
UNION ANNOUNCES 2020 EULACE PEACOCK UNSUNG HERO AWARD RECIPIENT

It is with great pleasure that the Township of Union has announced Paul Hayes Sr., Vauxhall resident, as the 2020 Eulace Peacock Unsung Hero Award recipient. The Eulace Peacock Award recognizes those who humbly, diligently, and passionately seek change and progression within our community without looking for credit or recognition. Unsung Heroes inspire and impact others without regard to race, color, creed, religion, age, gender, disability, or national origin.

"Without a doubt, Mr. Hayes exemplifies the qualities of the Unsung Hero Award" noted Mayor Michele Delisfort, "I'm thrilled that every year we are able to recognize a remarkable person who devotes their time and compassion to help our youth and community."

Paul Robert Hayes Sr., married to Hattie Mae Prior Hayes for 62 years, is the father of three children, Paul R. Hayes Jr., Tione V. Hayes (deceased), and Shanna D. Hayes. Hayes attended Winston Salem State University from 1954 to 1958, where he majored in Social Studies and Elementary Education. In 1972, he later attended Newark State College in 1972 with a major in English and Winston Salem State University with a degree in Elementary Education followed by a degree in Industrial Counseling- Graduate Courses at Montclair State College in 1974. From 1958 to 1961, Mr. Hayes returned to New Jersey to work with Lewis Spicers Construction Company. In 1961 he became employed by the Essex County Youth House in Newark as a counselor for boys waiting to be scheduled to appear in the Essex County Juvenile Court. From 1962 to 1964, he was employed as a substitute teacher with the Township of Union Board of Education.

Since 2017, the Township of Union has annually awarded an individual with the Eulace Peacock Unsung Hero Award who has made a substantive yet unrecognized contribution to the Township of Union, be it through athletics, public service, mentorship or social activism.

Eulace Peacock was a 1933 graduate of Union High School and a member of the Union High School Athletic Hall of Fame inaugural class. He was one of the world's leading sprinters and long jumpers in the decade before World War II and is most known for being Jesse Owens's major rival.





Linda Barth will present "Alice Paul: Champion of Women's Suffrage," based on her new book of the same name at Connecticut Farms Presbyterian Church, 888 Stuyvesant Avenue, Union, on Sunday, March 8, at 2 p.m. The program will be hosted by the Union Township Historical Society to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment to the U. S. Constitution, which gave women the right to vote throughout the country. Coincidentally, March 8 is International Women's Day.

Ms. Barth will explain why it took so long for women's suffrage to be achieved in the U. S. and how that finally came about. She'll speak about the struggle and the role of New Jersey suffragist Alice Paul in getting the 19th Amendment ratified in 1920. Ms. Barth worked with a statewide committee planning events to observe and celebrate this centennial.



THE GATEWAY FAMILY YMCA TO OFFER NEW BLOOD PRESSURE SELF-MONITORING PROGRAM

The Gateway Family YMCA is offering a new session of the YMCA's Blood Pressure Self-Monitoring Program throughout 2020, designed to help participants with hypertension lower their blood pressure by following an evidence-based program that combines blood pressure self-monitoring, nutrition education seminars and personalized support. This program will be offered at The Gateway Family YMCA – Wellness Center Branch, 1000 Galloping Hill Road, Union, NJ. The program is also being offered at the Rahway Branch, 1654 Irving Street, Rahway and the Elizabeth Branch, 135 Madison Avenue, Elizabeth, as well as in collaboration with local community groups.

The Y developed this program to help individuals better manage hypertension and improve their overall health. According to the American Heart Association, more than 80 million Americans have high blood pressure, but less than half have it under control. Research shows that the simple process of checking and recording blood pressure at least twice a month over four months may lower blood pressure in some people with hypertension. In addition, evidence shows that proper nutrition, particularly with a reduction in sodium intake, may help reduce both systolic and diastolic blood pressures.

"The Gateway Family YMCA is proud to continue to support the Blood Pressure Self-Monitoring program," said Krystal R. Canady, CEO, The Gateway Family YMCA. "The Y is the leading community-based organization dedicated to improving the nation's health and this program is a great example of putting that commitment into action."

