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VETERAN JEFFERSON TEACHER MEMORIALIZED

The Jefferson School community recently unveiled a memorial bench to honor a veteran teacher who passed away in 2017. "The best teachers are those who make a positive difference in our lives," said Jefferson principal Dr. Susie Hung.

The Jefferson Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) collected donations to purchase two benches and a beautifully crafted plaque to memorialize Mary Jo Juelis, who taught at Jefferson from 1987 to 2016.

Superintendent Dr. Margaret Dolan praised Mrs. Juelis as the "consummate professional" whose students were always engaged and who mentored novice teachers as they started their careers.

"And she loved her family," said Dr. Dolan, as she addressed a crowd of Mrs. Juelis' family, friends, and colleagues gathered at Jefferson on November 19, 2018. "For all of these reasons, Mrs. Juelis' legacy continues. We were fortunate that she was a part of our school community and I am very happy to be part of this tribute."

Juelis' husband, John, and two of her three sons were on hand for the ceremony as were two of her sisters-in-law.

"Although I did not personally know Mrs. Juelis, I know she greatly impacted hundreds of students and many colleagues," said Dr. Hung as she shared a poem by Joanna Fuchs entitled "The Best Teachers."

Colleague Patricia Merlo heralded the veteran teacher as "always on the cutting edge of education," saying "many of us here today are who we are because of great role models like Mary Jo."

Jefferson PTO co-president Carolyn Koellhoffer noted that Mrs. Juelis was the type of teacher who looked at each child as an individual and who earned respect from her students.

Son Mark Juelis said his mother was "always looking for a new way to teach" and he thanked the school community for sustaining his mother "when she needed it most."

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WESTFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY'S MARCH FIRST WEDNESDAY LUNCHEON: THE DICENNIAL PROCESS OF FEDERAL REDISTRICTING

As part of the The Westfield Historical Society's First Wednesday Luncheon series, Dr. John Lesher will be speaking on the topic of The Dicennial Process of Federal Redistricting on March 6, 2019. The event will begin with checkin at 11:45 a.m. at the Echo Lake Country Club, located at 515 Springfield Avenue, Westfield.

Dr. Lesher will explain the Federal Redistricting process which takes place every ten years in the United States. This process involves the Census Count, the apportionment of the 435 seats in the House of Representatives among the states based on the Census Count, and the formation of districts within the states from which each state's allocation of Representatives are elected and sent to Congress. "Gerrymandering" is a term used to describe how this process can become abused to redistrict for political gain.

John C. Lesher has worked in real estate development for over 40 years. He holds a BA in English from Scranton University, an MBA from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania, a MA in history from Montclair State University, and a MA and PhD in political science from Rutgers University. It was at Rutgers where he completed his doctoral dissertation in 2017 evaluating the concept of redistricting.

Active in community affairs, Dr. Lesher serves as treasurer of the Westfield Senior Citizens Housing Corp. and as a member of the Board of Trustees for the Echo Lake Country Club. He and his wife, Dr. Tina Lesher, have resided in Westfield for 42 years and are the parents of three children.

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

An app to help regulate a plant's environment, a homework helper chatbot, and other innovative uses of technology were among the projects created at Westfield High School's 2nd Annual Hackathon held in December.

Organized by seniors Ethan Jaffee, Zachary Lemberg, and Justin O'Boyle, the 12-hour event was attended by 90 beginner and experienced computer programmers in 8th through 12th grade.


"During the day, students learned new topics at Java and HTML workshops led by Jaron Rubenstein and Jamie Kingsberry, both professionals in our community," says Jessica Norworth a mathematics/computer science teacher at WHS who chaperoned the event, along with advisor WHS math teacher Louis De Angelo.

Rubenstein and fellow sponsor Paul Nunes

welcomed participants to the Hackathon while Kingsberry closed the event with recommendations on ways students can further their computer science learning.

Attendees completed projects and competed for prizes. Winning projects included an app that communicated with sensors to regulate a plant's environment, a homework helper chatbot to assist students with their workloads through Google Calendar scheduling, and an app that could be used during an emergency lockdown to provide real time information about what was occurring in the building.

Norworth and De Angelo thanked the event's sponsors including Alex Hodara of Hodara Real Estate Group, Chris Zarou of Visionary Music Group and Logic, .tech Domains, Wolfram Language, and indico, along with the WHS IT department and custodial staff for "creating a working space for the Hackathon."



The four new inductees into the Union County Baseball Hall of Fame include:





> "These kids were so happy to be there," said John Humiston, a senior on the Varsity team. "It

> Captain CJ Duffy, a senior, alternate captain Alex Park, also a senior, and Trevor Tanella, a junior, were instrumental in creating #BluePuck. "We wanted to continue our community service efforts," Park said. "These last couple of years. the team has volunteered with Children's Specialized Hospital, St. Joseph's Food Bank and the YMCA, but we really wanted to create something unique that was special for the kids of Westfield."
