WHRHS CLASS OF 2020 COLLEGE SIGNING DAY

Five student athletes in the Class of 2020 who play for the Warriors of Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) announced their intentions to matriculate and play intercollegiate sports at Division I colleges on November College Signing Day, Wednesday, November 13, 2019. As part of the same ceremony, two additional Warrior Student Athletes announced their intentions to matriculate and play intercollegiate sports at Division II colleges.

There are three College Signing Days throughout the high school academic year: November, February and May.

The students signing to matriculate and play at Division I colleges are: Chloe Ferreira, Monmouth University (Hawks), West Long Branch, Metro Atlantic Conference, Soccer; Laura Baeyens, University of Pennsylvania (Quakers), Philadelphia, Pa., Ivy League Conference, Cross Country/Track & Field; Bradley Jelmert, Arkansas State University (Red Wolves), Jonesboro, Ark., Sun Belt Conference, Track & Field; Mahogany Jenkins, University of Indiana (Hoosiers), Bloomington, Ind., Big Ten Conference, Track & Field; and Christopher Salkowski, Coastal Carolina University (Chanticleers), Conway, S.C., Sun Belt Conference, Track & Field.

The students signing to matriculate and play at Division II Colleges are: Kaitlyn Gully, Bentley University (Falcons), Waltham, Mass., Northeast10 Conference, Field Hockey; and Sophia Cicchetti, Adelphi University (Panthers), Garden City, N.Y., Northeast-10 Conference, Softball.

Both Bentley and Adelphi play in the Northeast-10 Conference, although the Warrior student athletes, Gully and Cicchetti, will play in different sports when they put on their new colleges' uniforms for Field Hockey and Softball, respectively.

And, among the Track and Field athletes, both Jelmart and Salkowski will play on Sun Belt Conference rivals, Arkansas State and Coastal Carolina, respectively, although they specialize in different Field events, Pole Vault and Javelin.

WATCHUNG HILLS SENIOR DEEPA IRAKAM EARNS GOLD AWARD

Deepa Irakam, a member of Girl Scout Troop 65512, recently earned the prestigious Gold Award.

Through her Gold Award, Empower Your Future, Deepa Irakam worked over 80 hours to address the issue of sexual harassment. She educated students, ages ranging from middle school to high school, as many of them have heard about sexual harassment but are still not quite sure what it is, and gave them an opportunity to learn more so that they understood what they can do to make sure it doesn't continue. In addition to working with students in group activities, teaching lessons, and creating discussions, she created a resource guide that included more information on sexual harassment and who to reach out to for help.

The resource guides were distributed to local community centers and schools as a way to spread awareness for sexual harassment education and empower students to speak out

when they see something that isn't right.

She also created a website with more information to help continue her education platform which includes a printable version of her resource guide. You can find her website deepairakam.wixsite.com/empoweryourfuture.

Through the #MeToo Movement and the Time's Up Movement, it's clear that these platforms have started to create positive change to prevent sexual harassment from continuing. However, there is still work to be done. Deepa's project aims to educate students early on about sexual harassment affecting schools, communities, and the workplace, because education is what starts conversations and can serve as a force for meaningful change.

BANJO VIRTUOSO TONY TRISCHKA AT THE WATCHUNG ART CENTER

Tony Trischka, the man who made the banjo bigger, jazzier and more worldly! Some musicians open up whole new realms. In the world of the banjo, the music that marked the change came from Tony. Up out of bluegrass and country and then all over. To roots in Africa. To heights of jazz. Banjo, unbound. Trischka set it free. Embracing all manner of possibilities, while keeping one foot firmly planted in the traditional bluegrass roots that first inspired him to make music. The performance will be on Saturday, January 18, 2020, at 8 p.m. and is followed by a

Trischka.

Now 70, Tony Trischka has over the past halfcentury garnered a reputation as one of the most influential figures in roots music. "[I]n fiddleand fret-conscious circles from Nashville to Groton, Mass.," the New York Times wrote in 2006, "[Trischka] is known as the father of modern bluegrass." As a banjoist he set new standards for genre-bending virtuosity, inspiring legions of younger players, among them Béla Fleck. Through his tireless efforts as an educator and such divergent projects as his collaborations with his friend and fellow banjoist Steve Martin, he's helped to elevate and transform his chosen instrument's profile within American culture. His forthcoming album, This Favored Land, is a visionary exploration of Civil War history featuring an all-star cast.

Born in 1949 in Syracuse and raised in a home filled with music, he fell in love with the banjo through the Kingston Trio's 1963 recording of "M.T.A." Trischka moved to New York City in the early '70s and released his landmark solo debut, Bluegrass Light, on the Rounder label in 1974, synthesizing everything from bluegrass and country to psychedelic pop, modal and free jazz and fusion. Many other milestone albums followed, including 1983's A Robot Plane Flies Over Arkansas, which refined the eclecticism of Bluegrass Light; and 1993's World Turning, a global history of the banjo that ignited Marc Fields' comprehensive 2011 documentary, Give Me the Banjo, which Steve Martin narrated and

The Watchung Arts Center proudly presents dessert reception and an opportunity to meet Mr. for which Trischka acted as musical director and co-producer.

