
This year's theme was "A Night in Camelot." The students set up, serve dinner, clean and dance with the senior citizens. Ms. Palermo has been working with her students on this event for many



# **CELEBRATE NATIONAL SEWING MACHINE DAY ON JUNE 13**

The sewing machine is truly one of society's greatest inventions, with a long and rather interesting history, including patent conflicts, lawsuits and constant evolution, all on an international scale! Whether you're inspired by the fashionistas on Project Runway or just need to mend a torn pocket, it's clear that a sewing machine is something no home should be without. And since National Sewing Machine Day is celebrated yearly on June 13, this is the perfect time to share just a couple of the highlights along the colorful timeline of this lofty invention:

In the 20th century, more than 4,000 different kinds of sewing machines were made.

The first patent for a sewing machine is evidenced by a diagram, by the inventor Thomas Saint, and Englishman, in 1790, although there is a possibility that Charles Weisenthal, a German had already invented a machine 35 years earlier to go with a machine needle he had patented.

The inventors Isaac Singer and Elias Howe from the United States, significantly improved the early designs of sewing machines in the 1840s and 1850s, and are often credited as the inventors of the appliance.

While Elias Howe is credited with the actual invention of the first patented sewing machine in 1846, the industry's most well-known figure, Isaac Singer actually patented his improved version in 1851.

Singer promoted it internationally as a household necessity and as a result, the Singer Company became one of America's first multinational corporations, and a hugely successful one at that. His success was due, in part, to selling the machines on installment plans with just a \$5 or \$10 deposit, allowing every

household to own a sewing machine. It was one of the first products to be sold on credit. The \$125 cost was approximately 1/5th of the average American income!

Later, Garrett Morgan invented a zigzag stitching attachment for manually operated sewing machines and ran a successful business repairing sewing equipment in the early 1900s. Born the son of former enslaved Africans, Morgan is more widely known for inventing the traffic light, and an apparatus that became the modern-day gas mask, among other inventions.

The 1950's are regarded as the "Golden Age" of home sewing because of the ready availability of sewing machines for the home, designer patterns, DIY designs inspired by Hollywood. Fabric and sewing departments were also increasingly popular in all of the department stores.








# **CRANE'S FORD DAR CELEBRATES 75TH ANNIVERSARY**

At a recent luncheon, held at the Holiday Inn in Clark, New Jersey, the Crane's Ford chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution celebrated the 75th Anniversary of the founding of the chapter.

On March 7, 1944 the Crane's Ford chapter was organized in Cranford and chartered by the National Society. At that time the chapter had 36 members and its founding Regent was Julia I Hazzard of Cranford. Since that time the chapter has had 23 Regents with many serving more than one 3-year term. The chapter took its name from a ford in the Rahway River where light horseman stood guard while General Washington's army was encamped at Morristown.

Attending the celebration were chapter members along with NJDAR State Officers including State Regent, Karen Strover, State Vice Regent, Bonnie Matthews, State Historian, Pat Saftner and the State Central District Director, Susan Luczu. The State Regent administered the Oath of Membership to the chapter's new member, Patricia Huxford of Roselle Park.

Today the Crane's Ford chapter has 56 members from Cranford and surrounding town as well as many from out of state. The chapter is led by Regent Mary Leonard of Roselle Park and she is completing her 5th year. The chapter supports the National Society by continuing to promote historic preservation, education and patriotism as Recognition awards. the local level. Throughout each year the chapter presents various awards including Good Citizen to high school seniors, American History Essay Contest, and JROTC to cadets at Elizabeth High School, Linden High School and Abraham Clark High School in Roselle. National awards given by the chapter over the years includes Conservation, Women in the Arts, Women in American History, and Historic Preservation

Within NJ there are 46 chapters of the DAR, with over 2,700 members. Nationally there are over 175,000 members in over 3,000 chapters. # A TRIBUTE TO RAHWAY'S MEN IN BLUE WHO DIED IN THE LINE OF DUTY

The Rahway Police Department was established on June 8, 1858 and in the department's 161 year history, nine officers have lost their lives while in the service of their city. In the next two issues of "Our Town," this column will pay tribute to those officers by recounting the tragic stories that led to their deaths.

Part I

\* Special policeman Alfred E. Jewell (d. March 2, 1895) was shot and killed while in pursuit of a tramp near the site of the former Scott Avenue train station.

