2020 NATIONAL MERIT SEMIFINALISTS AND COMMENDED STUDENTS

Four Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) students have been named to the 2020 National Merit Semifinalist List, and another 26 WHRHS students have been named to the 2020 National Merit Commended List.

This year's WHRHS National Merit Semifinalists are: Phillip Ding, Dave Ki, Jessica Young and Vivian Zhang.

This year's WHRHS students named to the Commended List, which is the category immediately following Semifinalist, are: Laura Baeyens, Jagdeep Bhatia, Catherine Cai, Nyna Chacko, Tina Chen, Tamara Hadzic, Jenna Hansen, Nicole Harris, Roopa Irakam, Niharika Iyer, Apurva Joshi, Stephanie Ju, Abigail Kotar, Sana Mamtaney, Aaron Marmolejos, Manthan Naik, James Narayanan, Annabell Pu, Julia Rubin, Cristina Sarrico, Julia M. Schink, Mayur Sharma, Katie Tan, Sarah Young, Maya Zhang, and Kevin Zu.

The designations are based on scores by these students on the Reading Test, Writing and Language Test, and Mathematics Test for the 2018 PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test)/NMSQT (National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) last Fall.

This year's four National Merit Semifinalists means that as many as 52 WHRHS students have qualified as National Merit Semifinalists during the most recent six years.

The year-to-year totals have been:

- Class of 2015 11; Class of 2016 6;
- Class of 2017 –10; Class of 2018 15;
- Class of 2019 6; and Class of 2020 4.

The National Merit Scholarship Program reports that the Finalists will be named later in the year. A percentage of Finalists are expected to compete for National Merit Scholarships, according to the scholarship program. Taken into account for those scholarship selections will be a variety of factors, including the student's subsequent SAT scores that confirm the score in the PSAT/NMSQT, an essay, as well as an endorsement and recommendation from the student's high school, demonstrations of leadership and participation in school and community activities.

One of the most challenging aspects of running a small non-profit is having a place to meet. A good meeting room provides an atmosphere that facilitates effective and decisive meetings.

There's nothing wrong with a friend's living room or a library conference room. Starbucks and Panera Bread seem not to mind meetings. However these options aren't always reliable because of their "first-come, first-serve" nature and certainly can become challenging when the number of members grows.

The Watchung Hills Elks have 6.5 acres of property that include a lodge meeting hall, bandstand, picnic ground and pavilion. These are all available for rent by the public — birthday parties, retirement celebrations, weddings, concerts, movie-nights, etc.

But for non-profits in and near Warren Township, NJ, they can be rented at no charge. (Additionally if you're an Elk, you gain access to our bar/lounge and large, private swimming pool.)

Areas are available at no-charge, Mondays through Thursdays for non-profits and available Fridays through Sundays for a suitable donation. There is seating for about 80 at the round tables in the "banquet style" and seating for about 100 in the "theater style." 8 foot pull-down projection screen (bring your own projector) is available. Other attributes include high-speed internet, good overhead lighting, and ample parking.

STUDENTS CHEER, 'WARRIORS PRIDE' AT WHRHS FALL PEP RALLY

Seniors wearing white shirts, Juniors wearing blue, Sophomores wearing red and Freshmen wearing green gathered in the stands of Tozier Stadium on Friday afternoon, September 13, 2019, at the annual Fall Pep Rally to cheer for the Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) Fall athletic teams.

Later that night, under the lights at the same Tozier Stadium, the football team won its second victory of the season, defeating Plainfield High School, 35-12.

Warrior Head Football Coach Rich Seubert, who was named The Lou Rettino High School Coach of the Week for Week 2 of the 2019 season by the New York Giants and Gatorade, and who played for 10 years for the New York Giants, including in the Giants' win in the 2007 Super Bowl, came out just before the Warrior football team charged onto the field at the Pep Rally, to lead "call-and-response" cheers.

