CUB SCOUTS DOMINATE KLONDIKE DERBY

The Klondike Derby is an annual event held by Cub and Boy Scout districts during the winter months and is based on the heritage of the Klondike Gold Rush. Boy Scout units have been running Klondike derbies since 1949. The event varies by district, but a typical Klondike derby consists of several stations where patrols/units must test their skills and their leadership abilities, earning points towards a total score. Often, one or more races are included while the Scouts navigate between stations. Each unit must transport their gear on a homemade sled pulled by the Scouts. Districts may have specific guidelines for the construction of sleds.

On January 12 two patrols from Warren's Cub Scout Pack 182 joined 23 other groups participating in the challenge of the Watchung Mountain District's Klondike Derby. It was a rainy, freezing cold Sunday, but our scouts, Fifth Grade Arrow of Light team "Warren Tanks" and the Fourth Grade Webelo team "Flying Llamas" showed their best skills and teamwork to run the course. The race had 7 stations the scouts needed to navigate their way to: fire building, orienteering, First Aid, shelter building, outdoor cooking, knot tying, and distress communication.

Both patrols from Pack 182 tied for first place by receiving a near perfect score. Both patrols ran independently of one another and both scored 194 out of 195 points.

For ten weeks prior to the contest, the scouts dedicated themselves to training every Sunday outdoors to condition themselves to the elements the race would be run in. Warren's Town Manager Mark Krane, and the Warren Township committee allowed the scouts to train on a section of town property just across the street from Wagner Farm.

WHRHS NATIONAL MERIT FINALISTS

All four Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) students, who in September were named National Merit Semi-Finalists, have now qualified as 2020 Finalists. This year's WHRHS National Merit Finalists are: Phillip Ding, Dave Ki, Jessica Young and Vivian Zhang.

"Congratulations to Phillip, Dave, Jessica and Vivian, and to their families and teachers for this important and well-deserved honor," said WHRHS Principal William J. Librera. "Students who receive this distinction have a chance to compete for scholarship prizes. Phillip, Dave, Jessica, and Vivian have outstanding academic records, participate in diverse school and community activities, demonstrate leadership ability and inspire their classmates and teachers."

Being considered for this year's National Merit designation is initially based on scores by more than 1.5 million students who sat for the 2018 PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test)/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT).

WHRHS'S four National Merit Semifinalists this year had been the latest of the 52 WHRHS students who had qualified as National Merit

Semifinalists during the most recent six school years. The year-to-year totals have been: Class of 2015-11; Class of 2016-6; Class of 2017-10; Class of 2018-15; Class of 2019-6; and Class of 2020-4.

Many, although not necessarily all, of the semifinalists tend to go onto to qualify as finalists. This is the second year in a row when all of the WHRHS Semifinalists went on to be named Finalists.

Every year, in addition to the naming of the Semifinalists and Finalists, National Merit also names a list of commended students. SCLSNJ's Bee Spectacular Spelling Bee was held on March 7, 2020 at the Somerset County Vocational and Technical School. Thirty-three 3rd-8th graders, including Trisha Atianzar, grade 7, of Warren Middle School, competed for the title of spelling bee champion. Seventh-grader Aritra Banerjee, of Bridgewater-Raritan Regional Middle School in Bridgewater, won the bee by correctly spelling the word "viscerotonia."

Viscerotonia is a noun of Latin origin defined by Merriam-Webster Unabridged as "a pattern of temperament that is marked by predominance of social over intellectual or physical factors, and exhibits conviviality, tolerance, complacency, and love of food."

PARTICIPATE IN THE 2020 CENSUS

The U.S. Census count is about to begin and for the first time in history you can complete the survey online. All 10 branches at the Somerset County Library System of New Jersey (SCLSNJ) are safe, secure, easily-accessible locations to fill out your Census survey. Including the Warren Twp. branch, located at 42 Mountain Boulevard in Warren Twp.

"We recommend that you use one of the Library's internet computers to respond to the Census at an SCLSNJ branch location," said Lynn Hoffman, director of operations. "When you use the Library's internet computers, we don't keep track of any information about who you are or what you're doing. Your internet history is discarded as soon as you log out, and any information you submit for the Census will only be available to the Census Bureau."

The decennial count helps shape the future of the community by determining how hundreds of billions of dollars are allocated across the country.

"The 2020 Census is fast-approaching," said Nicole Pascoe, civic services supervisor. "It is important that you respond to the Census to help our community get its fair share of the federal funds spent on schools, hospitals, roads, public works, libraries, and other vital programs. Make sure you count everyone living in your home, including newborn babies and young children."