As part of the Blood Pressure Self-Monitoring program, participants will measure their blood

pressure at least two times a month for four consecutive months—a minimum of eight times-and record their blood pressure readings in a self-selected tracking tool. A nutrition education component will encourage the participants to practice healthier eating habits, including reducing sodium in their diet.

The program is facilitated by Healthy Heart Ambassadors, appointed and trained by the Y, who will show participants how to use a blood pressure monitor, encourage self-monitoring and facilitate monthly nutrition education seminars.

The Gateway Family YMCA is looking for adults with high blood pressure who could benefit from participating in this program. Benefits include: simple, evidence-based program that may lower blood pressure; personalized support from a Y Healthy Heart Ambassador; tips for maintaining cardiovascular health; easy-to-use, portable self-tracking tool; and heart healthy nutrition education seminars.

Participants must meet the following criteria to participate in the program: must be at least 18 years old; must be diagnosed with high blood pressure; must not have experienced a recent cardiac event; must not have atrial fibrillation or other arrhythmias; and must not be at risk for lymphedema.

There is a small fee for the Blood Pressure Self-Monitoring program and financial assistance is available to those who qualify. In addition to the program, The Gateway Family YMCA will be providing weekly Nutritional Seminars that are free open to the community.

HOMELESSNESS KNOWS NO SEASON IN UNION COUNTY

homeless and the needy?

Leaders of different faiths shared prevailing teachings on charity, generosity and poverty at Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in Rahway on December 19. The memorial vigil honored the lives of people who have died due to homelessness in Union County.

The 4th annual vigil was held just before the longest night of the year, the winter solstice, to symbolize the struggle of those who are homeless and who often live out their lives on cold streets or in dangerous abandoned buildings. The Union County Interfaith Coordinating Council organized the event with local agencies involved in the fight against homelessness: Community Access Unlimited (CAU) and The Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless. CAU is a Union County-based, statewide nonprofit that strives to integrate people with disabilities and at-

What do the world's religions tell us about the risk youth into the general community through federal programs under the federal Runaway and comprehensive supports.

> The city of Elizabeth is losing federal Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funding in 2020 for homelessness-related services under the Emergency Solutions Grant initiative.

> "The fact that we have lost this money in Elizabeth will increase demand for county funds that will be spread thinner," said Carolee Marano, assistant executive director of development at CAU, which will lose \$40,000 in grant funding. "The cuts in HUD funding decrease our budget for homeless prevention programs and we are concerned about a rise in homelessness in the county. We are also concerned about a rise in homelessness among youth."

> CAU operates the only youth-only shelter in Union County and runs services to support their health and future independence. In addition to the County youth shelter, CAU also operates 3

Homeless Youth Act: one shelter, a transitional living program for females, and one for males. CAU also provides rent assistance to prevent homelessness.

Linda Flores-Tober, executive director of the Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless, reflected on circumstances that can push a person or family into homelessness.

"There's more to the story than 'I couldn't find a job," Flores-Tober said. "What we see are a lot of people who didn't get engaged in the Division of Developmental Disabilities system and now the parents are not able to take care of them."

Flores-Tober attributed 5 deaths in Elizabeth to homelessness in 2019.

Faith speakers quoted teachings that the faithful are called by God to relieve the less fortunate of their trials or difficulties. Father Sebastian Obando of St. Michael's Church in Cranford acknowledged that Jesus Christ would fit the modern description of homelessness.

"It's really a service of remembrance, because frankly if we didn't remember them, nobody would," said Rev. Carmine Pernini of Zion Church.

Parishioners at his church took people in this winter as part of Operation Warm Heart – an emergency winter sheltering program run by the Elizabeth Coalition.

"It's lifesaving work – not very many people are willing to open their doors, so people of faith come together to do it," Pernini said.

Attendees sang and lit candles for 45 people who have died due to homelessness.

Pernini and Flores-Tober acknowledged a strong correlation between funding for homelessness services and saving people from the cold.

On the night of January 22, 2019, a total of 438 people were experiencing homelessness in Union County, according to the 2019 Point-In-Time Count. A total of 39 persons were unsheltered on the night of the count, and 375 of the total homeless persons were in Elizabeth.

Rev. Ron Thompson of Townley Presbyterian Church in Union spoke about the universal responsibility to care for people in need.

"All faiths agree on the dignity of people," he said.
