ROTARY CLUB TO HOLD ANNUAL TRACK AND FIELD MEET

The oldest service club of the three Plainfields will hold their most important annual community service project on June 5, 2019 at the Hub Stine Athletic Complex in Plainfield. Long a mainstay in supporting the Plainfield communities, the Rotary Club of the Plainfields will offer an afternoon of friendly but determined competition to young 12, 13 and 14 year-old athletes from area middle schools. "This invitational meet is the longest-running meet of its kind in the entire state," said Michael Townley, director of the meet. "We have offered this meet as a service to area youth since 1923, except during World War II."

Rotary club members and their friends serve as the officials at the Meet. They are also supported by members of the Interact Club at North Plainfield High School. Interact is the youth-based service club sponsored by Rotary International.

"Interact is a great club of enthusiastic students who are interested in doing good deeds for others," said Roberta Smith, Rotary president. "They help us with a number of our service projects and activities throughout the year, and host quite a few activities of their own to benefit North Plainfield residents. We are proud of them and of all that they accomplish throughout the year."

Ninety-one years of track and field meets have drawn many thousands of participants, including Olympic decathlon champion and former Plainfield resident Milt Campbell. "We recognize that participating in our Track and Field Meet was but one step in Milt's long and successful drive to achieve his decathlon championship," said Townley. "In fact, our Club was proud to be one of the many community groups that financially supported his Olympic trip." According to Townley, each year the Club members learn something new about the athletes that participated in the Meet. "One of the seniors we interviewed at Plainfield High for our scholarship awards two years ago commented

that not only did she win a medal at our Meet, it was also her first formal track event. It influenced her to go on to star on the PHS track team, and led to her decision to run track in college."

Schools that were invited to send athletes to this year's Meet include North Plainfield Middle School, Plainfield's Maxson Middle School and Hubbard Middle School, the Valley View School in Watchung, South Plainfield Middle School, and four other area schools.

Medals will be awarded to first, second and third place finishers in all events except the relays, where ribbons are awarded to second and third place finishers. If the past is any indication, medals or ribbons will be earned by athletes from every school that is registered.

"Our Club looks forward each year to this special service project," said Townley. "Rotary International's motto is 'Service Above Self'. We truly enjoy providing this service to these fine young athletes and presenting them an opportunity to win medals or ribbons for their athleticism."

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IMAGINE SEEKS VOLUNTEERS TO PROVIDE GRIEF SUPPORT

Imagine, A Center for Coping with Loss currently seeks volunteers to serve as peer support group facilitators for children and families coping with loss due to death. Upcoming summer trainings will be held June 27-30th and July 26-29th, 2019.

Imagine groups are facilitated by trained adult volunteers who attend a 32-hour training and quarterly continuing education, and receive ongoing supervision. Volunteers come from all walks of life and need no special background other than a willingness to listen and the ability to be with children and adults in pain without trying to fix, solve problems, or give advice. Volunteers must be 21 years or older and attend the Imagine four-day Facilitator Training. No prior experience is necessary.

"For the first time in our seven-year history we have a waiting list," said Mandi Zucker, Imagine Program Director. "As our programs continue to grow, so does our need for volunteers. We are currently serving over 380 participants every two weeks in our peer support programs and will be adding another night of support so we can serve an additional 60 people." Volunteers say the training is "life-changing" and a wonderful opportunity for learning about themselves and how their own losses have affected the way they grieve and how they support others. People that complete the training leave feeling empowered to be a supportive person to people grieving any type of loss.

Imagine is a free year-round peer grief support center located in Mountainside and Newark New Jersey, serving children age 3-18 who have had a parent or sibling die, with concurrent support groups for their parents or guardians. Support for children and teens living with a parent or sibling with a life-altering physical illness is also available. Free year-round support groups are also available for young adults who have had a friend, sibling, parent or other important person in their life die, or who have a parent, sibling or friend living with an illness.




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VICTORIA GRISWOLD RECEIVES THE 2019 SERVICE ABOVE SELF AWARD

When discussing her path that led her to CASA SHaW, she said, "about a year ago, I was looking for a volunteer opportunity and found CASA online. The CASA organization stood out above the rest. At the time, there was a lot of media coverage about families going through the

Court Appointed Special Advocates of Somerset, Hunterdon and Warren Counties (CASA SHaW) has announced Information Sessions for individuals in our community who are interested in learning more about becoming a CASA volunteer advocate.

"Attending an information session is the first step in becoming a CASA volunteer advocate for a foster child who has been abused and neglected. This is where individuals learn about what it takes to become volunteer," said Tracey Heisler, Executive Director of CASA SHaW. Attending an Information Session is required for anyone interested in applying to become a CASA.

