

#### **MEET CHRIS FUENTES AND THOMAS SNIHUR OF THE SCOTCH PLAINS RESCUE SQUAD – NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS**

Chris Fuentes, our newly elected Deputy Chief I am truly helping my friends and neighbors. for 2019, joined the rescue squad in 2008 when he was 28 years old. Before becoming a member of the SPRS, he was an active riding member on the Edison First Aid Squad No. 2, where he started as a probationary cadet at the age of 16. After leaving Edison, he still wanted to continue to volunteer and ended up on the Scotch Plains squad since it was closer to his home. All in all, he has been riding on an ambulance for 20 years.

"One of the main reasons I volunteer is the fact



Since the organization does not bill for services and we get no income from taxes, I truly feel proud that we get to help people when needed," said Chris.

When asked about his most memorable call, he mentioned a cardiac arrest call with a very overweight patient located on the second floor of a home. "Once we had to transport, we had to figure out a way to get him down, while continuing compressions. It took a lot of manpower and a lot of repositioning, but we got him down the stairs on a backboard. I am still wondering, to this day, how we pulled it off."

Besides being our Deputy Chief, Chris was previously a 2nd Vice President and an Alternate Delegate to the EMS Council of NJ. In addition to his volunteer work, he works full-time in the Training/QA department for a non-profit company that supports people with developmental disabilities.

When asked why someone should volunteer with our squad, he said that "the squad is a great stepping stone for a career in the medical field. You also gain a second family."

Thomas Snihur, another member, joined the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad in 2011 at the start of his senior year of high school. He was just 17 years old and has now been riding for seven years. "I always enjoyed the sciences and had a strong desire to help others. I felt the rescue squad was the best way to fulfill both. The opportunity to gain exposure to the world of medicine while volunteering and giving back to my community remains a privilege I am incredibly grateful for," he said.

Thomas also went on to say that it is "far more than just another activity I have volunteered in; it has truly become a part of my life. I love the ability to help others and give back to my community which has done so much to help me get where I am today. I also love the fast-paced nature of Emergency Medical Services. EMS forces you to problem solve and think critically, often times in tense situations, which is something I really enjoy."

Thomas is currently a third-year medical student at St. George's University School of Medicine and is strongly considering a career as an Emergency Medicine physician.

His most memorable day on the squad occurred when he was on spring break from college. A few minutes into his shift, he and his partner were dispatched to a report of a patient with chest pain. Shortly after they arrived on the scene, the patient went into cardiac arrest. They immediately started CPR and transported the patient to the hospital. Roughly four hours later they got dispatched to a different location with the same complaint - chest pain. Little did they know they would be facing another patient in cardiac arrest. Again, they initiated high-quality CPR and continued to do so until arrival at a local hospital. Tom wondered if they would ever hear the outcome of these patients. They knew that they had provided the highest quality of care possible through their training. Weeks later they learned they had saved not only one life, but two lives that day. Thomas stated that he is "honored to have helped these patients and am overjoyed about their positive outcome."

"I would strongly encourage anyone with a desire to help others and/or an interest in medicine to apply for membership to our organization. The rescue squad offers the opportunity to help others and gain medical knowledge. It is an immensely fulfilling endeavor and for me and is truly an honor to be a part of. Finally, we are a family. The constant support and camaraderie within our organization makes us all believe the Squad is a special place," he said.

The four new inductees into the Union County Baseball Hall of Fame include:





The majority of the full-time faculty and administration are doctorally prepared and hold certifications as NLN Certified Nurse Educators (CNE). The School holds a 25-year, 50-class national RN licensing examination (NCLEX) average pass rate of 95% on first attempt.



Over the course of the last seven months, there has been a great deal of activity at the location: foundation reconstruction is 100% complete, all materials for siding and framing repair have been purchased, framing in Aunt Betty's kitchen in is progress, roofing replacement in progress, all siding that was not authentic to the period has been removed and

Andy Calamaras, the President of the Frazee House Committee, is very pleased to report that the exterior renovation is on track for completion by May 1, 2019. The entire committee extends their gratitude to all supporters who contributed toward the preservation of Aunt Betty's house.

The house, once on the "most endangered places" list in New Jersey, is a rare example of pre-revolutionary construction, and the Fanwood Scotch Plains Rotary Club pledged to save this house over 10 years ago. Betty Frazee, one of the first feminists of our nation stood up to British General Cornwallis at this location, as we fought for freedom.

#### **COLLEGE CLUB OF FANWOOD-SCOTCH** PLAINS SCHOLARSHIP

The College Club of Fanwood-Scotch Plains 2019-2020 scholarship application forms can be obtained from the SPFHS Counseling Office or at spfk12.org or fspcollegeclub.org. Scholarships are awarded annually to women who are 1) high school seniors or 2) college students, and who plan to pursue a Baccalaureate Degree at a four year -college. Scholarships totaling \$30,750 were awarded for the academic year 2018-2019 to 12 students, 7 of who were high school seniors of the Class of 2018 and 5 who were attending College.

