For the last few years our charity racing team, Operation Rebound, has been sponsored by Backpacks for Life (BFL). This amazing charity is responsible for providing thousands of homeless veterans backpacks full of essential toiletries and personal items. Also, the BFL will seek out veterans in need and help them with housing, food, employment and any other service that will help them live a better life.

The founder of the BFL, Brett D'Alessandro, is a United States Marine Corps veteran and

started this outstanding charity shortly after he returned home from his tour of duty in Afghanistan. Brett recalls living out of a backpack during the war and felt a backpack can be a life-saving tool. In just a few years, Brett and the BFL are responsible for making thousands of backpacks for our homeless veterans.

The BFL doesn't just do backpacks, they are committed to helping our disabled veterans by providing them with the necessary resources and life-saving services by participating in various health fairs and PTSD groups. The BFL estimates about 350 disabled veterans have benefited from their resources and outreach. The BFL feels it's easy for a veteran to feel lost in the system. There are amazing resources out there, but it can be overwhelming trying to navigate it alone, so the BFL is there to help and guide the veteran through this agonizing process. What makes the BFL special is they invite veterans into their home and help with filling out paperwork, draft resumes, apply for housing, or whatever else is needed to help the veteran.

The future looks bright for the BFL. They're excited to expand their backpacks distribution and reach even more homeless veterans. As they connect with more veterans' organizations across the country, they will equip even more communities with backpacks.

Their mentorship and coaching process will

soon be accessible online. In this exciting development, veterans from across the country will be able to utilize the organization despite their location. Through this growth, the BFL focus remains on bringing hope back into the lives of veterans.

The BFL is out there every day making a difference and the Operation Rebound Racing Team is lucky to be a part of this incredible charity.

Registration is open for Fall Programs at the Westfield Recreation Department. Adults are encouraged to get out of the house this Fall beginning with our popular Tai Chi program on Tuesday mornings at 10:00 a.m. Another energizing program to join is our Aerobics & More classes on Mondays evenings 7:30-8:20 p.m. For both of these classes, all levels are



welcomed. Try a class by dropping in for one session.

Westfield Recreation Department offers a variety of enrichment programs and afterschool classes which include: Sewing/Fashion Design (Thursdays grades 2-5 & grades 6 & up), Cartooning 5-6 p.m. and Pre-School Drawing 4 - 4:45 p.m. on Tuesdays, Creative Art on Mondays at 5 p.m. and Cool Chemistry on Fridays at 5 p.m.. FIND PASSION IN RETIREMENT AT SENIOR ACTIVITIES EXPO, SEPT. 20

Lifelong Westfield will host a Senior Activities Expo on Friday, September 20, from 9 to 11 am at Temple Emanu-El, 756 E. Broad Street in Westfield. Seniors seeking social, volunteer and employment opportunities are encouraged to attend to learn about the many local clubs and organizations offering such activities. The event is free and a light breakfast will be served.

Gail Cassidy, a longtime resident and active volunteer, will kick off the event with a talk on "Finding Your Passion in Retirement." ADRIAN LOBO AND BETH RUDNICK BECOME ADVOCATES FOR FOSTER YOUTH

Two Westfield residents — Adrian Lobo and Beth Rudnick — are among the latest community volunteers to successfully train as advocates for Union County youth removed from home due to abuse or neglect, and now living in foster care. Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Union County is the only organization serving as extra eyes and ears for family law judges in an effort to protect best interests and ensure needs are met.

Before being sworn in, Lobo shared, "Children are the future of our country and through no fault of theirs, some have been abused, neglected and abandoned. Desmond Tutu said, 'Hope is being able to see that there is light despite all of the darkness.' I am motivated and committed to helping these children who deserve a better future." His classmate, Rudnick, takes her oath at a later date.

As the soon-to-be advocates arrived at the courthouse, Judge Richard Wischusen continued his practice of exiting his courtroom to greet and speak with the waiting volunteers. Later, while on the bench during the ceremony, he commended each for their commitment to the community's fragile child victims, and discussed the value of the CASA program to those children and case stakeholders, noting he always reads the CASA report and seeks their input during hearings.

Volunteers with varied backgrounds make successful advocates and this class, ages 24 to 71, is no exception. Each brings diverse experiences, including an adoptee, an adoptive parent, former military, immigrants, nonparents and parents, retirees, full- and part-time employees, and undergraduate and graduate students. Professional backgrounds include education, retail, nonprofit, information technology and academia. Most had no prior knowledge of the foster system.

The final step before meeting their assigned foster youth is observation of seasoned CASA volunteers in court. Once assigned to the case, a court order grants access to the child, foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, enabling advocates to make informed recommendations in the child's best interests.

There are approximately 500 Union County youth from birth to age 21 in foster care, and more than 200 are waiting for a CASA volunteer. Is that you?

HISTORICAL SOCIETY'S OCTOBER FIRST WEDNESDAY LUNCHEON: "The Mysterious Death of Edgar Allan Poe" with Dr. Carole Shaffer-Koros

As part of The Westfield Historical Society's First Wednesday Luncheon series, Dr. Carole Shaffer-Koros will talk about the many theories surrounding the Mysterious Death of Edgar Allan Poe for October 2, 2019. The event will begin with check-in at 11:45 a.m. at the Echo Lake Country Club, located at 515 Springfield Avenue, Westfield.

