ANDREA PAZMINO RECIEVES DIPLOMA AT TRINITAS SCHOOL OF NURSING 161ST CONVOCATION CEREMONY

One hundred and nine students received their nursing diplomas at the Trinitas School of Nursing 161st Convocation Ceremony held recently at St. Michael's Church in Cranford. Including Andrea E. Pazmino of North Plainfield.

Surrounded by family, friends, and staff that supported their efforts every step of the way, 99 women and 10 men proudly accepted their pins and became eligible to sit for the registered nurse licensing exam.

"The Trinitas School of Nursing is so proud of the 109 graduates- the first graduating class of the new decade, the Class of January 2020," said Dr. Rose Santee, Dean of the Trinitas School of Nursing, a collaborative nursing program with Union County College. "The graduates receive a diploma in nursing from Trinitas School of Nursing that will authorize them to sit for the RN licensing exam and Union County College awards the graduates with the Associate in Science degree. Their determination and hard work has paid off. It's exciting for the administration, faculty, staff members, and their families when our students graduate. We will miss them, but more, we are full of the satisfaction that we have guided yet another group of capable nurses who are now ready to join the nursing workforce."

Trinitas School of Nursing, operated jointly by Trinitas

Regional Medical Center and Union County College, currently holds full accreditation from the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN), and the New Jersey State Board of Nursing. The National League for Nursing has awarded the School of Nursing a third designation as a Center of Excellence in Nursing Education status for the years 2015 - 2020 for Creating Environments that Enhance Student Learning and Professional Development. The School also holds a 20-year, 40-class national licensing examination (NCLEX) passage rate of 86.30% on first writing.

suspicious individuals claiming to be from the IRS.

Thousands of people have lost millions of dollars and their personal information to tax scams. Scammers use the regular mail, telephone, or email to set up individuals, businesses, payroll, and tax professionals.

Scammers and cyberthieves continue to use



The IRS is urging the public to be aware of the IRS as bait. The most common tax scams are • Threaten legal action, such as a lawsuit. phone calls and emails from thieves who pretend to be from the IRS. Scammers use the IRS name, logo, fake employee names and badge numbers to try to steal money and identities from taxpayers.

> Taxpayers need to be wary of phone calls or automated messages from someone who claims to be from the IRS. Often, these criminals will say taxpayers owe money and demand payment right away. Other times, scammers will lie to taxpayers and say they're due a refund. The thieves ask for bank account information over the phone. The IRS warns taxpayers not to fall for these scams.

> Below are several tips that will help filers avoid becoming a scam victim.

IRS EMPLOYEES WILL NOT:

- Call demanding an immediate payment. The IRS won't call taxpayers if they owe taxes without first sending a bill in the mail.
- Demand payment without allowing taxpayers to question or appeal the amount owed.
- Demand that taxpayers pay their taxes in a specific way, such as with a prepaid debit card.
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Threaten to contact local police or similar agencies to arrest taxpayers for non-payment of taxes.

- If taxpayers don't owe or don't think they owe any tax, and they receive an inquiry like this, they should:
- Contact the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration. Use TIGTA's "IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting" web page to report the incident.
- Report the incident to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your report.

In most cases, an IRS phishing scam is an unsolicited, fake email that claims to come from the IRS. Some emails link to sham websites that look real. The scammers' goal is to lure victims to give up their personal and financial information. If the thieves get what they're after, they use it to steal a victim's money and identity.

For those taxpayers who get a phishing email, the IRS offers this advice:

- Don't reply to the message.
- Don't give out your personal or financial information.
- Forward the email to phishing@irs.gov. Then delete it.
- Don't open any attachments or click on any links. They may have malicious code that will infect your computer.

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LIBRARY SYSTEM INTRODUCES TRANSLATOR DEVICES TO CONNECT WITH CUSTOMERS

According to statistics from the U.S. Census Bureau, approximately 30.5 percent of Somerset County residents speak a language other than English at home. As a result, the Somerset County Library System of New Jersey (SCLSNJ) offers translation devices at all 10 Library branches to ensure that all customers are able to communicate with Library staff.

"We are excited by how well these inexpensive devices enable us to bridge the language divide," said Brian Auger, county Library administrator.

The Google minis can translate to and from 44 different languages including Spanish, Chinese, and Arabic. The U.S. Census survey shows that approximately 11 percent of residents in the County speak Spanish at home, while 9.5 percent speak a European based language, and 8.3 percent speak an Asian or

Pacific Island based language.

"We deployed these devices to serve as ondemand language translators in our communities," said Lauren Ryan, manager of branch services, strategic initiatives and special projects. "While we aim to have bilingual staff present in our branches, these devices can supplement communication when a bilingual staff member is not present. This initiative is in alignment with our Strategic Priority of addressing the needs of shifting demographics and our Core Service of providing technology access and expertise that meet the needs of the community."

In addition to these devices, the Library System offers hundreds of titles in Spanish; foreign language learning resources including Mango Languages and Rosetta Stone; and English Conversation classes in partnership with Literacy Volunteers of Somerset County.



While loss due to death will be the primary focus of this seminar, the concepts that will be presented are applicable to all types of loss. Imagine's Executive Director and Founder, Mary Robinson says, "The most important thing a grieving child needs is the active presence of at least one, preferably more, caring, healthy, and functional adults in their lives who understand that when a child has a loss they need support." SCLSNJ TO CONNECT LIBRARY CUSTOMERS TO INTERNET ON THE GO

According to a recent survey from the American Community Survey, conducted through the U.S. Census Bureau, approximately 7,500 Somerset County residents do not have access to the internet in their homes. In an effort to lessen the digital divide, the Somerset County Library System of New Jersey (SCLSNJ) will connect residents with internet access on the go by circulating free mobile hotspots for checkout across all 10 branches.

