLUB OF WESTFIELD COLLECTS BIKES FOR CHARITY


On Saturday, October 13, 2018, The Rotary Club of Westfield collected bikes to donate to the third world. Chairman Warren Rorden started the project with the Rotary Club in 1998, and he states that we have collected 2,300 bikes in that time. Eleven Rotarians came to the collection today at the Board of Education Building on Elm Street, Westfield. Today we collected 50 bikes, including both children's and adults, 9 sewing machines and donations of \$850. The cash donations help with the shipping costs. These bikes are going to Honduras.

Every year, Americans purchase 50 million bikes and throw 20 million in the landfills. When we recycle them to the third world, several good things happen. Cultures which use bikes for transportation are much more productive than cultures where the people must walk everywhere.

The bikes are sold for a small amount to help cover shipping costs; bicycle shops need to be created to maintain the bikes, so the program creates jobs. Bikes do not create air pollution, they are green. The Americans get a tax deduction for the bike and the donation, and they get to clean out their garage. The Rotary Club looks good, the people in the third world benefit, and everyone wins.

The Rotary Club of Westfield has been doing service projects in town for 98 years. In June they planted 25 trees on Dudley Court. They also run the largest scholarship program in town, awarding more than \$100,000 per year, and another \$20,000 in Community Grants. The Rotary Club meets the first three Tuesdays of the month for lunch at 12:15 p.m., on the second floor of the Y. Guests are always welcome.

"LIFELONG WESTFIELD" IS FOCUS OF SENIOR SERVICES EXPO, NOV 16

Lifelong Westfield, a new town initiative to attract and retain seniors, will be the focus of a Senior Services Expo on Friday, November 16, 2018 from 9 to 11 a.m. in the Community Room of the Westfield Municipal Building, 425 E. Broad Street. The event is free and a light breakfast will be served. Senior citizens, family members and caregivers are encouraged to attend.

The Senior Services Expo will promote local non-profit organizations and businesses that cater to the senior market, including transportation, fitness, counseling and more. Attendees will also have the opportunity to learn about Lifelong Westfield and to participate in a survey aimed at determining the needs of the senior community.

Lifelong Westfield is a new initiative of the Mayor's Senior Advisory Council, a volunteer group that includes representatives of the Westfield Town Council, Westfield United Fund, Westfield Senior Citizens Housing, a licensed geriatrician, and other volunteers. 






Maher will focus on outreach and missional engagement during his time at St. Paul's and will be ordained a priest later this year.

Maher began his religious journey and was ordained as a Deacon after a successful career in the music industry. Maher has performed in venues ranging from prisons, to pubs, to cathedrals. He performed upon invitation at the United Nations summit for the anniversary of its Millennial Goals toward the Eradication of Extreme Poverty and has received two national songwriting awards from the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers: 'Socially Conscious Songwriter of the Year' and 'Lyricist of the Year.' Additionally, Maher shared the stage in the US and Europe with numerous celebrity musicians such as Loretta Lynn, Kris Kristofferson, George Jones, Mavis Staples, Wilco, Suzanne Vega, Rickie Lee Jones, Steve

EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT TO CREATE NEW HOME FOR TOWN BELL

A Westfield boy scout will be ringing the changes at Reeve House by building a new home for the town bell.

Alexander McGrail is to build a pedestal for the bell outside the home of Westfield Historical Society, on Mountain Avenue, as part of his Eagle Scout project.

Alexander, 17, explained: "The bell is currently parked at the side of the Historical Society house on a trailer, wrapped in a tarp, and comes out once a year for the Memorial Day parade."

The Westfield High School senior feels a particular connection to the bell because he was born in the UK in a town very close to Sheffield where the bell was created and his grandfather worked in the steel industry which built the bell.

He said: "I feel as though the bell is such an important part of our town's history that it deserves a special home where it can be of it rather than it be under cover all year and displayed."

The bell started life hanging in Prospect Street School from 1869 to 1921 where it served not only as the school bell but also as the town's fire

It was rung to mark the armistice at the end of WWI before it was moved to the steeple of Madison Avenue Presbyterian Chapel where it remained until the congregation disbanded in 1985 and placed it in storage.

After it became the property of the Presbyterian Church of Westfield, it was donated to Westfield Historical Society who restored it, along with Westfield DPW, in time for Westfield Bicentennial in 1994.

Nancy Priest, President of Westfield Historical Society, said: "It will be wonderful to have the bell out where it will be visible and people will be able to come and learn the history

then briefly go past in a parade when people don't really see it."

Architect and Historical Society volunteer Greg Blasi, of Vincentsen Blasi Architecture, has donated his services to design a pedestal for the bell which it is estimated will cost \$2,000 to build.

The first task will be to dig a foundation three feet deep and Alexander will be roping in fellow scouts from Troop 72, based at the Presbyterian Church, to help him with that.