Edgar Allan Poe is well known today for his Gothic horror stories as well as his poem "The Raven." Born to popular stage actors in Boston on January 19, 1809, Poe experienced a life of tragedy from his earliest days. His father David Poe deserted the family before the birth of Edgar's sister Rosalie. At the age of three, he lost his mother Elizabeth to tuberculosis, a disease that later killed his brother Henry. Edgar was taken in by the Richmond businessman John Allan, with whom he had a continuing fraught relationship, receiving no inheritance on the death of his foster father. Although he had a large literary output during his lifetime, Poe struggled with poverty trying to support his ailing wife Virginia, who died of tuberculosis at the young age of 24. Desperately seeking female companionship, Poe travelled to Richmond in the fall of 1849 to propose marriage to an old friend. On his return to New York, Poe somehow landed in Baltimore, and on election day he was found on the street disoriented and in a stranger's clothing. Feverish and incoherent, he was taken to Washington College Hospital where he died on October 7, 1849. No diagnosis was made, and scholars have theorized endlessly about the cause of Poe's death. Dr. Shaffer-Koros will discuss some of those possible causes.

Dr. Carole Shaffer-Koros is Professor Emerita of English/History and Founding Dean of the School of Visual & Performing Arts at Kean

University. During her 42 years of teaching at Kean, she taught a great variety of courses including World Literature, Asian Literature, Women's History, Spanish and American Literature. She holds a BA in Spanish and Latin American Studies from Douglass College (Rutgers University), and an MA and PhD in Spanish Language and Literature from the University of Pennsylvania. She has published a text on World Literature and scholarly articles on Gwendolyn Brooks, Edith Wharton and Edgar Allan Poe. She has served for 13 years as Treasurer of the Poe Studies Association and is a member of the Editorial Board of The Edgar Allan Poe Review. She is also Treasurer of the Genealogical Society of the West Fields, a Trustee of the Westfield Historical Society and Program Co-Chair.

The Extended School Year Program in the Westfield Public School District focuses on maintaining and strengthening academic skills through the summer to prepare students for the

new school year. In its 17th year, the five-week, rotation schedule of core academic classes. state-mandated ESY program assists students in preschool through high school who have been identified as those who would benefit from additional instruction and related services during the summer.

Instructional specialists in reading, behavior/social skills, speech, occupational and physical therapy join special education teachers, paraprofessionals and a registered nurse in administering the program. Many of the ESY staff are longtime educators and aides with Westfield Public Schools.

"The ESY program prevents significant regression for students who require direct, intensive instruction throughout the summer," says Andrea Lo, supervisor of special services for preschool to 12th grade. "I applaud the creativity of our staff who provide academic instruction which is engaging and exciting for their students."

Approximately 32 students in grades 6-12 attend the ESY program at Westfield High School, each with a morning homeroom and a

Students at the high school program also receive OT, PT, speech, behavioral services and reading instruction through the Wilson Reading System.

Enrolled in the preschool through fifth grade ESY program at Wilson Elementary School are about 130 students who also receive instruction in reading, writing, and mathematics, along with related services, while learning about conflict resolution through an engaging course called Peaceful Playground.

"I am so fortunate to have the opportunity to supervise the ESY program this year. I love seeing how much students have grown over the years and reconnecting with the parents of my previous students," says TranLe Hill, a Learning Disabilities Teacher Consultant (LDTC) at Lincoln. "ESY is the perfect blend of providing students with the opportunity to maintain the academic skills they learned during the school year and strengthening their social emotional skills within a structured and safe environment." The ESY program in Westfield Public Schools

runs from July 1 through August 6.

PROBLEM-BASED LEARNING AT STEM CAMP IN WESTFIELD

There were drones in the hallway and robots in the classroom, marshmallow toasting in handmade solar ovens and painstaking stop motion animation, as the Westfield Public School District's STEM Camp concluded a 7th successful summer session on Friday, July 26.

Begun in 2013 with 6 workshops and 150 campers, STEM Camp now offers 15 workshops for more than 400 students in grades 3-8. Course offerings during the three week camp include beginning and advanced robotics, film scoring, cryptology, mechanical engineering, laser engraving, stop motion animation, computeraided design/3-D printing, and much more.

"I feel the growing popularity of the camp has been due to, not only the fact that we have amazing instructors, but that the kids and parents of Westfield see the value behind handson, problem-based learning," says camp director Sean Bonasera, who teaches industrial technology at Edison. "Parents recognize how this type of learning engages and strengthens the mind at a different level than traditional learning while also exposing their children to skills, resources, and technology that they will one day utilize in a future career."

STEM Camp was launched in 2013 after a STEM committee - which included Bonasera and Edison computer technology teacher Laura Paiva, along with other district technology

education teachers and district administrators designed a program of activities to promote awareness of careers that integrate the disciplines of science, technology, engineering and math.

"Our goal is to appeal to all types of interests, so we offer over 10 always-changing workshops for students to choose from. Each offers an insight into a real-world skill or career, but they are also engaging and fun for their particular age group," says Paiva. "Instructors hope to create a spark that will encourage our campers to continue to be thoughtful and creative. It's great when we see return campers who remember what they learned last year, and apply it to what they are doing this year."

Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum, Instruction, and Programs Paul Pineiro says campers learn by trial and error while directing their own activities.

"They feel free to fail which is an important part of the learning process," Pineiro says.

Pineiro and Bonasera meet each summer at the end of the camp to review the feedback from teachers and families to help determine what courses to offer the following year.

"Visiting STEM Camp is a highlight of my summer," adds Superintendent Dr. Margaret Dolan. "I love seeing our students working collaboratively and creatively to approach a challenge."
