

## 6TH GRADE PARK MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS HONOR AND REMEMBER HOLOCAUST VICTIMS

Sixth grade Language Arts students at Park Middle School held their annual Holocaust Remembrance Museum in Mrs. Phillips', Ms. Rodriguez's, Ms. Washuta's and Mrs. Zazzara's classrooms. Students studied the Holocaust throughout several months while reading Hana's Suitcase, The Children of Willesden Lane as well as a variety of historical fiction novels set during the Holocaust.

In addition to the novels read in class, students learned about the Nuremberg Laws, which placed restrictions upon Jewish families living throughout Europe. They also learned how Kristallnacht – The Night of Broken Glass, saw many Jewish businesses, places of worship, and homes destroyed. In addition to reading about the Holocaust, students also viewed survivor testimonies, and watched Paper Clips, a documentary that showed how students in Whitwell, Tennessee became a national sensation by collecting paper clips to symbolize the 11 million victims of the Holocaust and built a memorial right on their school property.

To conclude the Holocaust unit, students were asked to consider: What can we learn from the

lives of others? What do we want others to know and understand about the Holocaust? How can we honor and preserve the memory of those who perished? These questions let students decide what impacted them and what they wanted people to know and remember about the Holocaust.

When asked if students believed we were successful in preserving the memory of the Holocaust and those who were lost, McKenna Dryer responded, "I believe we were successful because many of the projects showed that the people who were brutally murdered during the Holocaust, will always have a place in our hearts."

Parents and administrators were invited into the classrooms to view student projects ranging from posters, diaries, models, poetry, paintings, and essays. The museum not only gave students the opportunity to preserve the memory of so many tragic stories, it also allowed them to teach all of us the importance of treating others with kindness and compassion, instead of with hatred and indifference. 









#### **LETTER CARRIERS' STAMP OUT HUNGER FOOD DRIVE – MAY 11**

The 27th annual Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger® Food Drive is on Saturday, May 11, 2019.

The Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger® Food Drive is happening on Saturday, May 11, 2019. On this day, you can set out your non-perishable food before your letter carrier's regular pick up time. The top requested non-perishable food items are: cereal, pasta, pasta sauce, rice, canned fruits and vegetables, canned meals (such as soups, chili, and/or pasta), 100 percent juice,



peanut butter, macaroni & cheese, canned protein need. Please note that not all food banks will be (tuna, chicken, and/or turkey), beans (canned or dry). You can also donate healthy, low-sodium, low-sugar items such as beans, oatmeal, and other whole grains, and canola or olive oil.

Please do not donate frozen food, homemade food, or home-canned items. Please do not donate items that have expired or are in glass containers. In keeping with good food-handling and foodsafety procedures, food that is opened, damaged, out of code or does not have the official ingredients will be discarded by the food bank in the sorting process.

The Food Drive is primarily a people food drive, but if you also want to give pet food in addition to your regular donation, food banks may be able to distribute or direct it to pet shelters and organizations in the area that have a need.

Please do not donate any form of individual baby food products, including formula, jarred vegetables and fruits, meals, snacks, infant cereal. Baby food may be donated by the case or pallet, but single item donations present potential contamination risks and special handling requirements.

The Food Drive is primarily a food drive, but if you also want to give personal care items (such as diapers, laundry detergent, soap, toilet paper, and household cleaning items) in addition to your regular donation, food banks may be able to distribute or put them to good use with organizations that also provide help to those in

able to accept these items.

If you would like to volunteer with food distribution and sorting, or in any other capacity, call your local post office and ask to speak to the local food drive person there. Many food banks have a great need for volunteers on Food Drive Day, as well as all throughout the year.

All donations to the Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive are tax-deductible because all the food collected on Food Drive Day is given directly to non-profit charity food agencies in the community the food was collected. Though the National Association of Letter Carriers plans the Food Drive's logistics and letter carriers provide the transportation for each donor's generous donation, the National Association of Letter Carriers is not the agency that gets listed on tax forms for claiming deductions. There are more than 10,000 food agencies throughout the country that receive these donations, so if you itemize your taxes and want to provide proper credit for your Food Drive donations, you will need to determine the name of the agency (food pantry or other charity) that received your food, as well as the agency's address and tax I.D. number for proper reporting on your tax-filing forms. The Food Drive Coordinator at your local post office should be able to give you the name of the receiving agency, and that agency will likely have tax information handy.

### **2018 UNION COUNTY STEM SCHOLARS GRANT AWARD**

Scotch Plains-Fanwood K-12 Science Supervisor, Guida Faria, shared the exciting news that Park and Terrill Middle Schools were awarded grants from Union County STEM totaling \$1,800. Park Middle School seventh grade Tech Ed teacher, Erica Toto and principal Dr. Jocelyn Dumaresq will be receiving \$800 for Afterschool STEM which will help fund the purchase of a 3D printer for Park's S.T.E.A.M. Club. This printer will enable students to see their prototype designs come to life as it 3D prints and then allows the students to compare its success relative to the first two prototypes.

Peggy Brown and John Scholtz, sixth grade science teachers at Park Middle School, were awarded a Union County STEM grant for Project Based Learning totaling \$500. The goal of this grant is to purchase fossils and other materials needed to create a simulated fossil dig in the

classroom. Students will practice fossil preparation skills using real tools and techniques to remove real fossils from an artificial mix. The second goal is to expose students to various STEM related careers, in particular, paleontology and archeology.

Terrill Middle School seventh grade teacher, Michael Wolenter and principal Dr. Kevin Holloway were awarded a Union County STEM Grant for project-based learning totaling \$500. This project-based learning unit is called, "Aquaponics: Looking for the Best Solution to a Growing Problem" and is designed to have students look at a possible solution to the growing problem of feeding an increasing world population. The goal of this grant is to purchase various aquaponic and hydroponic systems to determine ideal conditions for optimal plant growth.