> Trischka's Grammy-nominated album Double Banjo Bluegrass Spectacular, released in 2007, and Great Big World, from 2014, feature Martin within a mix of veterans and up-and-coming luminaries. He produced Martin's Grammynominated Rounder album from 2011, Rare Bird Alert, which touts performances by the Steep Canyon Rangers, Paul McCartney and the Dixie Chicks. Through his theme song for Books on the Air and performances on A Prairie Home Companion, Mountain Stage, From Our Front Porch and other programs, Trischka has been a frequent presence on NPR. In addition to his Grammy nominations, he's earned a number of honors, including the International Bluegrass Music Award for Banjo Player of the Year, 2007. In 2012 he was named a United States Artists Friends Fellow.



FALLEN OFFICERS HONORED AT VETERANS MEMORIAL PLAZA

Twelve Somerset County officers were recently honored at the new Law Enforcement Memorial at the Veterans Memorial Plaza located on Grove Street.

Gathered at the ceremony were Somerset County Sheriff Frank J. Provenzano, Sen. Christopher Bateman, New Jersey Attorney General Gurbir Singh Grewal, Somerset County Prosecutor Michael Robertson and New Jersey State Police Colonel Patrick Callahan.

The engraved names of the fallen heroes are forever etched in black marble. Sheriff

Provenzano read the name of each officer in the presence of their families, local law enforcement agencies, Sheriff's office staff and members of the community. A rose was placed at the memorial for each fallen officer by family members, police officers and other dignitaries.

Thirteen-year-old Jake Whitenight, son of Correction Officer Paul Whitenight, sang the National Anthem and the Rev. John Rozembajgier of Mary Mother of God Church in Hillsborough, offered the invocation and benediction.

Other participants included the Somerset County Pipes and Drums, Sheriff's Office Honor Guard, Bridgewater Police Department Honor Guard, New Jersey State Police riderless horse, New Jersey State Police aircraft flypast, and taps performed by Nate Kimmick of Somerville High School.







WATCHUNG HILLS JUNIOR RANKS 9TH IN OLYMPICS ARCHERY TRIALS

In September, Watchung Hills Regional High School junior Valerie Wang shot at a tournament in College Station, Texas and took one large step towards her goal: to represent the United States of America in Tokyo as a Recurve Archer.

Her journey started four years ago at a local archery range, where she trained casually year-round and enjoyed modest success. She struggled heavily in 2018, though, and found herself losing confidence in her abilities. The Wang family looked for a solution. Similar to the way golfers and tennis players have a coach to help develop their swing or stroke, archers have a coach to develop their shot and to overcome the intense mental battles inherent in the sport. Wang transitioned coaches and began training under Zach Garrett, a silver medalist at the Rio 2016 Olympics. Though the range she trains at is an hour away, she still finds the time to commute

and practice there nearly every day.

This change and the hard work that ensued helped her trajectory take off. In May 2019, Wang won the Gator Cup in Newberry, FL, her first major victory at an outdoor tournament, where cadets, who are archers between the ages of 14 to 17, shoot at a 122cm target from 60 meters away. That weekend, 78 out of her 138 arrows were good enough to find the center of the target - the equivalent of hitting a volleyball positioned three-quarters of a football field away. In the one-on-one tournament-style elimination matches, she defeated five opponents, winning 32 set points and losing only 13, on her way to the top of the podium. She had her goal of making the United States Female Cadet Archery Team, a recognition given to the top five female cadet archers, solidly in her sights.

Later, in August 2019, she shot her first tournament in Ohio as a Senior, the archery term for archers over 21 years old. Now shooting at a target 70 meters away and facing both strong winds and higher level competitors, Wang finished in 13th place nationally. This put her in the running to make the Olympic Shadow Squad, which takes the top 16 athletes at the conclusion of the Olympic Trial Stage 2. At this point she had a difficult decision to make: maintain her Top 16 ranking for the Senior Olympic Trials or to defend her spot on the Cadet USAT.

When asked about her decision process, Wang said: "This choice was very difficult for me and took nearly a full month of intense deliberation before I could finally decide." If she chose to continue to compete in the Trials, she was likely


to lose her position on the Cadet USAT to one of the many girls vying for the spot she held. On the other hand, if she chose to forgo the trials, she would be giving up this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. Recognizing that dreams don't become reality without sacrifices, Wang decided to compete in the Olympic Trials in the adult division.

Her decision was very much worth the risk; she was officially knocked out of contention to make the Cadet USAT but qualified for the Top 16 Women in the Trials. Currently, she is ranked 9th out of all competitors, which include a five-time Olympian (Bronze in 1992), athletes training full time at the Olympic Training Center ("OTC"), collegiate athletes, as well as four other high school student-athletes just like herself. Her goal is to qualify for one of the top three spots in order to make the Olympic Team. "I know that it will be extremely difficult for me, but I still want to put as much effort as I can into making the team," Wang remarked.

The third stage of the Olympic Trials will be held in Chula Vista, California on April 8-11, 2020. She will need to advance at least one rank in order to join the top 8 athletes who will advance to the fourth and final stage in May 2020, where the Olympic team will be selected.

She recognizes that many of her competitors are training full time at the OTC and will thus pursue more intensive training throughout 2020 in order to challenge them. "I want to serve as a role model for other young athletes across the country, even WHRHS, who wish to pursue their Olympic dreams."


