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
WATCHUNG HILLS ELKS SUPPORTS "SENSORY GARDEN" AT THE SOMERSET CHILDREN'S CENTER

The Watchung Hills Elks Lodge #885 recently presented the Somerset Children's Center with a \$4,000 donation to be put towards the replacement of their outdated playground with a "Sensory Garden." The garden is an area where children with multiple handicaps (Autism, Asperger Syndrome, and other communicative disorders) can find an environment that is conducive to rehabilitation and treatment. The funds were coordinated from a number of different sources. ENF Chair Joann Bataille secured an ENF Anniversary Grant in the amount of \$1,500. The Lodge 885 English Trust Fund matched the Anniversary Grant for another \$1,500, and our Special Children's Committee fund donated \$1,000.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT GIVES EXTRAORDINARY SERVICE TO SPECIAL NEEDS ADULTS

A high school junior, volunteering her time, has brought creativity, comradery and joy to the adult residents of Mt. Bethel Village for almost two years in an extraordinary commitment of service to others.

Niharika (Nina) Iyer, who is finishing up her junior year at Watching Hills Regional High School, first reached out to Mt. Bethel Executive Director Carolann Garafola in 2017 with a desire to bring art projects to Mt. Bethel's developmentally disabled adults. The projects were designed to be done in two or three hours and could be taken back to each adult's apartment to be enjoyed later. They grew beyond day projects and are now part of the fabric of life at Mt. Bethel Village, located at 130 Mt. Bethel Road in Warren. During the month of April, Ms. Iver continues visiting MBV, completing to date more than 22 projects over 66 hours on-site with countless additional hours of prep time including the purchase of materials. The projects are planned, in writing, and tied to seasonal events and holidays and are tailored to each individual's capabilities.

"Through these activities, Nina has taken time out of her weekends to come on-site to motivate our adults to create their own art," said Mrs. Garafola. "She also encouraged and helped them learn how to get along in a group, how to clean up after the activity, how to have fun with art and how to be proud of what they accomplished."

As you might expect, Ms. Iyer's parents are very proud of her.

"Niharika has grown tremendously through this experience that will be a part of her forever," said Sn Suresh, her father.

Mrs. Garafola has recommended Ms. Iyer for recognition by the National Honor Society.

"She did not get glory on a sports field, on a stage, but in the quiet walls of MBV," she wrote. "For a young woman to initiate such a project took a lot of fortitude, strength and commitment as working with adults with special needs is very challenging."

Mt. Bethel Village is an apartment-style residential community for adults with autism, developmental disabilities and traumatic brain injuries.

DIRECTOR OF RECREATION DISCUSSES PROPOSED EXPANSION OF LIONS PAVILION


On April 9, 2019, Joe Passaro, Director of Sports and Recreation in Warren Twp., gave a presentation on the expansion of the existing pavilion on the Warren Municipal grounds. The existing pavilion was built in 1965 funded by the Lions Club and a host of other donors. The upgrade of the LIONS pavilion, as it was called back in the day, is sorely needed by a growing town and to keep up with huge demand for the facility by many groups.

Recreation holds many functions there ranging from Summer concerts and camps, picnics, birthday parties, and chair yoga. "We have a great deal of interest for corporate events to be held at our pavilion also," said Joe Passaro. On news of a possible expansion there was an inquiry about holding a wedding there.

The design and construction would mirror the newer buildings on the Municipal complex, have expanded bathroom facilities, lighting, and security. "We are still in the planning stages and have welcomed input from the President of the Lions, Adrianne Stewart," said Mr. Passaro. Adrianne and Joe ran the Recreation Commission in Warren as Chair and Co-Chairman for over a decade.

The Lions will be an integral part of the new expansion project and have been great benefactors for many causes in the town of Warren. The township of Warren would like to have this completed by sometime in 2020.

Committee and other elected officials, coaches and administrators from Watchung Hills High School, and keynote speaker Chris Ash, Head Coach of Rutgers University Football Team.

Coach Ash gave an inspiring speech on Youth Sports and today's athlete. Joe Passaro, Director of Sports and Recreation, hosted the event and was thrilled to honor so many volunteer coaches. He quoted Billy Graham, "A coach will affect more people in one season, than most people do in a lifetime," and stated "our youth coaches have a huge responsibility and are priceless."

During the dinner, each township sport recognized a volunteer of the year. Following are the volunteers that were honored.

SHAWN GRABKO - WATCHUNG HILLS POP WARNER FOOTBALL & CHEER VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Entering his 8th year in the program, there are not too many things our Volunteer of the Year, Shawn Grabko has not done. He became involved when his son Will, and later, daughter Ella joined the football and cheer programs respectively. On game days, he arrives at the WHPW Complex at sunup and does not leave until sundown; no one spends more hours there than he does. What Shawn is probably most known for is as co-manager of the Snack Shack, WHPW's most profitable endeavor year after year. But he doesn't stay behind that counter for very long, here is a list of just some of the things Shawn is continually busy with: game day field set up; recruits at every recruiting event; WHPW Board Member; grilling, BBQ-ing, cooking and ordering Snack Shack supplies; assisted with new website design and implementation; built new apparel store in Squad Locker, which sends 10% of sales back to the program; football coach Shawn willingly lends a hand whenever and wherever needed and Pop Warner could not produce the professional product that they do without him. For all these reasons and many more, Shawn is Watchung Hills Pop Warner Football & Cheer Volunteer of the Year!

