
Overall, 1,480 boxes of cereal were donated by the sixth graders! Leading the Cereal Bowl Teams were:











They married in 1980 and moved to Summit the following year. They have two children; a son who is currently living in Poland and a daughter who resides in Manhattan.

When Richard retired five years ago he wanted to do something meaningful with his newfound free time. A friend in Washington DC had been delivering Meals on Wheels for years and told Richard how rewarding it was. He contacted SAGE and has been a volunteer with Meals on Wheels and the SAGE Grocery and Errand Service ever since.

Pam volunteers at SAGE's front desk and occasionally accompanies Richard when he delivers meals. Assisting her late parents, who


lived on Cape Cod, negotiate medical care was one of the reasons the two sought out SAGE. "The experience of helping my parents taught us a lot about what happens when you get older and don't want to leave your home," said Pam.

"A lot of people are quick to write off the elderly," said Richard, adding that he and Pam have met such wonderful, interesting people since they began volunteering, including a former top chemist for Polaroid and an Intervention Radiologist who helped Pam find a specialist when she was in need of one. They've also cooked dinners for clients, repaired electronics and run errands when needed, among other things. "People like Rich and Pam exemplify why Meals on Wheels is so much more than a meal delivery service," said Marianne Kranz, SAGE's Director of Volunteers. "Our volunteers take clients nutritious meals, but they also make sure they are safe each day and visit for that much-needed human connection."

Richard said he is always the last to return to



Chuck Rush of Christ Church in Summit spoke enthusiastically about the St. Benedict's Prep experience and the importance of love and support in leading to the success of young men in our urban areas. S/PA staff spoke about ways in which mentors can effectively communicate with their mentees and veteran Partners shared countless stories about their experiences mentoring S/PA students. We had 4 new mentors at the event who are looking forward to developing a relationship with their mentees over the next few years.

Research from mentor.org shows that mentors play a powerful role in providing young people with the tools to strive and thrive, to attend and engage in school, and to reduce or avoid risky behavior like drug use. In turn, these young people are:

55% more likely to be enrolled in college 81% more likely to report participating regularly in sports or extracurricular activities

78% more likely to volunteer regularly in their

communities.

More than twice as likely to say they held a leadership position in a club or sports team.

The same research shows that one in three young people in our country will grow up without a mentor. Today in our community there are so many young people who could benefit from

ANNUAL END HUNGER 3.6 PACKAGING PROJECT

Based on the resounding success of the End Hunger 3.6 Packaging Project of March 2018, the Rotary Club of Madison and the Madison Rotary Foundation announced that this year's project will take place once again at the The Simon Forum at Drew University, Madison Avenue on Saturday, March 9, 2019 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. This year's goal is to surpass last year's total of 160,000 meals, by packaging 250,000 meals. With the newly merged District 7475, a second packaging event will take place on March 30 at Raritan Valley Community College from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. to package 150,000 meals for a grand total of 400,000 meals. This is a Rotary District 7475-wide project which includes Summit and residents are welcome to volunteer and contribute.

What does 3.6 represent? Every 3.6 seconds someone in the world dies of malnutrition or starvation. In Rotary District 7475, which encompasses 10 counties in north central and central New Jersey, it is estimated that over 300,000 men, women and children are food insecure. Over one million persons are living below the poverty level in New Jersey. Over the long term, prevention of food insecurity is likely to be more cost-effective in treating the consequences of this crisis.

The End Hunger 3.6 project is a community event involving volunteers packaging nonperishable, ready to cook meals, such as macaroni and cheese, rice and vegetables, minestrone, and apple cinnamon oatmeal. All food is vitamin enriched and GMO-free. The meals are distributed to soup kitchens and feeding stations throughout Rotary District 7475

as this is a district-wide project.

In order to purchase ingredients for packaging, donations and grants are required. Donations of \$500 or more will be acknowledged in Rotary's publicity materials. Contributions are tax deductible and can be made online or by mail to Madison Rotary Foundation, P.O. Box 211, Madison, NJ. 07940. Contributions for the March 30 event at Raritan Valley Community College may be sent to: Branchburg Rotary Club Foundation, P. O. Box 5135, Branchburg, NJ 08876. Both are 501(c)3 organizations.






