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DAVID CONE HUMANITARIAN AWARDED TO GIOVANNA PSOLKA



Giovanna's three children went through the Westfield school system where she volunteered to help the elementary students create art projects on various occasions. She even served as the fundraising co-chair of the Westfield High School Marching Band for a couple of years and raised money to buy new uniforms.

While working at Ernst & Young, Giovanna volunteered for 12 years as the AccessAbilities Employee Professional Resource Network Leader, developing programs to raise awareness and provide guidance on workplace issues for the special needs community. Each year she led efforts for Disability Employment Awareness Month in October, running a student shadowing program during which she met Emmy-winning sports reporter Ed Lucas. Lucas is blind, and founded the Ed Lucas Foundation, a 501 (C) (3) non-profit organization that offers financial support to the blind/visually impaired and others living with a disability.

The Greater Westfield Chapter of UNICO National invited Cranford resident Will DeGregorio and his mother Kara Shields to their June meeting. In April, Westfield UNICO hosted a flapjack breakfast fundraiser at Clark Applebee's to help cover some of the medical expenses associated with Will's cancer diagnosis. In 2012, a 3 year old Will was diagnosed with Adrenal Cancer and survived, only to learn in 2018 of a new tumor on his pelvis called Osteosarcoma. He recently endured intensive chemotherapy before and after his major surgery, where the team resected a large portion of his hip bone.

After testing it was discovered that Will has Li-Fraumeni Syndrome. This syndrome is a rare hereditary disorder that predisposes carriers to cancer development. This means Will is susceptible to tumor growth, which is why every year for the rest of his life he will endure a full body scan.

Happily Will returned into his 4th grade classroom and is an avid sports enthusiast. He likes to play basketball and baseball and his favorite teams are the New York Yankees, Giants and Rangers.

CASA of Union County is a nonprofit organization that recruits, trains, supervises and supports community volunteers to advocate for abused, neglected and abandoned Union County children removed from home and placed in foster care or residential facilities. There are more than 500 Union County children in foster care, and the organization currently serves just over half. Its mission is to be able to provide an advocate for every youth in care.

Skibitsky has spent his career in the animal health industry, with more than 30 years at Merck Animal Health in sales management, operations and marketing, and he currently heads a team focused on solutions for nonprofit animal welfare organizations nationwide. Skibitsky's public service posts include 15 years as an elected official in Westfield — with more than 12 of those as mayor, more than any other in the colonial town's 225-year history. He has chaired its Public Safety, Transportation and Parking Committee and Public Works Committee. He was inducted into the New Jersey Mayors Hall of Fame in 2015. A graduate of Rider College with a Bachelor's of Science, Skibitsky and his wife have four children.

"Friends who have volunteered for CASA," said Skibitsky, "have said it was a very rewarding experience. Really, what could be more fulfilling than protecting our most vulnerable children?" Ryan, an adjunct professor at Seton Hall University, teaches international marketing to business school students. Prior to academia, Ryan spent more than two decades with international wine importer Dreyfus, Ashby & Co., ultimately serving as president and chief executive officer. He has helped create several successful brands and adjusted the marketing of others to meet market trends and the evolving taste profile of the American consumer. Ryan earned a Bachelor's degree and a Master's degree in Business Administration from Manhattan College. He and his wife have two grown daughters and have called Westfield home more than 35 years.

Of his appointment to the board, Ryan noted, "At the end of the day it is all about our children — each and every one deserves the opportunity to be happy and content. CASA strives to make that happen every day with children who, unfortunately and through no fault of their own, have the odds stacked against them."

CASA volunteers have court-ordered access to foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, and work to ensure a child's best interests remain a priority while in care, and working toward a safe, stable and permanent home for each child. 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

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





Councilwoman Linda Habgood.



The Executive Director for the Westfield Foundation, Betsy Chance, awarded the Chester Gerdes Scholarship, The Robert and Winifred Read Law Scholarship and Health Scholarships. Don and Kate Maxwell presented the Don Maxwell Scholarship; Jayson Astel presented the presented the Harry Sturcke Scholarship; and Florence Wallace Scholarships. The two Wallace scholarships are 4 year scholarships for \$3,750 per year, totaling \$15,000 each.




MORGAN ENG RECEIVES NATIONAL GOLD MEDAL AWARD IN DESIGN

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
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