CHRIS LARSEN - WATCHUNG HILLS SOCCER ASSOC

Chris Larsen has been on the board for 8 years and has owned the scheduling role for most of that time. WHSA has 1,500 players and Chris is in charge of scheduling the 75+ teams, which play in 3 different leagues for WHSA, 7 different locations with 19 different fields. Depending on the age of the teams, WHSA has 4 different team configurations (5v5, 7v7, 9v9, 11v11) and 3 different referees assignors. Based on all of these variables, he sets an initial schedule where he tries to keep consecutive games to accommodate the referees. Then on top of all of the variables, Chris has to deal with hundreds of game change requests that are sent in. He has to put the schedule together for the Fall and Spring. WHSA had to buy him an IBM Watson to help him keep up! On top of all of this, Chris has two children of his own who have been in the program and he still coaches and managers one of the teams. Chris is a true friend, a fantastic board member and he is fully committed to developing soccer within our community. Unfortunately, Chris was unable to attend the dinner but was conferenced in to be told of this honor.

MIKE OHLSON - WARREN BASEBALL/SOFTBALL INC.

For the past 10 years, Mike Ohlson has been a trusted and steady leader of our town's Baseball & Softball Program. Mike is always available to players, parents, coaches and fellow board members. He puts the kids first and has a tremendous commitment to ensuring our program and facilities are in good order. Just a few examples of Mike's selflessness include:

He spends hours on the fields preparing them for 6 p.m. games, leaving work early regularly; he is often seen on the tractor grooming the field and running around the snack shack to make sure it is operating smoothly. He has pulled on knee high boots and pumped water from the field for a chance at making them playable. Just this past season he showed up after torrential rain to help make the field playable for the 8u District Championship game. He never bows to pressure, including at district or state tournaments and the occasional insanity of screaming coaches and fans. Mike makes practices and games fun for the kids. Such as his famous sliding drills with refrigerator cardboard boxes or his personal Slip N Slide. These have become a hit throughout the league! One year, because the league being short on coaches and parents were not stepping up, Mike coached a team, for an entire season, on which he didn't even have a child playing! As a leader, Mike has navigated a time of shrinking enrollment and has placed more focus on bolstering enrollment and retention with our youngest age groups, who are the future of our program. Mike seems to have an endless supply of energy and sacrifices his time that could be spent with his job, family (including 3 kids). Mike is supremely focused on providing the boys and girls of Warren with a great baseball and softball experience.

RICH BURTON - THE HILLS LACROSSE CLUB

The Hills Lacrosse Club would like to thank Coach Rich Burton for his dedicated service with the 2019 Volunteer of the Year Award. Rich has been an essential part of this lacrosse club and has helped develop it into the program it is today.

Through his many years of unselfish service, Rich has helped the children in our town by providing them with the best possible training in an effort to advance their lacrosse skills. As a board member, he has fulfilled many roles, from running the beginners clinic to ordering equipment, to putting up signs, and assisting coaches with practices wherever and whenever requested. 

LETTER CARRIERS' STAMP OUT HUNGER FOOD DRIVE – MAY 11

The 27th annual Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger® Food Drive is on Saturday, May 11, 2019.

The Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger® Food Drive is happening on Saturday, May 11, 2019. On this day, you can set out your non-perishable food before your letter carrier's regular pick up time. The top requested non-perishable food items are: cereal, pasta, pasta sauce, rice, canned fruits and vegetables, canned meals (such as soups, chili, and/or pasta), 100 percent juice, peanut butter, macaroni & cheese, canned protein (tuna, chicken, and/or turkey), beans (canned or dry). You can also donate healthy, low-sodium, low-sugar items such as beans, oatmeal, and other whole grains, and canola or olive oil.

Please do not donate frozen food, homemade food, or home-canned items. Please do not donate items that have expired or are in glass containers. In keeping with good food-handling and foodsafety procedures, food that is opened, damaged, out of code or does not have the official ingredients will be discarded by the food bank in the sorting process.

The Food Drive is primarily a people food drive, but if you also want to give pet food in addition to your regular donation, food banks may be able to distribute or direct it to pet shelters and organizations in the area that have a need.

Please do not donate any form of individual baby food products, including formula, jarred vegetables and fruits, meals, snacks, infant cereal. Baby food may be donated by the case or pallet, but single item donations present potential contamination risks and special handling requirements.

The Food Drive is primarily a food drive, but if you also want to give personal care items (such as diapers, laundry detergent, soap, toilet paper, and household cleaning items) in addition to your regular donation, food banks may be able to distribute or put them to good use with organizations that also provide help to those in need. Please note that not all food banks will be able to accept these items. If you would like to volunteer with food distribution and sorting, or in any other capacity, call your local post office and ask to speak to the local food drive person there. Many food banks have a great need for volunteers on Food Drive Day, as well as all throughout the year.

All donations to the Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive are tax-deductible because all the food collected on Food Drive Day is given directly to non-profit charity food agencies in the community the food was collected. Though the National Association of Letter Carriers plans the Food Drive's logistics and letter carriers provide the transportation for each donor's generous donation, the National Association of Letter Carriers is not the agency that gets listed on tax forms for claiming deductions. There are more than 10,000 food agencies throughout the country that receive these donations, so if you itemize your taxes and want to provide proper credit for your Food Drive donations, you will need to determine the name of the agency (food pantry or other charity) that received your food, as well as the agency's address and tax I.D. number for proper reporting on your tax-filing forms. The Food Drive Coordinator at your local post office should be able to give you the name of the receiving agency, and that agency will likely have tax information handy.

A SCIENCE DAY TO REMEMBER AT WOODLAND

Imagine the possibility of wandering around the inside of a brain? On Friday, March 29, students from Woodland School had the opportunity to do just that. The Overlook Medical Center Community Health Department presented the large "Inflatable Brain" to students in grades 2-5 as one of the many exhibits for students to experience during Science Day. Woodland parent, Lorie McDonald, arranged for the brain exhibit. Students learned how to protect and nourish their brains as well as the importance of exercise, sleep, and mindfulness.