CASA of Somerset, Hunterdon, and Warren Counties is part of a statewide network of community-based, non-profit programs that recruit, screen, train and supervise volunteers to "Speak Up for a Child" removed from home due to abuse or neglect. CASA is the only program in New Jersey that uses trained volunteers to work one-on-one with children, ensuring that each one gets the services needed and achieves permanency in a safe, nurturing home. To find a local CASA program in your county, visit casaofnj.org. opioid crisis and stories of children being taken from their homes. I have also seen the affects and stress on children who have gone through the foster care system throughout my time working in different schools and in speaking to people with this experience. I have always enjoyed working with children and the thought of any child being torn away from their parents, siblings and home and how afraid they must feel, is hurtful to me."

Erikka currently advocates for two siblings ages 4 and 6. They are bright, active, cheerful, loving children who enjoy reading stories, drawing, playing games and dancing around. As their CASA, she is an extra set of eyes and ears on their case to ensure their needs are met and that they are happy, healthy and cared for by their

foster parent. Throughout their stay with the foster parent, she has formed relationships with counselors and teachers at the children's school to ensure they continue to do well and don't fall behind. She has also formed a relationship with their biological mother, and havs been there for her as she set and accomplished goals for herself so she could be the best mom she could be when the children go back home.

Erikka said, "I think part of being a CASA is being able to understand where people are coming from and where they need to go to be successful. It is about being a cheerleader for the parent in helping them overcome obstacles that have prevented them from being with their children. Simply being someone who is there to listen, to bounce ideas off of, or to vent to is often helpful to a parent. It is about being a consistent part of the children's lives. For many foster children, consistency doesn't come easy, as they are moved around and experience a lot of changes. The children need to know they have someone who is on their side and looking out for them."

Erikka continued by saying, "at CASA SHAW, I have a supportive and knowledgeable group of people to reach out to whenever I have questions or concerns. CASA has provided training opportunities to further my understanding of how children in foster care are affected and resources to use throughout my case to better help the family. I have attended family court and gained a new perspective on how DCP&P and the foster system works. I am grateful the children on my case are expected to be reunified with their mother and look forward to helping another family soon."

We thank Erikka for all she has done as a volunteer advocate and her dedication to making a difference in the lives of those children who need a voice at this time in their lives.

FIRE DEPARTMENT CONDUCTS ANNUAL AWARD CEREMONY

At the Borough's May 6, 2019 Council meeting, the North Plainfield Fire Department conducted its annual award ceremony and Mayor Michael Giordano read the oath of office to our two newest members. Melissa Zittel was swornin as a Uniformed EMT and Ross Innocenti was sworn-in as a probationary Firefighter/EMT.

During this year's award ceremony, the following recipients were recognized:

Service Commendation Award - Captain James DiPaolo, Firefighters Kevin Miller and Brendan Kinney, and EMTs John Schulz and Susan Connolly

This was earned for their life saving actions on May 30, 2017. That day, we were dispatched to a report of a person having difficulty breathing where the patient suddenly went into full cardiac arrest. CPR was initiated by the crew who performed several rounds of CPR and delivered 3 shocks with the AED prior to the arrival of paramedics. Shortly after medics arrived, the patient did regain a spontaneous heartbeat and respirations, and she was immediately transported to the hospital. Upon transfer of the patient to the hospital ER staff she was responsive and breathing on her own.

Service Commendation Award - EMT Deirdre Wright and EMT Ryan Lucas



child's birth was imminent. A few moments later, not yet knowing exactly what occurred and in a healthy baby girl was delivered by this crew inside the patient's residence. The crew then transported mother and child to St. Peter's hospital.

On the evening of August 18, 2018, the fire department was dispatched to a call reporting 2 unconscious people in a business along Route 22. Upon arrival, two victims were found inside the building and unconscious for no apparent reason. A paramedic unit happened to be in the parking lot of the business next door, so they were in the process of removing an unconscious female from inside the store who was one of the victims. They quickly updated the platoon officer, Lt. Tom McDonald, that there was another male patient still inside. The Lt. cautiously entered the store, Firefighters and EMTs.

that short moment, he detected a fuel exhaust odor, observed a liquid chemical agent on the floor and saw the unconscious male laying not too far from the liquid chemical. He then entered Unit Citation Award - Lieutenant Thomas the building to quickly remove him. At that point, other Fire/EMS personnel on scene assisted with removing this victim and helped provide patient care for both patients. Further investigation determined that fatal levels of carbon monoxide had accumulated in the building due to gasoline fueled power washer being used inside the building. Simultaneously the other victim was using a highly acidic cleaner on the floor and when she became unconscious, she was laying in the chemical product, which caused significant burns to her back and right side. Ultimately the building was ventilated, returned to a safe condition and both victims survived, only because of the actions of these
