CROP WALKERS EARN \$5,000 TO COMBAT HUNGER

Undaunted by the heavy rain, seventy-two walkers and volunteers conducted the 2019 New Providence Crop Walk on Sunday afternoon, October 20, 2019. Their exceptional effort has earned \$5,000 to fight hunger. Matching funds and other contributions are still arriving.

Since 1974, this annual three mile walk through town has been planned by Faith Lutheran Church and hosted by the United Methodist Church. The chairperson for the past four years has been Mike Warin of Faith Lutheran.

The walkers were from area churches. The three with the largest number of participants were the Sebit Presbyterian Church of Warren, Faith Lutheran of New Providence and the Asian Indian Christian Church of Berkeley Heights.

Prior to the walk, Mr. Warin conducted a brief orientation. He reminded the participants that many of the world's poor and hungry have to walk long distances for food and water and that hunger is a significant issue in the United States as well. The walkers were raising funds to help alleviate this international and national issue. Mr. Warin was followed by Bob Hasbrouck of New Providence, who explained the procedures and route of the walk. Mr. Hasbrouck has assisted with the Crop Walk since its beginning forty-five years ago.

Rev. Jane McCready of Faith read a bible scripture and conducted a responsive prayer with the group. John Everson and Courtney Auchter, accompanied by guitarist, Jim Skidmore, the three also of Faith, led the walkers in the singing of "We Are Marching in the Light of God."

In recognition of hunger being a problem throughout the world, one of the verses was sung in Swahili.

Aroused by "We Are Marching in the Light of God," the walkers then lifted their umbrellas, their red and white Crop Walk signs and marched down Springfield Avenue.

Upon completion, the walkers and volunteers enjoyed ice cream at the Methodist Church. The plentiful chocolate and vanilla ice cream was donated by Zita's Home Made Ice Cream, 1790 Springfield Avenue, New Providence.




SECOND CACHE IN TRASH OUT EVENT A SUCCESS

On Saturday, October 19, 2019, the second Warren Cache in Trash Out (CITO) event was held at Codington Nature Trail. CITO is an environmental initiative supported by the geocaching community. Geocaching is a real world, outdoor treasure hunting game in which you utilize a GPS-enabled device to find a geocache hidden at a specific location. Warren has geocaches hidden on different trails such as the Municipal Complex, Glenhurst, Dealaman, and East County Reserve. CITO Events have been happening twice per year since 2002.

Catherine Cooney, an avid geocacher in the area, organized the CITO event with the support of Warren Township Recreation. The event was again a success that included a group of about 40 volunteers including Geocachers, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and town residents who cleaned the trail by pruning overhead and trailside overgrowth, removing sticks and branches off the trail, picking up trash and repainting the trail blazes.

Volunteers received a CITO event T-shirt supplied by Warren Township. CorTex Products also donated Outdoor Skin Protection Kits that were given out to volunteers.

LOCALS JOIN HARVEST FESTIVAL

Every October, as the leaves on the trees begin to change colors, residents and volunteers from all over Somerset County begin to get excited about the Watchung Hills Regional Municipal Alliance (WHRMA) Great Pumpkin Certified 5K Run/Family Fun Walk.

This year, WHRMA, which serves Warren, Green Brook, Watchung and Long Hill Townships, decided to collaborate with the Watchung Twp Recreation Department's Harvest Festival. The event was held on October 19, 2019 at Watchung Twp's Mobus Field and it was a great success. More than 700 residents attended. It was a great opportunity to raise awareness to WHRMA mission and programs.

The WHRMA is a non profit grassroots community organization that receives funding from the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse through the Freeholders of Somerset and Morris Counties. WHRMA identifies community needs through surveys and key informant interviews local data received from local government and funds intervention programs that serve Warren, Green Brook, Watchung and Long Hill Townships. Outcomes from the Centers For Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance Report June 2018 states that "agencies and organizations including schools and youth friendly health care providers can help facilitate access to critically important education, health care and high impact evidence based intervention programs".

The WHRMA committee meetings are held at

Watchung Hills Regional High School on the 2nd Wednesday of each month at 7:30 p.m. except in July and August and all meetings are open to the public. The committee sponsors film screenings, author led book discussions, community events and panel dicussions on the topics of drug, alcohol, tobacco and vaping prevention in all the schools in the towns they serve as well as mental health first aid training and suicide prevention throughtout the year. According to The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Youth Risk Behavior Survey Data Summary and Trends Report 2007-2017 "Improving the health of adolescents and, subsequently, their health in adulthood will require our collective action at the family, school, and community levels". Parents of all school age children are strongly encouraged to get out and support WHRMA events on a regular basis.



ONE TINY HORSE BRINGS MANY BIG SMILES

The weather outside may have been cold, wet and dreary but inside Mt. Horeb Elementary School in Warren, NJ on October 22, 2019, the preschool students were sunny with warm smiles and full of joy and love for Michelangelo, the miniature horse from Hope's Promise Farm in Chester, NJ.

Mrs. Doris Zanchelli, school nurse, and the Mt. Horeb Parent Teacher Organization worked together to invite Maureen Coultas "Ms. Maureen", the Director of the Farm and an International Certified Therapeutic Riding Instructor, to come and introduce Michelangelo to the children.

Prior to the students participating in the presentation, Coultas gently brushed Michelangelo's hair and walked him around the room to acclimate him to the new environment. As if he wasn't cute enough he also wore tiny, black and white shoes purchased from Build a Bear to keep from slipping on the floor.

After the students entered the room and took a seat, Coultas introduced Michelangelo to the children. She explained that he was not a pony but a 6-year-old miniature horse and that one of his purposes was to help people feel better. Coultas asked that each student imagine a time when they were not feeling well, she then walked Michelangelo around the room. In some cases,

Michelangelo stopped to brush up against a student or placed his nose upon a student's forehead. No matter the interaction, Coultas highlighted the fact that each student was smiling.

Coultas went on to describe what Michelangelo's life is like on the farm and beyond. She showed the children a book that illustrated his life starting from the day he was born. Michelangelo enjoys traveling to establishments like schools, nursing homes, hospitals and group homes where children and adults can learn more about miniature horses. Mt. Horeb students learned that Michelangelo sleeps in a stall, eats hay, and that he likes to visit inside Coultas's home for breakfast!

Before the conclusion of the visit, each preschooler was invited to come up and pet Michelangelo. At first, some of the children were apprehensive but with each passing moment those fears began to subside and by the end, just about every child took the opportunity to get a closer look at the tiny horse.



"What does this one say again," Clarice asked, as she thought carefully about each one. And then she pointed at one word and said "I want this one" and looked up at the Vice Chairperson for emphasis and said "peace. I want peace". This very astute 5 year old student chose peace as her empowering word to paint on her balloon.