Coach McGriff humbly credits his staff and his students for these outstanding accomplishments; yet notably, all who work with Rich recognize his ability to motivate, inspire and lead with great integrity.



### **FANWOOD MOURNS PASSING OF FORMER COUNCILMAN BILL POPULUS**

Bill Populus, who lived in Fanwood for almost 50 years while raising his family and becoming an icon of good government and civic pride, died following a long illness. He was 83. He died at JFK Medical Center in Edison early on Friday, April 26th, 2019.

Mr. Populus served several terms as a Borough Councilman in Fanwood beginning in 1993. During those terms, he served as Council President and Council liaison to the borough Recreation Commission. Shade Commission and Public Works Committee. He was instrumental in creating a master plan for borough parks and helped secure funding for them. He also spearheaded the formation of the first merchants' association in 1993 and later created committees bringing together business, volunteer and community leaders to begin the rebirth of Fanwood's downtown. His legacy lives on in the redevelopment that has shaped our town and continues today.

Mr. Populus was the first black Councilman elected in Fanwood. He remained politically active in Fanwood's Democratic organization, taking part in Committee meetings and fundraisers well into 2018.

"One of the things he was very proud of was

being appointed a Real Estate Commissioner," said Marilyn Populus, his wife of 59 years, who showed the letter he received from then-Governor Jim McGreevey confirming his appointment to the NJ Real Estate Commission in 2003. His appointment was continued by Acting Governor Cody and later by Governor Corzine. Mr. Populus worked as a real estate broker and later as an appraiser well into his

80's.

"But his greatest achievement in life was being the perfect father and husband," she said.

The Populuses were originally from New Orleans. Various circumstances and a New Jersey connection led them to move to Plainfield in 1961. Mr. Populus' first job here was selling lingerie at Korvette's department store in the Blue Star shopping center. He later became a mail carrier before finally getting his real estate license. The Populuses moved to their house on LaGrande Avenue in Fanwood in 1971 where they raised their two sons, William and Peter, and daughter Erika. All went through the Scotch Plains-Fanwood public school system.

Mr. Populus was a military veteran, first joining the Navy in 1953 and later joining the Air Force. As luck would have it, his stints in those services happened to miss both the Korean and Vietnam wars.

"We send our deepest condolences to Marilyn, Billy, Peter, Erika and the grandchildren," said Fanwood Mayor Colleen Mahr. "I considered Bill a close friend and confidant. He was someone whose opinion and guidance I sought. I am a better person and Mayor because I knew Bill Populus."

### PARK MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS RAISE AWARENESS ABOUT DYSLEXIA

Hello. We are 7th grade tudents from Park Middle School in Scotch Plains. We are conducting Service Learning Project and have chosen to raise awareness about Dyslexia, which is a quite common disorder. Based on our research, we have learned that Dyslexia is a disorder which affects reading, writing, and spelling. This disorder affects approximately 15%-20% of the population. (Schachter, 2016).

The cause of dyslexia is unclear and doctors continue to research the condition in order to understand what causes it. The research in Understood.org (2019) stated, "When we study children or adults with dyslexia, we find that some of those areas aren't activated quite the same as they are in people who do not have dyslexia. The imaging research has given us a very nice inside view of the reading brain and how it differs in struggling readers." That means a large portion of the brain is not being used to its fullest capacity in people with dyslexia. The research also stated, "Reading is made up of different components. And likewise what we see in the brain is a network that reflects those different components that we use for reading. Reading uses different parts of the brain to sound out unfamiliar words, recognize familiar words by sight, and to think about how to pronounce those words." To simplify, humans use different parts of the brain to understand the sound of the language, recognize the words visually, and pronounce the words.


Finding the right teaching method is crucial in order to help people with dyslexia learn how to read and write. So far there are a few promising methods such as an effective approach provided by Orton-Gillingham, an organization that helps dyslexics to read by breaking down the words. Other methods involve multisensory teaching (Gooding, 2017) that involves use of sand to sound out words, write out the words or clap the syllables before writing the word. Other methods involve technological advances. From researching Dyslexia.com we learn that "Keyboards with colored overlays and larger letters make typing more accessible to dyslexic students. Some come with multimedia hotkeys that enable the user to play, pause, stop, or rewind audio, which is useful as dyslexic learners often use text-to-speech software when reading and writing." These methods are easily accessible and provide dyslexic children with the opportunity to learn how to write and read.

People with dyslexia are not the only ones affected by the disorder. In the article "The Effects of Dyslexia", 2015 we read: "Siblings are often upset or jealous because they might feel that one child is getting more attention because of an illness. This is normal for children to feel this way and for families to struggle to find a solution". Indeed, the dyslexic children need more attention than other children. For example, they may need extra help with homework and this could take attention from parents to this child in need. However, dyslexia doesn't have to stop anyone from reaching the full potential. In "Jamie Oliver is right: people with dyslexia really do

look at things differently" Usborne (2017) we Resources Consulted: read "I have five severely dyslexic children - says the association's policy manager Sue Flohr, who is herself dyslexic. They're now a doctor, a teacher, a photographer, a designer and a nightclub manager". This shows that even people with dyslexia can still do great things in life and be successful. To sum up, dyslexics are not the only people affected by dyslexia, family members are too. Dyslexia doesn't have to stop you from living your dream.

To conclude, dyslexia is a reading disorder, however, it does not affect children's intelligence. Many people don't understand what dyslexia is and jump to conclusions assuming that people with dyslexia are not smart. We hope that this article will inform you about dyslexia. If you ever meet someone with this condition, please be aware they are just as intelligent and hardworking as you.