The incident started after railroad freight agents telegraphed police headquarters requesting help to break up a gang of six tramps who were drunk and causing trouble at the station. Chief George Wright and four officers, including Jewell, responded. Upon seeing the police, the tramps split up and ran in different directions. Jewell, along with Officer Joel Sharp, chased after one of the trouble-makers. As they gained ground on the fleeing drifter, and were approximately fifteen yards from apprehending him, he suddenly turned and fired three shots. One bullet struck Jewell in the stomach killing him almost instantly. Officer Sharp pounced on the shooter, threw him to the ground, and restrained him until the other officers came to his aid.

When searched, the culprit, who gave his name as John Sloan, was carrying two sticks of dynamite, a jackknife, fuse, percussion caps, and a set of drills and a file, articles commonly associated with safe-crackers.

Officer Jewell was 58 years old and was survived by a wife and four children.

On May 14, Sloan, whose real name turned out to be Frank Freehill, was indicted for murder by a Grand Jury and on December 11 he was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to the full penalty of ten years in State Prison and a fine of \$1,000.


\* Policeman Jeremiah Dunham (d. April 26, 1899) was killed by a fast-moving, east-bound passenger train at Rahway Station at 7:50 in the evening.

While on duty at the railroad station, Dunham started to cross the east-bound tracks and stopped as a west-bound freight train was passing. As he waited an express bore down on him and before he could get out of the way, he was violently struck and killed. Persons on the station platform witnessed the horrific sight and were able to graphic details. According eyewitnesses, the headlamp on the express was not burning or at best was very dim and no whistle was blown nor bell sounded. It was reported the express was running eight minutes late when it roared through Rahway at a speed of sixty miles per hour.

The train's engineer was unaware of the accident until he reached Jersey City where he was told he had struck a man.

Officer Dunham was 54 years old, a veteran of the Civil War and member of Barry Post G.A.R. He was survived by a wife, two daughters, and a son.

\* Officers Jacob Kraus and James Lynch (d.

February 25, 1919) were both shot and killed by Guiseppe Musachio, an Italian immigrant, who mistook the two lawmen for hoodlums who, a short time before the fatal shooting had caused a disturbance in front of his home.

Officer Lynch, who was off duty and wearing civilian clothes, was on his way home after attending a dance at St. Mary's hall when he came to the corner opposite the Soldiers' Monument on the triangle of Irving and Main Streets and Central Avenue. Hearing loud shouts and curses, his attention was drawn to a fracas at the rear of the monument. Several young men were punching and kicking a man who was on the ground. Lynch rushed across the street to intervene and the assailants ran off. One of the toughs, wearing a red sweater, went into the apartment building numbered 8 Main Street. Lynch helped the badly blooded victim to his feet and brought him to headquarters. He then headed back to the Main Street address accompanied by Officer Kraus, who was on duty in the office.

It was just after midnight when the officers entered the dark apartment building. Finding no one in the first floor hallway they climbed the stairs to the second floor. They knocked on the first door. It would later be debated if the door was opened by the tenant or if the officers forced it open. Nevertheless, shots rang out in both directions. Kraus was mortally wounded, but was

able to return to headquarters where all he could utter was a street address. He was rushed to Rahway Hospital where he died soon after arriving.

Within moments after Kraus' message, every available officer was called to the scene and had the building completely surrounded. When the police entered Mucachio's room they found Lynch's lifeless body, Musachio's wife, who had been shot in the leg, and two children. In the midst of the confusion, Musachio was somehow able to exit the building and go to police headquarters where he reported that two men had been shot at his home – he never realized they were police officers.

Officer Kraus was 59 years old and the father of one daughter and three sons and Officer Lynch, was 36 and unmarried.

On May 14, 1919, Musachio was released from the county jail and set free on the grounds that he was not made aware that it was in fact officers who were at his door and that when the two came through the portal, he was justified in responding as he did to protect his family.

# **NATIVE MILKWEED & MONARCH BUTTERFLIES**

Over the centuries Monarch Butterflies have captivated humans with their bright colors and annual migration during which they often appear in large groups, called a 'roost'. The Monarchs actually migrate alone and not in flocks like birds. On this journey Monarch populations depend on Native North American "Milkweeds", the only plant on which they lay their eggs.

In our area, with modern construction taking more land for development, Milkweed plants are rapidly disappearing. In rural areas and farm lands, the use of herbicides is also taking its toll on Milkweeds. This sadly has a negative effect on the Monarch population. They have less host plants for their eggs and caterpillars.


Milkweeds (Asclepias) get their name from the sticky white sap that oozes from the leaves when they are damaged. More than 100 species of this herbaceous perennial are native to the U.S. and Canada. Many have adapted to different regions of the country and a wide range of climates and terrains, from deserts and rocky areas to marshes and open prairies. Some species grow exclusively in specific regions while others will thrive in just about any habitat.