"When an individual needs access to resources, technology, and/or the internet, they often turn to their local library," said Cathy DeBerry, adult services supervisor. "This is because public libraries have long been trusted with the delivery of services designed to support the information literacy needs of the communities they serve. As librarians we understand the digital divide—the separation between individuals who have access to modern technology and those who do not—and they know it's far more complicated than having or not having the internet."

According to the Digital Divide Council, the digital divide affects education, society, and the economy. Offering mobile hotspots has a number of community benefits including: lessening the homework gap for children who don't have internet access at home; providing connectivity to financially disadvantaged patrons; providing access to health information for individuals with mobility issues and individuals living with

Mobile hotspots are small devices that allow internet access via Wi-Fi through cell phone towers. They enable users to connect their personal devices such as tablets and laptops to the internet.

"SCLSNJ is excited to offer Internet On the Go as a technology resource to our patrons," said Lauren Ryan, manager of branch services, strategic initiatives and special projects. "Circulating hotspots is in direct alignment with our Strategic Plan's Core Service of providing technology access and expertise that meet the needs of the community. We anticipate that hotspots will be popular with our patrons who lack internet service at home and to people who want to access Wi-Fi on the go."

HOME SAFETY REPAIR PROGRAM DESIGNED TO HELP PEOPLE IN-NEED

For many low-to-moderate income homeowners in Somerset and Hunterdon Counties, resolving critical home safety repairs is financially impossible. There are a significant number of residents who are living with water leaks and cold drafts due to failing roofs, doors and windows. Raritan Valley Habitat for Humanity (RVHFH) has developed a new Home Safety and Repair Program with these residents in mind. RVHFH is actively seeking qualified Somerset and Hunterdon County homeowners in need of home safety repairs to apply for this program.

This program focuses on helping local homeowners to continue to live independently, safely and comfortably in their homes. RVHFH's Home Safety and Repair Program serves low-tomoderate income homeowners of any age including veterans, people with disabilities and seniors. The program also assists non-profit organizations that offer permanent or temporary shelter.

Program projects have included: leaky roof repairs, weatherizing and increasing security of aging doors and windows, and home modifications and ramp installations for people with disabilities. One homeowner served by the program in Somerset says, "A volunteer installed a screen door and fixed the lock on my front door. Now my home is secure and water no longer comes in. I am so grateful and finally warm in my home."

Ramp installations are a crucial part of what RVHFH does for the safety of those in

income wheelchairs. A recent program recipient was a interdon local non-profit organization that needed a ramp built for the people they serve. The Executive Director there commented, "We truly appreciate the professional work of Raritan Valley Habitat for Humanity. They built a beautiful ramp to make our building accessible for all clients."

> Other program services help senior residents "age in place." Most seniors want to stay in their homes but many need to make costly repairs or improvements in order to do this. According to a family served by our program, "The Raritan Valley Habitat for Humanity team who came out to install grab bars for my mom were like angels sent from heaven."

> "We truly appreciate the support we've received for this important program from volunteers and donors in our community, particularly Provident Bank Foundation and NJM Insurance Group, and look forward to expanding our impact in helping more people to have a decent place to live in Somerset and Hunterdon Counties," says Jan Holmstrup, Executive Director of RVHFH.

What does it mean to have your own car? For longtime Community Access Unlimited (CAU) member Brian Shapiro, it means both stability and freedom. Before he had a car, Brian had to get a ride from a friend or take an Uber to his job driving a cab in Bloomfield.

"It's a lot easier," Brian said, thanks to the Volvo he received as a donation through Community Access Unlimited this fall. "I go to work and take my son places."

CAU started the vehicle donation program as a way to aid youth and individuals with disabilities who wished to complete their drivers test and gain the independence that comes with owning a vehicle. Now Brian can easily travel to the job he has had for nearly 20 years. Many have already benefited from the donation of reliable cars to get them where they need to go- from work and school to social functions.

"I've known about it for a while and it finally worked out," Brian said.

Unlike other car donation programs, CAU does not sell or scrap donated cars, receiving only a percentage of their value. By donating a vehicle to CAU, 100% of your donation will go to a person with transportation needs.

Need help preparing your taxes? The county Office of Volunteer Services and AARP have teamed up again this year to provide free taxcounseling assistance for residents who need help preparing their federal and New Jersey income tax returns. Appointments are required through April 15, 2020.

Tax-Aide is a volunteer program designed to help residents prepare their tax returns. The program is specifically open to seniors, residents with disabilities, and lower-income residents but is available to everybody. In 2019, almost 3,000 taxpayers used this free service in Somerset County.

About 65 tax-preparation volunteers provide direct support to residents at six sites within Somerset County including Montgomery, Martinsville, Manville, Bridgewater, Franklin and Green Brook. Tax returns are filed electronically, enabling taxpayers to obtain a more rapid refund if they are eligible. Volunteers also can assist with preparing Property Tax Reimbursement (PTR) forms for homeowners 65 years or older who meet certain eligibility requirements.

At your scheduled appointment, bring your W-2 forms, bank, broker and social security statements, medical and other expenses, a copy of your last year's returns, and any other relevant information. The tax counselor will review your tax documents, prepare this year's federal and New Jersey income tax returns, and file them electronically. It is a no-fuss, no- muss, free service.

If you are interested in making an appointment to consult with a tax counselor, call the Somerset County Office of Volunteer Services at 908-541-5710. The program runs through April 15, 2020 and is by appointment only.
