NEW CHATHAM TRADITION IS BORN ON NEW YEAR'S DAY

On New Year's Day, 130 residents started a new tradition in Chatham with a "First Day Walk" for Open Space. The walk raised over \$1,300 for local youth projects aimed at stewarding our open spaces, such as tree planting and trail work. BSA Troop 280 sponsored the walk and plans to host a second annual walk on January 1, 2021.

"It was a lot of fun for the Scouts and all the people who came," said Azniv Basralian, Chatham eighth grader and Senior Patrol Leader of the Troop. "It's great that we can give people in our area the money they need to do helpful work in the community."

Adults and kids paid \$10 to participate and received a handsome pin. Each year of the walk, the pin will feature the New Year and a new design. Many dogs joined their owners in the walk.

Residents from Chatham and Madison met at Loantaka Brook Park on Loantaka Way, where there is a spacious parking lot for entering the path. They then walked 2.6 miles into the park, crossed Woodland Ave, and looped around Giralda Farms Preserve. Scouts rang a chorus of bells at the start and finish of the walk.

CHATHAM TURKEY TROT RAISES MONEY FOR FIRST RESPONDERS

On Thanksgiving morning, 2019, the 11th annual Chatham Turkey Trot was held and was the most successful yet, attracting over 1,000 participants. Chatham Turkey Trot is a non-profit organization that holds a 1 mile family fun run and a USA Track & Field certified 5K race through the scenic highlands of Chatham Township on Thanksgiving Day, with proceeds

benefiting local first responder organizations (Chatham Township Volunteer Fire Department and Chatham Emergency Squad) as well as the Diabetes Research Institute and the Barton Center for Diabetes Education.

Thanks to the success of the event, Chatham Turkey Trot President Curt Ritter presented \$1,000 to the Chatham Emergency Squad and \$10,000 to the Chatham Township Volunteer Fire Department.

Curt Ritter said, "We are pleased to present a check for \$10,000 to the Chatham Township Volunteer Fire Department to support their purchase of a state-of-the art thermal imaging camera (TIC)." TICs are used on just about every call to identify hot spots within a home's walls, search for potential victims trapped in a building or occupants that have been ejected from a motor vehicle. Put simply, they are critical to fire operations.

Said Fire Chief Matthew Lemons, "thanks Curt Ritter and everyone who came out to support the Turkey Trot."

Evan Skinner, President of the Chatham Emergency Squad, stated, "For 11 years, the Chatham Turkey Trot has been a Thanksgiving tradition which brings our community together while simultaneously supporting the volunteer organizations in Chatham. We're truly 'thankful' for this contribution which helps our organization continue to support the Chatham community."

ABOUT THE CHATHAM EMERGENCY SQUAD

The Chatham Emergency Squad is an allvolunteer organization funded nearly exclusively by donations. In 2019 the Chatham Emergency Squad responded to 1,246 emergency calls in Chatham Township and Chatham Borough and provided mutual aid to neighboring communities of New Vernon, Madison and Summit on occasion. Chatham Emergency Squad never charges for its services. The Squad provides stand-by support for community events, such as the Chatham Turkey Trot, Fishawack, and school athletic events. The Squad also provided free CPR training to more than 400 residents, teachers, coaches, school crossing guards and emergency personnel, including fire and police. HISTORICAL SOCIETY PRESENTS JOHN & ABIGAIL ADAMS: A LOVE STORY

The Chatham Township Historical Society will present John and Abigail Adams: A Love Story on February 23 at 2 p.m. at the Chatham Township Municipal Building at 58 Meyersville Road. The public is welcome to attend this free program. No registration needed. Glenn LeBoeuf, who is best known for his in-character presentations on George Washington, will tell the Adams' story.

John and Abigail were married for 54 years and suffered frequent and long separation as John dedicated himself to birthing the nation. The couple exchanged many long letters to each other which have been preserved. The letters demonstrate their love and regard for each other. They also show how John sought for and seriously considered Abigail's counsel on many subjects relating to politics, finance, and domestic life. Although women were offered only home schooling, Abigail was as well-read as John and had a fine analytical mind. Abigail did not hesitate to advise her husband and the other men of the Continental Congress, pleading with them to, "remember the ladies, and be more generous and favorable to them than your ancestors. Do not put such unlimited power into the hands of the Husbands. Remember all Men would be tyrants if they could. If particular care and attention is not paid to the Ladies we are determined to foment a Rebellion, and will not hold ourselves bound by any Laws in which we have no voice, or Representation."

John served in the Continental Congress while it directed the Revolution, worked as a diplomat to several European countries, was elected the first Vice President and the second President of the United States. John was a lawyer and had a powerful sense of justice like his wife. Both strongly opposed slavery and predicted that it would be a threat to the democracy of the young nation.

John and Abigail adored each other and hated being apart. But both were dedicated to the establishment and success of the United States, so they lived long periods by letter. Their story is a great love story and story of our country's birth.