Milkweed is both a food source and a host plant on which the Monarch lays her eggs, depositing them on the underside of the leaves. The caterpillars then feed on the leaves after hatching, but cause no permanent damage to the plant. In turn, the toxic chemicals contained in the sap of Milkweed plants make both the caterpillars and adult butterflies unappetizing and even toxic to predators.

This technique has worked so well for Monarchs, it was long believed Viceroy butterflies had evolved with similar colors and markings to mimic the Monarch and fool predators that they too are unappetizing. Recent studies now show Viceroy butterflies are also toxic.

During Monarch migration flight is fueled by 'nectaring' on the flowers and is punctuated by laying eggs on Milkweeds. To grow and sustain each generation, Milkweed is the only food needed

Of all the native Milkweed species only one is

considered highly desirable for our North American gardens, Butterfly Weed, (Asclepias tuberosa).

This showy cousin of Milkweed is one of the most ornamental varieties, featuring clusters of vibrant orange flowers. The blooms are perched atop the ends of the stalks so they create a prominent display even if your plants are located at the back of a flower bed. Butterfly Weed is slow to establish but will brighten your garden for years to come. There is also a golden yellow variety.

Butterfly Weed has a deep taproot which helps it survive periods of drought. The downside is that it cannot be successfully transplanted. When you select a spot to plant it, take this into consideration. Once in its space you should leave Butterfly Weed where you planted it. The vibrant color, as mentioned, will stand out in your garden. If you have space, plant more than one because although Monarchs migrate alone, they often gather in route to feed and mate. These 'roosts' are spectacular when seen.

Milkweed's highly fragrant and nectar-rich flowers are an enticement for other pollinators as well. Frequent visitors include native bees, honey bees, many other types of butterflies, and hummingbirds.

## TROPICAL MILKWEED

Plan to Save Monarch Butterflies Backfires When evidence emerged that Monarch Butterflies were losing the Milkweed they depend on due to the spread of herbicide-resistant crops in the United States, people across the country took action, planting Milkweed in their own gardens. Many gardeners planted the 'nonnative' Tropical Milkweed because of its beautiful bright colors. This plan backfired in two ways. Since Tropical Milkweed flowers longer into the late autumn and in some parts of the country throughout winter, it fools the Monarchs into staying in our area longer, endangering the butterflies' iconic migration to Mexico.

Additionally, Tropical Milkweed holds onto its original leaves though its entire life causing overuse by Monarchs and increasing the odds of the caterpillars becoming infected with a crippling parasite.

How can you to help solve this problem? (1) Plant native Milkweeds. (2) If you have Tropical Milkweed prune half the plants in mid-season, then prune the other half when the first has recovered. (3) In late summer Tropical Milkweed can be potted up and overwintered indoors. This is because it does not have a deep taproot like its North American cousins.

# **ELIZABETH BENNETT OF RAHWAY** TO ADVOCATE FOR LOCAL FOSTER YOUTH

Thanks to Elizabeth Bennett, Rahway was among 13 municipalities represented by the 15 newest court appointed special advocates tasked with serving as extra eyes and ears for family law judges on the cases of Union County youth removed from their home due to abuse, neglect or abandonment and placed in foster homes or residential facilities. The ceremony was held on April 9, 2019 at the Union County Family Courthouse.

Said Bennett, "I've been volunteering my whole life, being raised and taught that we are to help and love everyone. When I heard of CASA and found the guts and courage to sign up, it felt like the right fit. I wanted something that was not just a one off but a way I can make a real and personal connection. I don't have children of my own so I hope to be the special someone in their life that my parents were to me. It's really more selfish than selfless and I can't wait to meet my CASA child and hope I impact their life as much as they will impact mine."

After completion of approximately 30 hours' training with Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Union County, Bennett and her classmates took their oath and were sworn in as advocates and judicial volunteers by Superior Court Judge Richard Wischusen. After completion of three hours' court observation to see seasoned CASA volunteers in action, the new advocates will meet their assigned foster youth or siblings.

The new advocates range from age 23 to 66, are parents and nonparents, and work in such fields as education, nonprofit, and law enforcement, as well as homemakers. Most had no prior knowledge of the foster system.

With court-ordered access to foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, CASA volunteers incorporate their findings into court reports and work to ensure each youth's

needs are met and best interests protected. They are a constant during chaos and work to ensure the youth's trauma is not exacerbated in care.

There are approximately 500 Union County youth from birth to age 21 in foster care, and more than 200 are still waiting for their very own CASA volunteer in their corner. Could that be you?

Free year-round support groups are also available for young adults who have had a friend, sibling, parent or other important person in their life die, or who have a parent, sibling or friend living with an illness.
