



On Wednesday, January 16, 2019, Lawton C. Johnson Summit Middle School hosted Holocaust survivors who were represented by The Holocaust Council of Jewish Federation of Greater Metrowest. They addressed the 8th grade student body through a program entitled "Survivors Speak," and shared their experiences, along with moderator Rebecca Lubetkin. This program was created for the Morris Museum as part of their outreach to schools and this was Summit's seventh year participating.

Along with their language arts teacher Grace Buonpane, 8th grade students read The Diary of Anne Frank, and researched the background of that time period. Additionally, Ms. Buonpane organized the "Survivors Speak" program, because there is nothing more powerful than hearing firsthand accounts of history.

Fran Malkin and Robert Max (a Summit resident), each shared their Holocaust experiences and stories of resilience. They are models of strength and courage; it was a privilege for students and staff to hear them speak.

Fran Malkin was born in the town of Sokal. Poland, to candy store owners Lea and Eli Letzer. She and her family were thrust into World War II with the invasion of Poland by the Nazis in 1939. They were uprooted and forced to live in a ghetto.

Robert Max, an American Jewish soldier, spoke about his three major battle campaigns across Europe in World War II and his ultimate capture during the climactic Battle of the Bulge when he was forced into slave labor. He shared his experience in the war and his upcoming book.

Following the presentation, Summit High School students from Lauren Wells' Holocaust & Genocide class set up small discussion groups for high school and middle school students to debrief about the personal accounts. This collaboration was extremely beneficial and gave the 8th graders an outlet to reflect upon what they heard and the overall impact of the presentation.







Communications through the "Momo Challenge" begins with a text and/or call that requests the recipient to perform small tasks which rapidly escalates to more serious violent acts, including self-inflicted harm, all while demanding photographs or videos for proof of completion. Unfortunately, in recent history there has been documentation where the disposition of the challenge resulted in serious injuries and/or death.

In collaboration with the Board of Education, social media risks will be addressed by school staff members and our Juvenile Detective Bureau. As always, the safety of our children is of the utmost priority.
