GROUP CULTIVATES GRATITUDE FOR FRONT LINE HEROES

#CLARKSTRONG As Front Line Appreciation Group (FLAG) signs started appearing on lawns in nearby towns, WE APPRECIATE YOU! a thought occurred to Clark residents Kim Baglieri, Nicole Brighouse, and Kristin Panayoutou. Those signs hadn't appeared out of nowhere, and if they wanted to see something similar happening in their own town, they were going to have to be the ones to make it happen. The trouble was, they learned rather quickly, it was going to require a bit more work than planting a seed in the ground, hoping for a flower to bloom.

> So the three women quickly got to work. They researched the recent origins of the FLAG movement, which started in Chatham in March, in response to the Covid-19 pandemic. The goal was to highlight the hard work and dedication of frontline and essential workers who were risking their own lives daily, keeping hospitals and nursing homes open, providing indispensable community support such as police, fire, and EMT services, and ensuring other businesses and institutions, like banks, pharmacies, and grocery stores, remained open. FLAG groups accomplish this by offering a little appreciation and spreading some much needed love in the forms of food, notes of thanks, and other donations.

> "I'm a teacher in Rahway, and I first started thinking about it when I saw that Rahway had just created a FLAG group," Brighouse said.

"Our union was getting involved with it in town, so I thought why not do the same thing in Clark."

Baglieri, Brighouse, and Panayoutou brainstormed their next steps, created a logo, ordered signs, established communication with community members, found local vendors from whom they could purchase food, and identified the local heroes they wished to thank. In a matter of a few weeks, lawn sign orders exceeded 800, they had raised over \$16,000, distributed over \$8,000 to local businesses, and donated almost 500 meals. One of Clark FLAG's first charitable acts was on Monday, April 27, when food was purchased from Bistro 1051 on Raritan Road and delivered to the Clark Nursing and Rehabilitation Center on Westfield Avenue.

At the time of this writing other deliveries included snack bags and gift cards to visiting volunteer nurses, 110 meals this Wednesday to RWJ University Hospital in Rahway, 75 meals to healthcare workers at Trinitas Regional Medical Center in Elizabeth this Friday, and meals to Hackensack Meridian JFK Medical Center in Edison.

While time-consuming and a great deal of hard work, the efforts of Clark FLAG have reaped benefits beyond what its founders could have guessed. In early May Panayoutou said, "Since we started this group just two weeks ago, we continue to be astounded by the generosity of our community. Because of those contributing, we are able to take in donations, give business to our local restaurants, and feed those working in our community throughout this crisis. It just shows how impactful the circle of kindness is here in Clark."

So maybe the next time you drive around town and notice one of those now very recognizable blue signs, offer a quick mental note of gratitude to all the workers currently keeping us safe and those striving to continue moving society forward as we survive these challenging times.

It turns out that, perhaps, through just a bit of dedication, perseverance, and appreciation, a seed has been planted in the ground after all.

SEVENTH GRADE STUDENTS AT KUMPF MIDDLE SCHOOL RESEARCH COVID-19

Submitted by Christine Casale Broski Students in both Mrs. Daneille Bihuniak and Ms. Annemarie Lamberti's seventh grade science classes at Carl H. Kumpf Middle School participated in a project-based learning assignment in connection to COVID-19. Students were asked to create a News Segment/PSA (Public Service Announcement) video about the current COVID-19 Pandemic and its impact on their community.

Students were asked to research COVID-19 using a variety of sources. They were given a research outline and rubric to use as a guide while completing the project. Questions to be covered included: What is a pandemic? What are the symptoms of COVID-19? What are some things you can do to reduce your risk of contracting COVID-19? What 3 things do you personally do to stay healthy and happy while under the "stay at home order"?

Videos included either images and text with voice over narration or actual video footage of themselves reporting. Students were also allowed to interview family members.

Bihuniak stated, "I am so proud of the work my students have put into these projects. Students did an excellent job of covering the spread of COVID-19 and the precautionary actions that are advised for all of us to stay healthy. As is often the case, younger generations tend to have a unique perspective on world events. It is evident from these videos that students are definitely missing their traditional classes and friends but are truly enjoying the increased amount of family time the stay at home order has created."

KUMPF HOLDS "KTV STARPOWER: HOME EDITION" COMPETITION

kTV StarPower is Carl H. Kumpf Middle School's annual lip sync contest, which started in 2012 in Clark. The kTV StarPower event has always showcased students' and teachers' lip sync videos that air on the school's daily studentproduced television broadcast, kTV Live. These broadcasts typically culminate into live stage performances from the finalists at a special evening event. Even though kTV StarPower has already taken place this school year, a second

"season" was added to act as Kumpf Middle School's first "virtual assembly" for the students to enjoy together online during the school day.

Since the students and teachers can only meet remotely via distance learning for the remainder of this school year, the event took place online via a live video stream on YouTube, with all videos from the contestants being pre-recorded. For the first time, contestants were also allowed to incorporate their family members into their lip sync performances, including parents and siblings.

kTV StarPower featured three teacher judges who provide "colorful" criticism and award each act up to five "stars" for each performance. Ms. Suzanne Hamilton, known by the students as the "cool" judge, stated that she likes lip sync acts with good "choreography and originality." She also said that she's always on the lookout for interesting fashion choices. Mrs. Cheri Fabrizzio, known as the "nice" judge, is usually reminding contestants to "be safe and appropriate" in their performances. "I love performances containing a lot of energy as well as those that look polished," Fabrizzio stated. Mrs. Kelli Yetsko tends to be a more "brutally honest" judge and is known to be labeled as "the mean judge" by the students. She stated that she is "looking for acts that put in a lot of forethought and really dedicate themselves to entertaining the audience."

In addition to the three teacher judges' scores,

Kumpf students were also invited to score each contestant via online voting to help determine the winner. Each year, the winning performance wins \$100.

Kumpf's kTV program is produced by multimedia teacher Mr. Matthew Serwedes. This year marks kTV's 20th anniversary. Even though the school building is empty, kTV Live has still continued to create live broadcasts for the school every day via YouTube, with each kTV student staff member able to present their segments live from their homes, with live appearances from Kumpf teachers and staff.

Serwedes stated, "It was important for kTV to use their broadcast technology to create a sense of 'normalcy' to an otherwise difficult situation. The daily 'kTV Live' broadcasts and the 'kTV StarPower: Home Edition' virtual assembly were our ways to support the community and show how we can all persevere in a time of hardship. In preparation for kTV's 20th anniversary, Mr. Delmonaco allocated funding to upgrade all of kTV's studio equipment over the last few years, which fortunately already included the ability to live stream from any digital device worldwide. We are happy to use these new tools to help unite the community even when everyone has to be apart right now," Serwedes stated.
