

LIBRARY FRIENDS KNITTING UP COMFORT FOR LOCAL FOSTER YOUTH

Submitted by Gretchen Boger-O'Bryan As cooler temps begin to shoo the summer swelter, members of the Sharing the Warmth Group of The Friends of Westfield Memorial Library are helping ensure Union County's foster youth are ready for Mother Nature. The group's recent handmade and heartfelt donation of more than 30 knit and crochet afghans to the nonprofit Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Union County promises not just physical comfort to these fragile foster youth, but emotional warmth too. (After all, it's what's on the inside that counts.)

There are 500 Union County children, teens and young adults living in foster care through no fault of their own, and CASA of Union County's volunteer advocates serve approximately twothirds of those youth. Advocates have court-ordered access to a child and all parties in their life, then report findings to the judge in order to ensure best interests remain a priority, needs are met, and the youth's trauma is not exacerbated while in care.

Upon seeing the panoply of colorful afghans, Executive Director Marla Higginbotham said, "Knowing such bright and happy works of art will go to and comfort children who have endured so much brings a smile to my face, as do the wonderfully talented members of Sharing the Warmth. Thank you all for investing your time and entrusting your handiwork to CASA of Union County and the children depending on it. You have, indeed, shared the warmth."

Diane Weinberg, knitting group chairwoman, explained, "Sharing the Warmth is a group of volunteers who meet twice monthly at the Westfield Memorial Library to knit or crochet four-by-five foot afghans. In recent years, we've collected about 100 afghans from our hardworking volunteers. We are so pleased to have begun our ninth year of Sharing the Warmth!" Other recipients include a Pennsylvania camp for children impacted by cancer, the library's Books on Wheels program, and Center for Hope Hospice.



If you live in any one of the 21 Union County municipalities and need to apply for a U.S. Passport, chances are there is a Post Office within an easy 5-10 minute commute that can accept your application. Twelve Post Offices throughout Union County offer convenient passport application service on behalf of the United States Department of State.

The Union County Post Offices that offer passport application service include: Berkeley Heights, Cranford, Elizabeth Main Post Office, Fanwood, Garwood, Linden Main Post Office, Netherwood Station in Plainfield, Scotch Plains, Springfield, Summit, Union Main Post Office, and Westfield.

Although some Union County Post Offices like Garwood, Netherwood Station, and Scotch Plains accept walk-ins, many Post Offices offering passport services require an appointment. For appointments during regular passport processing hours, the U.S. Postal Service has made scheduling easier with the USPS Retail Customer Appointment Scheduler tool (RCAS) at usps.com/scheduler.

The RCAS tool will display available appointment times for participating Post Office

locations that offer passport appointment services within the selected radius. Users will receive notifications of their scheduled appointment via email or text.

Application forms and information on the costs and how to apply for a passport can be found at usps.com/passport.

The U.S. Department of State's National Passport Information Center is available to answer passport questions by phone or email in English or Spanish. If you have a question about passports you can call toll-free 1-877-487-2778 or email NPIC@state.gov.

Westfield Historical Society's November First Wednesday Luncheon with Gary Lee Mahmoud

As part of The Westfield Historical Society's First Wednesday Luncheon series, Actor and Westfield Native, Gary Lee Mahmoud, will talk about the story of "The Statue of Liberty – Meant for Egypt, Ends in America" on November 6, 2019. The event will begin with check-in at 11:45 a.m. at the Echo Lake Country Club, located at 515 Springfield Avenue, Westfield.

During the eighteenth and the nineteenth century, the United States hadn't attained her power and the world leadership that she currently enjoys. So when the Suez Canal was constructed during the period from 1859 to 1869, it was the most important world event of the time. A thirtysix year old French artist and sculptor, named Fredrick Auguste Bartholdi, offered to build a colossus statue at the northern entrance of the canal with a torch in its hand. Gary Lee Mahmoud, along with commentary from his father, Sam Mahmoud, will discuss how and why the Statue was given to America, instead.

Gary Lee Mahmoud is a native of Westfield (WHS class of '96). He graduated from American University in 2000 with a BA in Political Science and a minor in history before going to work as a Legislative Assistant for former U.S. Congressman John Boehner. In 2007, he moved to New York to pursue a career in the entertainment business and has since had the pleasure of performing in notable TV shows including Blue Bloods, Law & Order: SVU, and Jessica Jones along with movies such as The Bourne Legacy and the Oscar nominated Paul Schrader film "First Reformed" where he played Ethan Hawke's doctor. Gary has also appeared in various online comedy shorts for The Onion, College Humor, and Above Average and a variety of commercials including the famous Eli Manning/Odell Beckham "Dirty Dancing" Super Bowl commercial. When not performing on stage or screen, Gary writes and produces sketch comedy videos for his YouTube channel Cringe Factory including viral hits that have been shared in Time Magazine and ABC's Good Morning America.

AT-RISK YOUTH HEAR STORY OF PERSONAL PERSEVERANCE

One evening El-Amin Jumuah mapped out his strategy for building his fledgling fashion business, including financing it with the salary from his job. The next day he was laid off.

Four years later, Jumuah's business, Passionate Rebel, is thriving and has been featured on News 12 New Jersey's Spotlight Edition and various New York Fashion Week media platforms.

Jumuah served as the keynote speaker at the 2019 Annual Youth Conference hosted by Community Access Unlimited (CAU) that drew more than 100 at-risk youth from more than a dozen youth services programs from throughout the state. CAU is a Union County-based, statewide nonprofit that strives to integrate people with disabilities and at-risk youth into the general community through comprehensive supports.

"The conference is designed to bring together youth from a number of programs, allow them to network and provide them with information and resources, thereby empowering them," said Carla Hollinger, a curriculum specialist at CAU. "It's a day of fun and education."

