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# **COMMUNITY ACCESS UNLIMITED TO HOLD OPEN AUDITIONS FOR "HAIRSPRAY, JR." IN JANUARY**

Holy moly, welcome to the '60s! The CAU Community Players, an integrated theater troupe that brings together performers with and without developmental disabilities, is holding open auditions for an upcoming production of "Hairspray, Jr." Auditions will be held January 22, 24 and 26, 2019.

Community Access Unlimited (CAU), a Union County-based human services agency, created the troupe in 2012 to create a space for people of all ages and abilities to perform and demonstrate their unique talents. The productions also allow individuals from the greater community to interact with people with disabilities and further the agency's mission of community integration. CAU strives to integrate people with disabilities and at-risk youth into the general community through housing, vocational and life-skills training, education, advocacy, recreation and more.

The CAU Community Players stage a threeday production that draws hundreds of attendees each year. This year, the troupe chose "Hairspray, Jr," the Tony Award-winning musical about one girl's inspiring dream to dance and change the world, for its themes of overcoming adversity to achieve integration and equality.

Spunky, plus-size teen Tracy Turnblad has one big dream – to dance on the popular "Corny Collins Show." She finally gets her shot and is transformed from social outcast to sudden star. Balancing her newfound power with her desire for justice, Tracy fights to dethrone the reigning Miss Teen Hairspray and integrate a TV network in the process. With the help of her outsized mom, Edna, and guest DJ, Motormouth Maybelle, the rhythm of Tracy's new beat proves unstoppable.

The CAU Community Players select a play that is representative of the agency's message of inclusion, acceptance and believing in oneself, as well as everyone's worth regardless of their circumstances, according to troupe director Marguerite Modero. "The message of this play is really important to me – embracing who you are and celebrating uniqueness," Modero said. "The subplot about the racial discrimination that took place in the '60s also fits our cause. Tracy and her mom also know what it's like to be discriminated against due to their size. People with disabilities often are discriminated against, so this message resonates with our members and their families."

Auditions are open to people of all ages and abilities.No registration or acting experience is required.

"We meet everybody where they start, and we grow from there," Modero said. "I think new cast members will find this is one of the most rewarding experiences of their lives, to work together with others to produce something that is so heartwarming and has such an important message."

# WINTER BIRD FEEDING - SUET

Winter is hard on all the native birds that stay in our area. By the time January arrives most seeds have already been eaten off the ground and berries have fallen from the trees and shrubs. Luckily for our feathered friends, winter back yard bird watching is now one of America's favorite hobbies. We spend millions of dollars every year feeding wild birds in order to attract our winged friends within easy view.

Birds with diets that depend mostly on insects have the hardest time finding enough proteins and calories in other food sources such as fruit and seeds. For these birds 'suet' is extremely valuable.

Suet is a winter bird food made from animal fat that is easily digested and metabolized by many birds; it's a high-energy food, especially valuable in cold weather. Suet is particularly attractive to woodpeckers, nuthatches, chickadees, blue jays, tree creepers, and starlings when they visit feeders. Of course, squirrels love suet and will gobble every bite if permitted.

Suet cakes are sold almost everywhere we shop. Garden shops, hardware stores, Christmas Tree shops, tractor supply and even our local grocery stores. I try to find suet cakes at the best price and stock up on them. They can be stored in a cool spot or put in a freezer for long term storage.

Commercial suet feeders are available, and are an inexpensive investment. They have a latch to close them but I also use a twist tie to prevent squirrels from opening the cage and knocking the cake on the ground.

Place the suet in feeders or net onion bags at least five feet from the ground to keep it out of the reach of dogs.

Do not put out suet during hot weather as it can turn rancid. During hot weather the dripping fat can damage natural waterproofing on bird feathers causing permanent damage and a shorter life; not what we are hoping for when we feed birds.

Today suet cakes come in a wide variety of ingredients and flavors. Everything from citrus., blueberry or hot chili. The birds are coming for the fat, so the simpler the indigents, the better. If I find a suet with corn, I put it back. Corn is the least nutritional "filler" with only two percent protein.

It is possible to make your own suet from leftover fat. You can find information on how to make it on the internet and on Youtube.

Squirrels, starlings and other large birds will scare away the birds we want to attract. I use a simple trick that helps avoid or limit this problem. Hang your suet cake feeder upside down. When I unwrap the suet, I only take off the top wrapper, leaving the plastic tray on the rest of the cake. Place the suet in the feeder with the exposed suet facing down. This makes it difficult for the larger birds to hang on for long and they soon search for an easier food supply. The smaller birds are able to cling upside down and have no trouble eating the suet.

