This annual cultural-heritage festival features live musical performers, local shops, a Kids Fun Zone, a Car Show, and much more to entertain the entire family!

To kick off the start of the festival day, you can relax at our new stage on Grand Lower Lum Field, with performances starting at 10am and ending at 6pm.

Rich Schrader will discuss the replacement of the old Tappan Zee Bridge covering the history of replacement discussions/actions, the procurement method selected by state, key political and private involvement, major features, design and construction parameters. and current status. Rich, a registered professional engineer, has almost 40 years of professional experience with some 35 years in engineering and construction. He spent 11 years with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and taught at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.

2019 MEMORIAL DAY PARADE GRAND MARSHALL DR. ROBERT NEWHOUSE

Dr. Robert Newhouse is a veteran of the World War II, having served in the European Theater. After graduating from West Orange High School in 1942, he enlisted in the Army Signal Corps and was enrolled on an inactive basis at the communication school in Newark. Following graduation and induction at Fort Dix, he was offered a transfer to the Army Air Corps for pilot training at Gettysburg College. Six months later training stopped. He and many of his classmates were transferred to other assignments. His was assigned to the 78th infantry division at Camp Pickett Virginia for training as one of many replacements for soldiers who lost their lives during the invasion of Europe. In 1944 the division was deployed overseas as part of the 369th Regiment Headquarters Company.

Following advances through France and Belgium, the 78th saw its first combat at the Siegfried Line. After two days of heavy serious offensive of the war, the so-called Battle of the Bulge. When the German breakthrough occurred, the members of the entire 78th Division were ordered to hold their positions at all costs. They contained the German offensive at the northern sector of the Bulge.

The division continued its advance to the Rhine River. Doctor Newhouse was wounded during combat and spent two months recovering in a hospital in Paris, France. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star among other decorations.

Doctor Newhouse's 58 years in education included leadership positions ranging from preschool through elementary, junior high, college and graduate levels in Florham Park, Madison, Kean College, Fairleigh Dickinson University and the College of St. Elizabeth. His career in Madison included teaching in the Junior School

fighting, the German army mounted their last the Lucy D. Anthony School, the Tory J. Sabatini School, and the Madison Junior School. Dr. Newhouse also enjoyed officiating high school football, basketball and baseball as well as playing golf and tennis.