Jumuah's apparel is intended to create selfdirected leaders who, with their independent passion, will enhance their creative skills and rebel against not following their passion, according to the Passionate Rebel website.

"Be a passionate rebel," he told the youth. "Be someone who is dedicated to following your goals regardless of the obstacles. Be a dreamer. Understand dreams take you far but they depend on the time and effort you put into them."

Jumuah said to be successful they first must define their own success. For example, a single mother might define success as caring for her children while a college student might define success as working his way through college and graduating. Success is not defined by money and material belongings, he said.

"You have to go out and learn for yourself," he said. "And there's no shame in struggling. That's the way you get to where you want to be."

Jumuah's message resonated with the youth in attendance, including Romance Morrison, 21, a CAU member.

"He really got through to me about how he started his own business out of nothing," Morrison said, adding that he has set his goals for success as going to college, getting a good job and starting a family.

"I already achieved the first part of my goal," he said. "I'm starting college in September."

Casandra Jeffers, 22, also a CAU member, said Jumuah's message of overcoming struggles helped her. She lost her family, lost her job and lived in many places before coming to CAU.

"My goal is to get into the art of make-up," she said. "I practice every day and post videos on YouTube. But it's hard to stay motivated. So his message about not getting down when you are struggling resonated with me."

The conference also featured a number of

workshops designed to help the attendees better manage their lives and improve their life skills, according to Hollinger. Examples included goal setting, healthy relationships and living within the system.

"The workshops are intended to prepare them for life going forward," she said.



THE ARC CELEBRATES 70 YEARS AND COUNTING

A leading provider of services for people with disabilities commemorates milestone year with a landmark event this October.

The Arc of Union County was founded in 1949 when a group of concerned parents of children with intellectual and developmental disabilities gathered by the collective desire for their children to lead fulfilling lives and thrive in their communities, instead of being subject to institutions with harsh living conditions. Seven decades ago, there was much to learn about intellectual and developmental disabilities (then referred to as 'mental retardation'), the people, their families and the causes. There were virtually no programs or services to assist people with disabilities in the community or to support their families. It was a common occurrence for doctors to tell parents that the best place for their child was in an institution. This group of parents was granted a temporary charter by the "New Jersey Parents' Group for Retarded Children", and what is now known as The Arc of Union County was designated the Union County Unit of that Organization. Seventy years later, The Arc has become a local pioneer within Union County and its surrounding areas.

To commemorate this major milestone, The Arc of Union County will hold their landmark event, "Celebrating 70 Years: Autumn & The Arc," on October 3, 2019 from 6 - 9 p.m. at the Stage House Tavern located at 1099 Route 22, Mountainside, NJ. The event will feature three hours of unlimited food, wine and beer, live music, and high value raffle items, including a cruise to Bermuda. Over 100 community partners and supporters are anticipated to join The Arc in their celebration of 70 years of service. All proceeds of this event will benefit the continuation of programs and services provided by The Arc. "Our 70th Anniversary has been a record-setting year for the agency," said Frank Caragher, Executive Director of The Arc of Union County. "We have a proud history of changing with the times. SUPERINTENDENT WELCOMES STAFF TO 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR

Superintendent Dr. Margaret Dolan welcomed back staff on Tuesday, September 3 as the Westfield Public School District prepared for the return of more than 6,200 students on Thursday, September 5, 2019.

During the opening day ceremony, Dolan welcomed 26 new staff members, acknowledged 3 new administrators – Westfield High School principal Mary Asfendis, Roosevelt Intermediate School principal Brian Gechtman, and Roosevelt assistant principal Keith Brunson – and applauded the more than 900 staff members gathered in the Westfield High School auditorium.

"As I sat down to draft my remarks for today, I couldn't help but think about the past year. And, as I reflected on what was inarguably a challenging number of months, I was reminded of what gets our district through times that concern us or frighten us or even make us cry," Dolan told the staff. "It is all of you. It is your steadfastness, your resilience, your professionalism, your heart, and your willingness to work together for what is best for our students."

Dolan outlined new security procedures in place for the 2019-2020 school year and

expressed appreciation for "our strong, cooperative relationship with the Westfield Police Department which will continue to provide a daily presence in our schools." She also reiterated the district's continuing commitment to Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) and its five competencies: selfawareness, self-management, social awareness, responsible decision-making, and relationship skills.

"It's not just a phase. It's an ongoing commitment by our district to make sure that, along with the wonderful education our students receive, their social and emotional well-being is looked after as well," said Dolan.

Westfield Education Association president Gail Alston, Board of Education president Peggy Oster and other board members were on hand to welcome the staff. Alston praised the hard work and dedication of the educators, while Oster recalled the first day of school as a student herself and later, a mother of five who attended Westfield schools.

"There is something about the month of September that makes us all excited for change," said Oster. "Being in the district for 25 years, I have seen the education system in Westfield adapt to our students facing an everchanging society. The majority of these changes come from our teachers and staff, who continue to grow and develop as educators to be the best that they can be for our students and community and I'd like to thank all of you for that."

Teachers and paraprofessionals gathered again on Wednesday, September 4 for a full day of professional learning organized by Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum, Instruction and Programs Paul Pineiro and facilitated by district administrators and a few other professionals. There were sessions and workshops focusing on SEL, the new Standards-Based Report Card, digital citizenship, mental health and behavioral issues, financial literacy, technology, and other topics.

On August 27 and 28, the 26 new staff members attended a two-day, in-house orientation as part of the New Staff Institute (NSI). The NSI is a two-year program designed to support first-time educators and those who are new to the district. The comprehensive program is organized by Human Resources Specialist Barbara Ball and her staff, along with a leadership team comprised of seasoned Westfield educators.