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# HAPPENINGS IN RAHWAY – 100, 75, AND 50 YEARS AGO

Another year is upon us. We're in no position to predict the news that will come out of 2019, but we can look back at what was going on in Rahway 100, 75, and 50 years ago. 1919

The year began on a tragic note on February 24 with the death of two of Rahway's finest, police officers Jacob Kraus and James Lynch. Both were fatally shot and killed while in search of a person who had been involved in a street fight.

All discharged soldiers, sailors, and marines of the Great War were invited to meet at the Cross Keys Hotel on Friday, May 2nd to take the preliminary steps in forming a local chapter of the American Legion. (As a result of the meeting, Post 5 was established. The Post will be celebrating its 100th Anniversary this year).

Rahway has always been a city where politics has attracted a lively interest and an event in the late spring illustrates just how serious and outrageous things could get. The Socialist Party was organized near the end of World War I and was attempting to enter the political scene on the national and local levels. Mayor David Trembley, a Democrat, refused to grant permits for any Socialist rallies that might be requested in Rahway. On June 4, a group of Socialists disregarded Trembley's order and came into the city. Just as the featured speaker began to address the gathering, Trembley ordered one of the volunteer fire companies to turn their hoses on the platform. The speaker, along with several others, got a soaking which brought the rally to an abrupt end.

Cherry and Lewis Streets were made oneway streets as a safety measure after several narrow escapes from auto collisions and from pedestrians being run down at the corners.

The Federation of Churches met to discuss measures to improve the moral conditions that had become a concern in the post-war period. The religious community found it troubling that on many evenings, young women were seen in the downtown area meeting and socializing with soldiers.

In December, Arthur R. Wendell, President of the Wheatena Corporation, presented a proposal to advance the project of a Union County Park in Rahway. (His efforts resulted in the creation of the Rahway County Park.)

1944

The citizens of Rahway were continuing to do their part to aid the war effort. Victory Gardens increased by 25%, the Red Cross quota surpassed its projected amount by almost \$8,000, the Blood Bank set records, and the 5th and 6th War Loan Drives topped their assigned quotas.

The YMCA celebrated its 100th anniversary with a week-long program, September 24-October 5. Each day featured a different program to illustrate the institution's importance in the community.

Public outcry arose against a proposal that would realign State Highway #4 through

Rahway. Planned back in 1927, the route was intended to link a section of Woodbridge to the Outerbridge Crossing passing along Inman Avenue from Woodbridge to New Brunswick Avenue. City officials voted unanimously to oppose the project citing the negative affect it would have on almost 40 residences by changing the character of the neighborhood. Rahway ratables would also be affected.

On Tuesday, September 19, Rahway was hit by a major hurricane that cost the city over \$15,000 in damages and tree removal costs. Three hundred and seventeen trees were toppled including the large, wide spreading tree that stood in the rear of the Girl Scout House (Merchants and Drovers Museum) which fell across Westfield Avenue.

#### 1969

Op-eds were posted weekly in the local paper on a variety of controversial topics. One complained about the condition of the Pennsylvania Railroad Station calling for an upgrade. (A new station was built in 1975.) Another addressed the teaching of Family Life and Sex Education in the primary grades.

(Board of Education members deleted the course from the curricula of grades K-6 at their April meeting.) A third op-ed asked voters to reject the proposal that would allow 18 year olds to vote. (Citizens in Rahway and in the state voted NO, thus keeping the voting age at 21.)

City council introduced plans for a new city hall/fire headquarters and a plan for moving city hall from Campbell Street to the former post office building on Esterbrook Avenue. (A new fire headquarters became a reality in 1975 and a new city hall/police station complex was built in 1982.)

In late December the Rahway Historical Society was founded for the purpose of launching a fundraising drive to raise \$75,000 to "Save the Girl Scout House." (On October 31 of the next year, the Historical Society had raised enough to save the building and become the new owners.)

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# **IN 2019, RETHINK AND REFRAME NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS**

Start small. Break those big resolutions into small, achievable goals. "'Getting healthy' is too broad so reframe that big resolution into smaller, more manageable goals. Instead of cutting chocolate out of your diet for good, vow to only have it a few times a week. Or trade your two sodas a day for one soda and a glass of water.

Take it one step at a time. Trying to change too many habits at once can easily lead to frustration.

WITH YOU

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Instead of a New Year's resolution, make a new month resolution. Focus on that one change for the month and add another (small) change when the new month rolls around.

Keep the faith. Don't get discouraged by setbacks. Even though you may experience some missteps throughout the day-or even the week-that doesn't mean you have to give up. Bad habits aren't created in a week, so try as you might, you can't change them in a week either.