He would be very grateful for any donations to help pay for the project. WEEK OF RESPECT IN WESTFIELD PUBLIC SCHOOLS

At Wilson School, Grade 3 teacher Lynn Kraus reads "Chrysanthemum" by Kevin Henkes, whose title character is teased about her name.

"Chrysanthemum wilted," Kraus says to her students. "I want you to think about whether respect is happening here."

The third graders later break into small group discussions after watching a short video that tracks an act of kindness from one person to the next in a community, just one of many lessons and activities across the Westfield Public School District as students and staff observed the Week of Respect.

In each of the district's 10 schools, the emphasis was on the meaning of respect and the ways students and staff show it. For example, Franklin School previewed the week with a codifferentlorful assembly focusing on the Six Pillars of Character and "The 7 Habits of Happy

Kids" by Sean Covey. Each student donned a tee shirt (in red, orange, yellow, green, blue or purple, depending on grade level) with one of the six pillars written on the back – Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring and Citizenship.

Kindergartners in Joellen Surace's class listened to "Have You Filled a Bucket Today: A Guide to Daily Happiness For Kids" by Carol McCloud. The book's central theme focuses on an invisible bucket we all carry and the chances we are given to fill someone else's bucket with kindness and respect. The youngsters filled the kindergarten bucket with kind thoughts "so that we all feel safe and respected," said Mrs. Surace. They wrapped up the lesson singing and dancing to "Try a Little Kindness" from Sesame Street.

Tamaques 2nd graders explored empathy with the use of a shoebox, a pencil and some crayons. "Empathy means you put yourself in someone else's shoes," said school counselor Marybeth Herits. "You really try to understand how they are feeling." Using different colors for different

emotions, the students illustrated how a hypothetical child who is struggling with math might be feeling.

Intermediate students at Edison and Roosevelt were treated to a powerful presentation as Dr. Paul Wichansky – who was born with cerebral palsy and hearing loss - talked about the transformative nature of kindness and the importance of positivity.

"Respect is something we practice daily in Westfield Public Schools. So we called this week "Week of Extra Respect," says the Superintendent Dr. Margaret Dolan. "I am thankful that we have so many caring teachers, administrators and other staff who model respectful behavior every day and who routinely incorporate lessons focusing on empathy, responsibility, fairness, and other characteristics that enforce the district's mission 'to educate all students to reach their highest potential as productive, well-balanced and responsible citizens who respect individual differences and diversity in an ever changing world.""

The Westfield Service League's Consignment Baptist Church). and Thrift shops have reopened for business for the 2018-19 calendar year.

"We are bursting at the seams with merchandise thanks to our generous donors and committed consignors," said League President Kim Taylor. "In addition to finding great deals, our customers help given back to our community."

A welcome new addition this year: the shops are now able to process credit card payments; previously only cash and checks were accepted.

"There are myriad ways you can help us with our mission of 'putting used goods to good works'," Taylor said. "If you're in the process of moving or downsizing, for example, please keep us in mind for all of those items you longer have use for. Have brand new items that you've never used hanging in your closet? Consign them with us. And, of course, we're always looking to grow our membership."

With the exception of a few paid staff, The League Thrift and Consignment shops are run by volunteers who sort and stock merchandise, maintain all operations, and determine grant recipients. 



FCC RETURNS FROM SUMMER MISSION TRIP TO NORTH CAROLINA

'Whom Shall I Send?" is a verse from the book of Isaiah that at its core is about serving others. It's a belief that members of First Congregational Church (FCC) of Westfield embodied during this year's Summer Mission Trip to Johns River Valley Camp, an outdoor ministry site of the United Church of Christ etched into the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains in Collettsville, North Carolina. Johns River Valley Camp offered an ideal setting in which the FCC youth and adults could team together to address poverty and environmental issues.

After arriving at JRVC, twenty-four youth and fifteen adult and college age chaperones partnered with Habitat Restore to beautify a local Habitat for Humanity location by weeding, mulching and planting flowers; F.A.R.M Cafe (Feed All Regardless of Means), a "pay what you can" restaurant; participated in river clean up on the Johns and New Rivers, involving canoeing down river to pick up litter along the banks; helped at a local shelter sorting and loading a clothing distribution truck; built handicap ramps so that two families were no longer housebound; and engaged in painting kitchens and home repair.

There was no cell service and limited Wi-Fi at the camp, which truly enhanced a sense of community. In the evenings, the group would reflect on the day's activities and work to understand the profound ways both they and those they served made a difference in one another's life. This was epitomized by Earl Baise, a master carpenter from the camp who worked with the FCC group throughout the week. Rev. Joy Mounts, Associate Minister of FCC, spoke of Blaise this way: "When you worked with Earl, you felt his kindness, his goodness and the way that he truly cared about each project - no matter how large or small."

In their free time, the FCC group visited the town of Boone for river tubing, shopping and a family style dinner at the Dan'l Boone Inn. At the camp they also played football in the rain, had a camp fire, and battled it out with a game of Ultimate Chicken led by the camp staff.

