STUDENTS START WITH HELLO IN PROMISE PROGRAM Submitted by Pat Kane

As part of Scotch Plains-Fanwood Schools' participation in Sandy Hook Promise, our schools participated in Start with Hello Week. This week was dedicated to creating a more connected and inclusive school community so that students who feel isolated or alone know that they have people in their school who care about them and want them to be included.

The fourth-grade students in Christine Mill's classroom at School One took part in a concentric circle activity where they rotated around to different partners and learned something new about that person. Questions were asked such as, "Do you play any sports?" "What's your favorite food and why?" "If you could travel anywhere, where would you go and why?" "Would you rather be a bird or a dog, why?" Students then had the chance to ask a question of their own to a student in the class. The elementary schools posted "Start With Hello" signs throughout their buildings. Scotch Plains Mayor Al Smith, along with Al Mirabella, Margaret Heisey and School Superintendent Dr. Margaret Hayes participated in the activities along with Mrs. Mill's students.

Brunner third grade students loved learning about ways to help people that may feel socially isolated. The third-grade students in Charlene Hall's classroom read the book, The Invisible

Boy. Students identified with the young boy that was isolated from his peers and came up with strategies to help a student like the one in the story they read.

Students at the middle schools were reminded of the importance of saying hello to one another and how each one of us can make a difference in someone else's life. At Terrill Middle School, the Health and Physical Education Department kicked off the "Start With Hello" program by conducting the "Start With Hello" introductory lesson. Throughout the course of the past week, students in physical education classes, discussed the benefits of sharing a "hello" with someone else. In the same lesson, students also participated in a concentric circles activity that prompted the students to ask getting-to-know-you questions of one another. In the process, students were encouraged and made aware of how to say "hello" in fifteen different languages. Teachers and students reported a high level of engagement and insight with and about one another.

The students at Park Middle School were reminded every morning and afternoon of the importance of saying "Hello" to one another and how each one of us can make a difference in someone else's life. "Hello my name is..." name tags were given to both the Park students and staff and were worn through the day. During lunch time, the students sat with different students doing a get to know you activity. On Friday, September 28, everyone at Park was invited to wear green to show their support for our school community and once again recognize the importance of starting with "Hello".

Mrs. Jamie Socha, third grade teacher at Evergreen Elementary School, is responsible for sponsoring and leading the establishment of the "The Little Free Library" at Evergreen. This is the fourth registered Little Free Library in the Scotch Plains/Fanwood area.

Mrs. Socha's students gathered at school on Friday August 10, 2018 to build and paint the library. The location became open for use on September 26, 2018.

"The Little Free Library" project makes books available to all children in the Scotch Plains/Fanwood community. Students will run the library in a way that insures that books are always accessible and the library is full at all times. Since Mrs. Socha's students during the school year of 2017-2018 were prolific readers during their time with her, they chose to support and build "The Little Free Library" in order to foster the same love of reading for all children in the community. For this project, students selected books for all elementary age/grade levels as well as the kit to build the actual library to be placed outside the main doors of the Evergreen Elementary School.

TEMPLE SHOLOM COMMEMORATES THE 80TH ANNIV. OF KRISTALLNACHT DR. MAGDELENA WROBEL OF THE LEO BAECK INSTITUTE TO PRESENT PERSONAL STORIES AND **REPORTS FROM JEWS AFFECTED BY POGROMS IN 1938 NAZI GERMANY**

2018 Kristallnacht program to be held on Sunday, November 4 at 7:00 p.m. Dr. Magdelena Wrobel, Project Manager for the Leo Baeck Institute of New York and Berlin, will present "Posts from the Past: Personal Stories on the 80th Anniversary of Kristallnacht and the Events of 1938." These personal stories are reports from Jews from 1938. The Leo Baeck Institute is the premier repository for archival materials from German and German speaking countries in Europe.

Eighty years ago, on November 9, 1938, the Nazi party escalated its anti-Semitic campaign against the Jews through a pogrom in Germany,

Temple Sholom of Scotch Plains announces its Austria and part of Czechoslovakia. Prior to that, in March 1938, Nazi Germany annexed Austria (the Anschluss); at the end of September 1938, England, France, Italy and Germany signed the infamous Munich Agreement which allowed Nazi Germany to annex parts of Czechoslovakia and eventually led to the dismemberment of that country. And on December 2, 1938, the kindertransport began, eventually sending 10,000 children from Germany, Austria and Czechoslovakia to safety in England and elsewhere, most of whom never saw their parents again.

Dr. Wrobel earned her Ph.D. from the Ludwig-Maximilians University in Munich in 2013 and has served as a visiting scholar at the University of Haifa, University College London and Columbia University. Before coming to the Leo Baeck Institute in New York, she worked at the Jewish Foundation for the Righteous in their

Rescuer Support Program and served as Assistant to the Ambassador at the Permanent Mission of the Republic of Poland to the United Nations.

METROPOLITAN OPERA EDUCATES TEACHERS AND STUDENTS

On October 3, 2018, four teachers from the Scotch Plains-Fanwood schools attended the 2018 Educator Conference presented at The Metropolitan Opera. In its mission to promote opera education across America, the MET brings teachers from around the country for three days to NYC to study opera through a wide variety of presentations and workshops. Representing SPF were Barbara Prestridge and Jennifer Jenkins from Park Middle School, Megan Fernandez from Terrill Middle School and Monique Gilbert from SPF High School.

Last year, Ms. Prestridge and Ms. Jenkins introduced the MET's program and HD Live opera broadcasts to the students of Park. This opera education program has been expanded for 2018-19 to include Terrill's choral program and the High School French students. Students from the middle schools and high school will attend three HD Live Operas from the MET during this school year.

In addition to attending the conference, Barbara Prestridge was honored as she was asked to address the entire conference on its closing day. The MET had requested that she share her work on the topic of empathy. Using faceless paper puppets requiring the collaboration of three puppeteers, Ms. Prestridge leads professional development workshops created to study the subtle yet powerful language of body movement, gesture and mood as a bridge to building awareness and empathy in students. During a presentation by a puppeteer group last year at the MET, Ms. Prestridge envisioned taking puppets beyond entertainment and directing that artistry to speak to children and adults about body

The College Club of Fanwood-Scotch Plains welcomes Ms. Sally Weiner, Archivist of the Plainfield Public Library, to present a program on the local history collection housed at the library. The Local History Collection of the Plainfield Public Library is the largest in Union County, and includes historical and contemporary materials about the city of Plainfield and its inhabitants. The collection is composed of books, documents, photographs, postcards, blueprints, maps, newspapers, oral histories, personal papers, and records of local clubs and organizations in Plainfield and the surrounding communities. Ms. Weiner will present highlights from the collection and provide tips on how to care for your own treasures.

For the past two years, Ms. Weiner has been the Archivist in the Local History Department of the Plainfield Public Library. Her responsibilities include processing, rehousing, and digitizing materials with the ultimate goal of providing accessibility. Ms. Weiner earned her Masters of Library and Information Science from Rutgers University and worked with historic archival collections at the Monmouth County Park System and the Monmouth County Historical Association. Currently, she splits her time as the Archivist at Plainfield and the Librarian at a marine science laboratory out on Sandy Hook, NJ.