Leading up to the football team's appearance at the Fall Pep Rally, a variety of the other teams, representing the numerous athletic teams, entertained the students in the stands. Among those making appearances at the Pep Rally were: Boys Cross Country and Girls Cross Country teams, whose runners circled the stadium together, running a lap on the track; The Boys Soccer and Girls Soccer teams, whose players demonstrated various passing, kicking and ball control skills; Field Hockey, whose team members demonstrated their pinpoint passing and stick handling abilities; Ultimate Frisbee, whose never-stop-running boys and girls players covered the entire field, and some of the sidelines, sometimes right up to the stands, with deft Frisbee passing and spectacular catching; Tennis, whose players seized the opportunity to execute scores of soft lobs, sending tennis balls to the four corners of the stands, and to the many outstretched hands in-between, all to the delight of the students; and Gymnastics, whose competitors demonstrated their sport's array of athletic skills like cartwheels, somersaults, spins and gravity-defying leaps.

Also represented on the field were the various elements of the Music Department's WHRHS Marching Warriors and Flag Squad. To open the Pep Rally, the Marching Band performed one of its signature pieces that audiences had heard and will hear as part of halftime performances at the 2019-2020 Warrior Football Games. The Warrior Marching Band is under the direction of Instrumental Music Teacher Paul McCullen, with assistance by Music Tech Lab Music Teacher Christopher Wyatt. Likewise, the WHRHS Cheerleaders demonstrated their various dances, formations, lifts, trust falls and cheers that are ever-present at so many WHRHS athletic and school-spirit events.

NJ PHOTO FORUM: A 25 YEAR RETROSPECTIVE EXHIBIT AT ARTS CENTER

The New Jersey Photography Forum (NJPF) continues the celebration of its 25h anniversary with a retrospective exhibit at the Watchung Arts Center at 18 Stirling Road on the Watchung Circle in Watchung, NJ from November 1 through November 30, 2019, with a gala opening reception on November 3 from 1-5 p.m. The Center galleries are open Tuesday through Friday from noon - 5 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m.

The exhibit contains two floors of outstanding photographs representing the past 25 years of fine art photography. Upstairs in the Heinz W. Otto Gallery, the NJPF will be showing almost 50 pieces by 37 artists who live throughout New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Some have been part of the group since its inception with the balance being very active exhibitors for many years. The works range from film and alternative processes to digital imagery. The Lower Gallery will feature photographs that have won some top prizes in the Forum's annual juried photography exhibits held at the Watchung Arts Center over the past 25 years. Most works are for sale with a portion of the proceeds going to the arts center.

Nancy Ori, the founder and Director of the New Jersey Photography Forum says: "The Watchung Art Center is a wonderful showplace for this retrospective exhibit tracing the history and dramatic changes that have happened in photographic art over the past 25 years, a period which corresponds to the founding and growth of the NJ Photography Forum. It also demonstrates the commitment that the NJPF and the arts center have to each other."

The New Jersey Photography Forum is dedicated to furthering the interests of professional and serious photographers living or working in the New Jersey area. Under Ori's direction, the NJPF has become the largest and

most recognized group of fine art exhibiting photographers in the state. The monthly meetings are held at the Visual Arts Center of New Jersey in Summit and encourage attendees to share expertise and advance their skills. The meetings provide access to a wide variety of current creative and technical information. Attendees have an opportunity to share their work for critique by others. Exhibition possibilities within the fine art community are constantly explored, and the group produces about a dozen group exhibits each year at various venues. These exhibit opportunities have become an invaluable resource for photographers interested in becoming fine art exhibitors.

The Watchung Arts Center (WAC) thrives in historic Watchung in Somerset County, NJ. The nonprofit, volunteer-run Arts Center excels in cultivating an eclectic mix of professional and emerging artists in the performing and visual arts. Quality works in fine arts, exciting music, and comedy events are presented to enthusiastic audiences. Appreciation of painting, photography, and music from classical to folk to jazz to coffee house, comedy, theater, and mind/body arts is fostered through classes, workshops, and performances.