The FCC contingent was led by Senior Minister Rev. Dr. Mark Boyea, and Associate Minister Rev. Joy Mounts. Chaperones included Harry Ahlin, Bridget Andersen, Cindy Boyea, Nancy and Laurel Elkin, Geoff Marino, Heidi

Hylan, Ani Hsu Obrock, Joe Regan, Denise Schifando, Deb Volz and Merry Wisler. Student representatives included Grace Ahlin, Sophia Andersen, Erin and Grace Bailey, Jeremy and Michael Bonnell (Junior Chaperone), Grace Endy, Kelton and Thompson Estabrook, Nattie Fountain Jardim, Daniel Gunchar, Joey and Tommy Larmore, Natalie and Rae Mikula, Mason Marino, Margot Motyczka, Elizabeth Rehwinkel, Flannery and Giavanna Schifando, Jacob and Kevin Snyder-Mounts, Joseph Touris and Zach Volz.



THE FOUR HOUSES ON THE TOUR ARE:

641 ELM STREET: Magnolia Christmas" is the theme of the decorations for this lovely home This enchanting Victorian house was completely renovated, including a 1,500 square foot addition in 2016. Anyone passing by this house will notice the unique moldings, charming windows, and large front porch. The craftsmanship seen on the exterior of the house continues throughout the interior.

Magnolia leaves will adorn the outside lamppost. As you enter the house, be sure to notice the magnolia angel ornaments on the Christmas tree in the formal living room, as well as the use of magnolia leaves as placemats in the dining room. The cozy living room features a Nutcracker and a Santa Claus collection, as well as a tree decorated with teal and apricot paint-ball ornaments.

The mudroom focuses on the family's three large dogs, with a tree decorated with dog biscuits and apple-cinnamon ornaments. Whimsical dog wreaths adorn the closet doors and dog floral arrangements recline on the bench. As you exit this charming home, Swedish gnomes stand guard in the back yard!

531 BRADFORD AVENUE: "Woodland Tidings" is the theme for this house. Built in 1928, this 4-bedroom, 3-bath home is of a cottage-style Tudor Revival design. Typical of this style is the mix of brick and (fish-scale) shingles on the facade. The house features an unusual beveled glass porthole window in the front door and an elegant stained-glass window featuring a central fleur-de-lis in the den.

Pots brimming with greens and gilded pinecones hug the front steps. Inside the house, vines, greens and ribbon adorn the staircase and in the living room the mantel features an asymmetrical design of burgundy amaryllis, greens, berries, and candles. The elegant woodland theme flows throughout the house. While in the den, handmade stockings stuffed with flowers are hung with care and in the family room, winterberry, handmade birds, handcrafted birdhouses and gilded balls grace the tree.

540 HIGHLAND AVENUE: "From Farm to City Christmas" is the theme of this bright and cheery home, a theme that reflects the origins of the homeowner who grew up on a Midwestern farm. Built between 1910 and 1915, as a center hall Colonial. The addition of a front porch by the current owner in 2004 has given the home more of a farm-house style. A second addition in 2008 created a spacious library and family room. The striking windows in the library are original to the home, having been

removed from the home's former sun room and reinstalled in the new space. The pantry doors were originally the exterior doors of a neighbor's home.

As guests approach the house, they are greeted along the walkway by metallic farm animals decked out for the holidays in sprigs of greenery. The large Christmas tree in the family room is decorated with hand stitched farm animals, while in the kitchen a homemade gingerbread farmhouse sits on the island. The focal point of the dining room is the table with its unique runner fashioned from burlap, greens and flowers and napkins folded in the shape of miniature Christmas trees. A more sophisticated tone is struck in the living room where topiaries flank the fireplace and white and gold ornaments sparkle on a tabletop tree, providing just enough "city" glitz for the city aspect of our "Farm to City" home.

1 STANLEY OVAL: The theme "Family Holiday Homestead" was inspired by the history of this delightful home. This turn of the century 4-bedroom colonial home was built in 1911. Multi-colored terracotta tile, leaded stained-glass windows, and hardwood floors are found throughout this home. In 2012, the kitchen was renovated, and a family room was added. Gracing the front of the home is a wide pillared porch with a terra cotta floor and a portico on the side. In keeping with the original roof, a new wood shingle roof recently replaced the old one. The home was originally lit by gas light before electricity was installed.

The spacious front porch will enchant you with charming and winsome décor. It's easy to imagine family gatherings in the kitchen and family room, in contrast with the sophistication of the formal dining and living rooms. Look for the gingerbread carousel in the kitchen. Children's toys abound on the welcoming wreath, nutcrackers march up the stairs and hand-crafted ornaments made from toys bedeck the Christmas trees. A whimsical toy truck ablaze with holiday blooms adorns the family room. This home will bring back childhood holiday memories and the warmth of simpler times.



The YMCA Run for Everyone proceeds help support the Dragonfly Program, which offers physical, recreational and social programs for


to help this great cause was very rewarding for young adults with special needs as well as the Inclusion Camp for those with special needs entering grades K-6.
