



CASA SHAW VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT ON ERIKKA FLOYD

Erikka has been a dedicated CASA volunteer advocate who continues to make a difference in the lives of the children she serves. She lives with her family in Hunterdon County, where she works as a substitute teacher. She is also very proud to have two beautiful children of her own, ages 7 and 11.

When discussing her path that led her to CASA SHaW, she said, "about a year ago, I was looking for a volunteer opportunity and found CASA online. The CASA organization stood out above the rest. At the time, there was a lot of media coverage about families going through the opioid crisis and stories of children being taken from their homes. I have also seen the affects and stress on children who have gone through the foster care system throughout my time working in different schools and in speaking to people with this experience. I have always enjoyed working with children and the thought of any child being torn away from their parents, siblings and home and how afraid they must feel, is hurtful to me."

Erikka currently advocates for two siblings ages 4 and 6. They are bright, active, cheerful, loving children who enjoy reading stories, drawing, playing games and dancing around. As their CASA, she is an extra set of eyes and ears on their case to ensure their needs are met and that they are happy, healthy and cared for by their foster parent. Throughout their stay with the foster parent, she has formed relationships with counselors and teachers at the children's school to ensure they continue to do well and don't fall behind. She has also formed a relationship with their biological mother, and havs been there for her as she set and accomplished goals for herself so she could be the best mom she could be when the children go back home.

Erikka said, "I think part of being a CASA is being able to understand where people are coming from and where they need to go to be successful. It is about being a cheerleader for the parent in helping them overcome obstacles that have prevented them from being with their children. Simply being someone who is there to listen, to bounce ideas off of, or to vent to is often helpful to a parent. It is about being a consistent part of the children's lives. For many foster children, consistency doesn't come easy, as they are moved around and experience a lot of changes. The children need to know they have someone who is on their side and looking out for them."

Erikka continued by saying, "at CASA SHAW, I have a supportive and knowledgeable group of people to reach out to whenever I have questions or concerns. CASA has provided training opportunities to further my understanding of how children in foster care are affected and resources to use throughout my case to better help the family. I have attended family court and gained a new perspective on how DCP&P and the foster system works. I am grateful the children on my case are expected to

be reunified with their mother and look forward to helping another family soon."

We thank Erikka for all she has done as a volunteer advocate and her dedication to making a difference in the lives of those children who need a voice at this time in their lives.

CASA SHAW SEEKING ADVOCATES

Court Appointed Special Advocates of Somerset, Hunterdon and Warren Counties (CASA SHaW) has announced Information Sessions in July for individuals in our community who are interested in learning more about becoming a CASA volunteer advocate.

CASA SHaW is part of a statewide network of community-based, non-profit programs that recruit, screen, train and supervise volunteers to "Speak Up for a Child" removed from home due to abuse or neglect. CASA is the only program in New Jersey that uses trained volunteers to work one-on-one with children, ensuring that each one gets the services needed and achieves permanency in a safe, nurturing home.

"Attending an information session is the first step in becoming a CASA volunteer advocate for a foster child who has been abused and neglected. This is where individuals learn about what it takes to become volunteer," said Tracey Heisler, Executive Director of CASA SHaW. Attending

an Information Session is required for anyone interested in applying to become a CASA.



TAKE THE SUMMER READING CHALLENGE

The Somerset County Library System of New Jersey's (SCLSNJ) Summer Reading Challenge began on June 17 and continues through August 17, 2019 challenging Somerset County youths to read more. And, it doesn't matter what you read or how long you read - as long as you read every day.

During 2018's Summer Reading Challenge, SCLSNJ saw a 19 percent increase in the number of participants in comparison to 2017. Those participants read a combined 172,152 days - a 27 percent increase from 2017. SCLSNJ strives to increase County literacy even more in 2019 through the Summer Reading Challenge.

"Everyone knows that reading is fundamental to academic success and that too many things in today's world compete for our children's attention," said Brian K. Auger, county library administrator. "We're delighted to be one of those competitors, since one of our missions is to foster a love of reading.

"In addition to maintaining reading proficiency throughout the summer, SCLSNJ's Summer Reading Challenge provides children and teens with an opportunity to explore new possibilities through reading," said Karen Pifher; manager of branch services, young minds and family resources. "One of the most exciting experiences is when young readers discover new authors or genres to share with friends and family members."