Invitations to respond to the 2020 Census were delivered between March 12-20. Once you receive that invitation, you can respond online, by phone, or by mail. For questions about the upcoming count contact: census@sclibnj.org or visit SCLSNJ.org/census.

47 COMPUTER SCIENCE STUDENTS ATTEND 2020 WHRHS HILLSHACKS HACKATHON

Forty-seven students, some as young as 4th grade, and some from as far away as East Brunswick Township and Middlesex Borough in Middlesex County, and Bethlehem Township in Hunterdon County, participated in the 2020 HillsHacks hackathon on Sunday, February 23, 2020, at Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS).

Coordinating the event for the second year were WHRHS Seniors Jagdeep Bhatia and Mayur Sharma. These WHRHS Computer Science (CS) leaders were assisted by a cadre of WHRHS CS students, who greeted and registered participants. They also assisted in directing participants to classrooms for workshop sessions and to the South Auditorium and Atrium for speaking programs and lunch and dinner breaks.

These and other WHRHS CS students acted as leaders in the session workshops, themselves. They shared with participants their expertise in various computer science languages. They showed participants where to find pertinent web sites on the internet to delve into various subjects, from Artificial Intelligence, introduction to Java, and video game design to Music in Coding, to name just a few.

They also sponsored CS discussions about the very real need to attract more and more girls and women into Computer Science. Of particular interest is tackling the notion of helping girls navigate through their middle school years when many girls feel the social pressure that embracing

Forty-seven students, some as young as 4th CS will label them as "nerdy" and "very uncool" ade, and some from as far away as East in their peer groups.

The WHRHS CS students also shared helpful hints on how to broaden their ability to use computer tools to tackle and solve more problems both now and in the future.

Faculty and volunteers supporting the 2020 HillsHacks hackathon were: Supervisor of Mathematics and Business Dan Twisler; Director of Curriculum and Instruction Mary Ellen Phelan; and community volunteer and former teacher of the Gifted and Talented Program at Watchung Public Schools, Elaine Chesebro.

There was also a panel of speakers who started the day sharing their expertise and their personal stories about how they got into computer science, how they have learned and practiced the use of various computer science languages, and how they became more comfortable at mastering and using new computer science skills. The speakers included Mathematics and Business Supervisor Twisler, WHRHS Computer Science Teacher Daniel Lamson, and 2012 WHRHS graduate Matthew Carbone, who is a graduate of the University of Rochester. Also on the panel was 2018 WHRHS graduate Jared Pincus, who has completed his second year as a CS student at Stevens Institute of Technology, Hoboken. WHRHS Senior and co-organizer of this year's Hills Hackathon, Mayur Sharma, sat in on the speaker's panel, sharing what he already learned.

DON'T FALL FOR SCAM CALLS AND EMAILS IMPERSONATING IRS

Thousands of people have lost millions of dollars and their personal information to tax scams. Scammers use the regular mail, telephone, or email to set up individuals, businesses, payroll, and tax professionals.

Scammers and cyberthieves continue to use the IRS as bait. The most common tax scams are phone calls and emails from thieves who pretend to be from the IRS. Scammers use the IRS name, logo, fake employee names and badge numbers to try to steal money and identities from

Taxpayers need to be wary of phone calls or automated messages from someone who claims to be from the IRS. Often, these criminals will say taxpayers owe money and demand payment right away. Other times, scammers will lie to taxpayers and say they're due a refund. The thieves ask for bank account information over the phone. The IRS warns taxpayers not to fall for these scams.

Below are several tips that will help filers avoid becoming a scam victim.

IRS EMPLOYEES WILL NOT:

- Call demanding an immediate payment. The IRS won't call taxpayers if they owe taxes without first sending a bill in the mail.
- Demand payment without allowing taxpayers to question or appeal the amount owed.
- Demand that taxpayers pay their taxes in a specific way, such as with a prepaid debit card.
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the
- Threaten to contact local police or similar agencies to arrest taxpayers for non-payment of taxes.
- Threaten legal action, such as a lawsuit. If taxpayers don't owe or don't think they owe any tax, and they receive an inquiry like this, they should:

- Tax Administration. Use TIGTA's "IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting" web page to report the incident.
- Report the incident to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your report.


In most cases, an IRS phishing scam is an unsolicited, fake email that claims to come from the IRS. Some emails link to sham websites that look real. The scammers' goal is to lure victims to give up their personal and financial information. If the thieves get what they're after,

they use it to steal a victim's money and identity. For those taxpayers who get a phishing email, the IRS offers this advice:

- Don't reply to the message.
- Don't give out your personal or financial information.
- Forward the email to phishing@irs.gov. Then delete it.
- Don't open any attachments or click on any links. They may have malicious code that will infect your computer.