It's all about attitude. It's important to think about what you're gaining from a resolution rather than what you're missing. This can make a resolution feel more positive, and therefore more achievable. For example, you may want to limit your screen time in 2019, but that can be more manageable if you replace it with something positive like volunteering or setting special time aside for family.

Talk it out. It's easier to stick to your resolutions if you have a partner or friend working toward similar goals. Team up with someone to set your 2019 goals and help each other establish a game plan dedicated to achieving them. Set specific check-ins to help each other out of slumps and to cheer each other during the high points.

Additionally, many people join a gym or other health facility to help keep their resolutions. Just as making your resolutions manageable contributes to success, the type of place you join is important as well. Make sure the facility you pick is the right fit for your personal goals and provides the appropriate level of support.

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# **RAHWAY SENIORS HELP STUDENTS NAVIGATE THEIR PATHS THROUGH LIFE**

What should we fear or worry about? What should be our main goal in life? What piece of advice do you wish you had had when you were our age? Serious questions. Poignant questions. Who better to offer answers to these students' concerns than those whose journeys through life provided considerable insight into its many unpredictable twists and turns?

"Diane was really cool." Not a typical adjective you would expect to hear a teenager use today to describe a senior citizen. This, however, is exactly how Rahway HS senior Quashawn Hall-Robinson views community member Diane Bates.

Bates, along with four other members from Rahway's senior community, shared her time with Michael Clark's World History students to help them understand more fully that the only differences between them and their 'slightly' older friends were years.

"She kept telling us," said Quashawn, "never to give up your dreams and goals in life because no matter how old you are, you can make a difference and become what you want to be."

"Mary told us to be open-minded and to see the best in people." This wise advice from Mary Ellinger was taken to heart by junior Elijah Ramos. "She helped us understand that people everywhere of ALL different ages are just like us...we're still human!"

He adds, "She had all these stories that we could relate to, we just lived in different

generations."

Ms. Ellinger shared in Elijah's appreciation of the opportunities for learning this special event afforded, "I was amazed to see how alike and at the same time different some of our experiences were!"

Thanks to insight from guests Thelma Heard and Robert Castro, students discovered the many varied rewards afforded by venturing outside the boundaries of their own community.

"Bob taught us how important it was to travel outside of Rahway," notes 11th grader Brianna Yanni. "He paints all of the places he's been and showed us. We saw what the world was like and that motivated us to try and see it."

Senior Jason Meyers plans to follow Thelma's advice "to travel the world and never be afraid to be what/who you are."

Although the 'scenery' had changed considerably throughout the decades separating the students from their warmly welcomed guests, it quickly became clear to all that the strength of the human spirit remains steadfast.

"Our teen years and theirs were very different," the senior citizens noted. "We were more family oriented - eating together each evening. We watched television and played games together. Today that is often not possible with most women working. Today's youth have the benefit of advanced technologies that didn't even exist when we were young."

Nonetheless, challenges in life are always present and the students discovered that they were not alone - others had faced them and had overcome them.

Elijah Ramos explains, "Mary had all these stories we could relate to, she just happened to live in a different era."

Diane Bates gave Quashawn Hall-Robinson pause to reflect, "She really made me think about how we'll be old one day. It made me see people in a different way. All her stories were just like

ours even though she didn't grow up in Rahway."

Passions do not die and 'fun' is not a luxury to be savored solely by the young. Both lessons were well taught by the fascinating guests and well learned by their hosts, both student and adult alike. World History teacher and coordinator for the day's event Michael Clark, who stresses to his students that education is "the sharing and building of human experience", was pleased that the students could now walk away with "a new appreciation for humanity, a new perspective on their own lives, the world, and on their motivations for the future."

Senior community member Loretta Durning found the day to be "a wonderful experience to meet with the students and to share with them and learn."

RHS Vice Principal Chey Rivera, who enthusiastically supported and helped facilitate approval for Mr. Clark's guest speaker presentation, was especially moved by how "our students sat with perfect strangers and melded into friends within minutes", and by the seniors' sharing of their current passions such as painting, crafting, and even roller skating.

Ms. Rivera observed, "I think some of our students were surprised to learn that there actually is 'life after thirty,'" and (if truth be told) so was she! "I personally was impressed about how active our senior citizens actually are. Each of them has continued with a life-long passion or has discovered a talent he or she never knew existed until retirement. This made me think about my own retirement (within the next 100 years) and all the possibilities for what I will do at that stage of my life."

Youth, it can be truly said, is definitely not wasted on the 'young'. It is the wisdom of our senior citizens that teaches us that 'youth' is not measured by chronological years; it is a gift which is always alive in each of our spirits. We just need to unwrap it.