To be eligible for consideration, high school applicants must be residents of Fanwood or Scotch Plains. College applicants must be local residents of Fanwood or Scotch Plains at the time they graduate from high school. Scholarships are awarded based on three primary characteristics of the applicants; 1) financial need, 2) academic achievement, and 3) character of the applicant.

This will be the 83rd year that female students seeking financial assistance to pursue a four-year college degree have been helped by the club's fund-raising efforts. To date, the College Club has awarded approximately \$630,000 in scholarships to approximately 530 women.

Application materials must be postmarked on or before February 15, 2019 to be considered.



# **TRANSPORTATION IS KEY TO CANCER CARE**

Previous DeLeeuw scholarship recipients already in college are eligible to re-apply. They must submit complete official transcripts of college grades with a new application.


This is the twenty-fourth year the scholarships have been offered. To date, the Adele DeLeeuw Scholarship Fund, which is a fund of the Plainfield Foundation, has awarded over 1.3 million dollars. The Plainfield Rotary Scholarship Foundation, headed by Michael R. Townley, acts as selector for the scholarships. Area Rotary Clubs assist in the selection process. Only students attending high schools in Plainfield, North Plainfield, South Plainfield, Warren, Watchung, Scotch Plains, Fanwood and Edison are eligible. Location of high school, not student's residence, is the qualifying factor. The student must also be accepted to an accredited college or university.

Applicants must plan to major in one of the following areas of study: art, poetry, writing, journalism or engineering. They must demonstrate the scholastic aptitude and interest to pursue study in one of these specified areas. They must also prove financial need.

The IRS is urging the public to be aware of **IRS EMPLOYEES WILL NOT:** 

- Call demanding an immediate payment. The IRS won't call taxpayers if they owe taxes without first sending a bill in the mail.
- Demand payment without allowing taxpayers to question or appeal the amount owed.
- Demand that taxpayers pay their taxes in a specific way, such as with a prepaid debit card.
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Threaten to contact local police or similar agencies to arrest taxpayers for non-payment of taxes.
- Threaten legal action, such as a lawsuit.

If taxpayers don't owe or don't think they owe any tax, and they receive an inquiry like this, they should:

- Contact the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Use TIGTA's "IRS Administration. Impersonation Scam Reporting" web page to report the incident.
- Report the incident to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your report.

In most cases, an IRS phishing scam is an unsolicited, fake email that claims to come from the IRS. Some emails link to sham websites that look real. The scammers' goal is to lure victims to give up their personal and financial information. If the thieves get what they're after, they use it to steal a victim's money and identity.

For those taxpayers who get a phishing email, the IRS offers this advice:

- Don't reply to the message.
- Don't give out your personal or financial information.
- Forward the email to phishing@irs.gov. Then delete it.
- Don't open any attachments or click on any links. They may have malicious code that will infect your computer.



While doing research on phobias, I expected to find the usual ones such as fear of spiders, clowns, water, and driving over bridges. However, I was amazed at the number of phobias out there, the odd names that they have and the specific fears mentioned.

For example, did you know that some people fear peanut butter sticking to the roofs of their mouths? It's called arachibutyrophobia. Or that others are afraid of the color yellow? That would be xanthophobia. Ironically, the fear of long words is sesquipedalophobia, so the name of the phobia itself would be enough to bring on anxiety in people with it.

As defined by Healthline.com, "A phobia is an excessive and irrational fear reaction. If you have a phobia, you may experience a deep sense of dread or panic when you encounter the source of your fear."

Do you fear having a phobia? If so, you have phobophobia, which sounds pretty redundant.

These fears are very real to the people who suffer from them and phobias can make everyday living a real challenge. But what causes phobias, and what can be done to help manage them?

According to the Anxiety and Depression Association of America (ADAA), "Scientists believe that phobias can be traced to a combination of genetic tendencies, brain chemistry and other biological, psychological, and environmental factors." While being attacked by a dog as a child may lead to a fear of dogs (cynophobia), other fears often come from out of the blue and are nonsensical, such as

papyrophobia, a fear of paper.

The ADAA lists a variety of treatment options such as cognitive-behavioral therapy (CBT), exposure therapy, anxiety management, relaxation techniques, and medications. One or a combination of these may be recommended.

So the next time someone tells you that they're afraid of the sun (heliophobia) or the rain (ombrophobia), don't just tell them to get over it. Many people know their phobias are irrational, but they can't just wish them away. About the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad
